stationed lately at Cappagh, but failed in the attempt. Hearing a sharp knock at his door during the night he got up to investigate, but saw or heard nothing. It is stated that the Sergeant's wife, after her first night in the barrack, left in the morning.

It is all so eerie and so strange that an effort should be made to dislodge the "ghost" as his antics are not for the good of the nerves of the Gardai, who are stationed at this station. Of course, you could get accustomed to 'ghost's doings' as well as to other things, but at the same time the Guards are not sorry to be transferred from a station where nightly scenes take place which are as exciting as those that made history on the ramparts of Elsinore in the long ago when Hamlet was a boy. In connection with the old Barracks at Cappagh there is a story—believe it or not—that, in the olden days a gentleman who often made complaints to the police arrived at the Barracks some evenings after his death. Seeing the man at the door the constable on duty said—"Well, what's wrong with you now?" Then remembering the man was buried for days, he collapsed in a faint. In the reighbourhood it is believed that from that time onwards the occupants of the barracks heard strange noises and weird tricks within the house Who knows but the present ghost is the old one who returned when he found the place neatly and attractively rebuilt, and is anxious to find out how things are going on under a native Government.

This is no tale told at the winter fireside to frighten children. It is vouched for by sensible, intelligent men, and needs thorough investigation by some expert who has credentials for dealing with spooks, ghosts and other denizens of the middle heavens, who come to trouble this earth.

WOMEN AND MARRIAGE

Mr. MacEntee, Minister for Finance, and Mr. Derrig, Minister for Educa tion, are considering important schemes with reference to the salaries, emoluments, and conditions of Na tional Teachers, and proposals, in addition to those regarding pensions, may soon be submitted to the Execu-tive of the I.N.T.O. and the Dail, according to the Daily Press.

A new scale of salaries for entrants

age of female teachers (on marriage)

at about 30 years;
The exclusion from the schools of about 8,000 children between the ages of three and four years, the minimum age at which a child may be sent to

school and entered on the rolls to be four years. There is also the possibility that the "cut" which is being made in the teachers' salaries of 5 p.c. for the fin-

ancing of the pensions fund may not mean the end of the "cuts." The tea-chers will have many questions of first-rate importance before them when the annual Congress meets next

The Government calculate that the new plan under which female teachers who came in after October 1 last must retire on marriage, will tend to bachelorise the profession, as the Civil Service and other Services are bachelorised.

The bachelor teacher is, therefore to be penalised by something in the nature of a bachelors' tax as the bachelors of the Civil Service are at present. In the Civil Service certain increases of salary follow on marriage and in respect of each child up to ax in number. These conditions are, we gather, to be made applicable to the teachers. There is, however, no definite decision as yet as to where a beginning will be made. The new scheme may apply to certain of the present younger members of the pro-

lump sum. It was pointed out by an experienced teacher that the conception behind

the proposal was fundamentally bad. The Government wanted to encourchers by penalising them if they did not marry, and at the same time they wanted to discourse the discourse to discourse the dis wanted to discourage marriages amongst the female teachers by pen-alising them if they got married be-

fore they were thirty.

The average girl would be thirty years before she had spent seven years teaching, said this teacher. The Government's plan to compel female teachers to retire on marriage would of itself tend to create a large number of spinsters in the profession. Now when a girl found she could get no gratuity until she reached thirty her difficulties of securing a satisfactory marriage would increase, and the tendency would be to remain teaching and cease to think about marriage. The girl of thirty was at an obvious disadvantage on the marriage market as compared with a girl several years

He thought the female teachers should have full fredom to select a husband, and that a gratuity should be fixed for four years service.

The plan to exclude young children from the schools is meant as an economy. It will reduce the capitation grant and will hit town schools,

and especially convent schools.

It will also throw some teachers out of employment, because the exclusion from the rolls of 8,000 names will bring down averages.

Many mothers like to send their children to school as young as possible, because the other children "mind" them and the child also became familiar with the school. The raising of the age to 4 years would embarrass many mothers.

SILLY FASHIONS IN DOGS. MAKING THEM RIDICULOUS.

By "PHILOKUON."

A CORRESPONDENT tells me that she recently saw a white dog dyed from head to foot in the colour of parma violet and decorated with bows to match. Can anything be more ridiculous? Bogs were never given to us to be made grotesque in this man-ner. Whether any cruelty was in-inflicted or not would depend upon the nature of the dye. In all probability it would not inconvenience the dog, but at any rate the practice is so absurd that it deserves the reproba-tion of all dog lovers. Dogs should be treated in a rational manner and not be the instruments of ministering to one's vanity or the objects of excessive adulation. I have no sympathy with people who pamper and cosset their pets to such a degree as to pervert their natural disposition. The dog, at one time a servant, is now the friend of man, and so long as it is under-stood that man is the master and not the slave the arrangement works very satisfactorily.

Every dog should respect his master or mistress, and he is much happier for feeling that he is dependent upon superior beings who will attend! to his wants in a rational manner, make a companion of him, talk to him as if : e were one of the family, yet, at the same time, insist upon his acknow-ledging their authority. Dyeing a dog in the way described is altogether different from what is commonly known as faking. There is no intention to deceive. When a dog is faked, on the other hand, the idea is to improve his value by concealing certain defects. Years ago this was a common practice among unscrupulous exhibitors who tried to improve the colour of their dogs or to hide blemishes that would have handicapped them in the show ring. To-day comparatively little is done, for if cases of this kind are re-ported to the Kennel Club and proved the offenders are suspended from showing for a term of years and it is seldom worth while running such a risk. That is one of the benefits that we have derived from the increased authority of the Kennel Club which now has complete jurisdiction over all shows. Not so long ago a faked dog could be shown with impunity at shows that were not held under Kennel Club rules, but this is no longer possible.

Quite a large proportion of seeds which ger-minate under the artificial conditions of a seed testing laboratory would have no chance of establishing themselves under field conditions. One must not imagine from this that seed testing is of no use: far from it. But it is a point which should be borne in mind as one of the practical difficulties which have not yet been satisfactorily settled.

For the moment, however, we must be satisfied with the statement that seeds gradually lose their vitality: they become either incapable of germination, or if they do germinate are so weak that their establishment is problematical. Some seeds degenerate much more rapidly than others. Those of an oily nature often appear to re tain their powers of germination for relatively long periods. But from a practical point of view, we may say with confidence that it is not advisable to sow the seed of any farm crop whatsoever if it is four years old or over. The risk is too great, and even if a seeding three or four times heavier than the normal were given to make up for deficiencies in germination success would be doubtful for the reasons given above.

In the case of the cereal crops, wheat rye, barley and oats, two-year-old seed might give a good plant if sown fairly thickly, but to use older seed would be inviting disaster. Seeds of the cabbage tribe, such as mustard, turnips, kale, etc., are oily in nature, and might be successfully used when three years old. I have in mind a case where some seed of marrow-stem kale, which had been laid up for three seasons, was used to patch up a field which had partially failed. Double the normal rate of seeding was given, and it appeared, from the dense forest of plants which sprang up. that every seed must have germinated. Peas and beans are also comparatively long lived, and have been used even when five years old; it is not safe to employ clover which are over two years old, and the same may be said of most grass seeds.
