FARMERS WOULD PAY IF THEY HAD MONEY.

COLLECTORS' EVIDENCE.

On Thursday Mr. J. P. Geraghty, L.G. Inspector, opened an Inquiry in the Courthouse, Dungarvan, into the performance of their duties by the Waterford County Council. Mr. B. McGuckin, K.C. (instructed

by Mr. F. J. Power, solr.) appeared for the Co. Council.

Mr. C. Williams, solr., represented

all the rate collectors except Messrs. N. and W. Connors, for whom Dr. Connihan appeared.

Nearly all the members of the Co. Council were present. The Inspector first took the evidence

of the rate collectors. Mr. N. Queally, collector, said he had never experienced more difficulty

in collecting rates. Inspector—Can you give any reason for that?

Witness-Low prices for stock. Have you found any evidence of an organised attempt on the part of rate-

payers not to pay rates?—Not a bit.
You found no evidence of that?—No. Have you found those who were able were anxious to pay?—Yes.

You bought cattle off farmers unable to pay their rates?—Yes, in about young men of the highest qualifications.

not collect at all. One Councillor lived in his area and had paid his rates except a balance of the second moiety. Where he would make seizures he had got cattle.

To Mr. McGuckin-The farmers in my area would pay if they had the money. In 80 cases they gave me

cattle voluntarily for rates. Was that because they had not the

money?—Yes. Witness said he was director of Knockmeal Creamery, which had a turn over last year of £84,000. He knew the farmers around were very much in debt at the creamery, and two-thirds of them would get no money from the creamery for some time until their debts were paid. He lost £3 a head on cattle he took last

year for the rates. To Mr. Williams-Unless there is a change this year things will be worse. Inspector-Did the discussion at the Council meetings stiffen the backs of the ratepayers against paying rates?

-Not a bit. Mr. T. Barry, collector, Tallow and Ballyduff area, said he had seventy-seven per cent, collected and his area was one of the toughest in the county. To Mr. Williams-Those who had not paid their rates belonged to eve shade of politics. Statements made the Council meetings did not hold up

Mr. W. Connors, collector, Lismore and Cappoquinn area, saw no evidence of an organised attempt to pay no rates. He made no seizures and got no decrees. There were 5 Councillors and all paid except 2. The bad collection was due to want of money, no price for oats and no market for cattle. He took cattle in lieu of rates. He was satisfied the people had not money.

Mr. N. Connors, collector, said he never had any trouble before. The people were not as well off as they used to be. He did his best to collect the rates. 3 Councillors in his area: one had paid in full, another promised to pay but could not sell his cattle. and the other paid nothing. He had no evidence there was an attempt not to pay rates. He could not buy the people's cattle as he could not get a license to ship them.
