GENERAL O'DUFFY COMING TO CARRICK-ONSUIR. On Thursday, 31st May, General O'Duffy and Mr. Frank MacDermot, T.D., will address a big Fine Gael rally in Carrick-ONSUIR. County Tipperary is closely linked with the history of the Blueshirt movement since its inception, and it will be remembered that the first meeting of General O'Duffy's great organisation campaign as President of Fine Gael was held in Thurles in September last. Other speakers who will accompany General O'Duffy on this occasion will be Prof. Michael Hayes, ex-Communist; Mr. Seamus Burke, B.L., T.D.; Mr. Richard Curran, T.D., and Mr. Dan Morrissey, T.D., who will explain the new Fine Gael labour policy which has attracted so much attention in Labour circles.

UNDEFENDED CIVIL BILLS.

A big number of undefended civil bills were heard and decrees granted in all cases.

RATE ARREARS.

The Waterford County Council and Nicholas Queally, rate collector, brought a civil bill for £39 3s. 9d. against Thos. and Wm. Burke, Giddawn, in respect of unpaid rates.

Mr. Williams, solr. for plaintiff. Mr. Farrell, solr. for defendants, who were not present. Nicholas Queally deposed he was the rate collector. From enquiries made by him he knew that cattle on the lands were defendants property. About three years ago Thos. Burke, one of the defendants, gave witness a deposit receipt for £350 to take the rates out of. The last payment was made in 1931. Both defendants are rated.

To Mr. Farrell—There are cattle on the lands. The cattle were seized before, but the defendants came in and swore that the cattle belonged to Mrs. Toal and the defendant's sister. The deposit receipt which witness got in 1930 for £350 was the property of Thos. Burke.

Justice—Have they a nice farm? Witness—Yes.

Justice—Do you want the full amount in one instalment. Witness—No; give them time.

The Justice then gave a decree for £13 1s. 3d. a month, the first instalment to be paid on or before June 23rd, with two guineas costs.

UNLICENSED DOGS.

Guard O'Regan prosecuted Michael Hennessey, John Wall and Ellen Dalton, all of Knockroe, Colligan, for keeping unlicensed dogs.

As the licenses were since taken out in all cases, the Justice mitigated the fine of 20s. to 5s.

LIGHTS.

Guard Rafferty v. Jas. Wright, Strand street, cycling without a light. Fined 2s. 6d.

BLUE AND GREEN SHIRTS.

ABUSIVE LANGUAGE. Mr. Brennock, Grattan Square, summoned J. O'Mahony, Mt. Odell, for using abusive language on May 2nd and 10th.

Mr. Williams, solr. for plaintiff. Defendant was not professionally represented.

Mr. Brennock said that he was a member of the Blue Shirt movement and was very interested in it. On May 2nd, about 11 p.m., as witness was coming down O'Connell street he met eleven green shirts, who gathered round him. Defendant said: "Come on now, I would beat the blue shirt off you." Witness got away and went home. On 10th May defendant used more filthy language. Witness told Mahoney if he had any charge to make to go to the barracks and make it, and he also pointed out Guard Strain, who was on the Square, to Mahoney. Witness never had a gun.

Ellie Power corroborated the witness's statement. She heard the filthy language used and heard Mahoney threatening Brennock. Mrs. Brennock was present and had to go between Mahoney and her son.

Mrs. McGrath deposed he was present on May 10th. What Mr. Brennock stated was exactly what happened. Brennock told Mahoney if he had any charge to make against him to go to the barracks. Brennock also pointed out a Guard to Mahoney.

Defendant, in reply to the Justice, said he admitted challenging Brennock but did not use any bad language. He told Brennock if he was looking for fight he could have it now. Witness knew nothing about what happened on May 2nd, but on May 9th, about 10.45 witness left his house to go to Mount Odell. At Mapstown four men jumped out from the fence; one of them had a revolver, or something like a revolver, pointed at him. Brennock came up to witness and asked was he one of the so and so slugs, and struck him, knocking him over his bicycle. Witness tried to turn the bicycle light on them but Brennock was rushing at him again, and witness gave him a push and got on the bicycle. The following morning was a holiday, and after Mass witness stood on the Square. Brennock and McGrath were at Brennock's door grinning. Witness asked Brennock was he as good now as he was last night and, if he was, witness would make the ring for him.

To Mr. Williams—Witness reported the matter of the revolver to the Guards. He cannot remember using bad language, but when a man is mad he may say something.

The Justice told the defendant he was evidently a man who was looking for trouble. This town has been very free from this kind of trouble, and he (the Justice) was going to see that it would remain so. He would bind the defendant to the peace, himself in the sum of £10, with two sureties of £5 each, or in default two months with hard labour.
