

CAPPOQUIN DISTRICT COURT.

(Before Mr. G. P. Farrell, B.L.) TRANSFER OF LICENCE.

An application was made for the transfer of the publican's licence held by Mrs. Ellen Coleman, Aghish, Cappoquin, to Miss Bridget Guiry, Dro-more, Aghish, on whose behalf the premises had been recently purchased.

Miss Margaret Guiry, Dro-moro, stated that she was sister of the applicant, who is at present in America, but intended coming home, and she (witness) intended to carry on the business until her sister's return.

The premises had been purchased for her on September 21st, by Mr. E. A. Ryan, solr., Dungarvan, who was at present acting for her in the matter.

As Mr. Ryan was unable to be present, the Justice said as he had not the deed of assignment or any other documents before him he was sorry he could not grant the transfer at this Court, and the best thing he could do was to adjourn the application to the November Court in Lismore for the attendance of Mr. Ryan, solr.

Allegation Against a Guard Withdrawn. Guard John O'Mahony, Cappoquin, summoned Nicholas Kiely, Barrack street, Dungarvan, for riding a bicycle without a light after lighting-up time on Sunday night, 7th October.

Complainant stated that he was on duty in Cook street, Cappoquin, on the night in question when he saw the defendant coming along in the direction of Dungarvan without any light on his bicycle.

Witness flashed his torch on him when passing and called on him to halt for the purpose of taking his name and address, but instead of halting, defendant only increased his speed and tried to ride away, and in doing so he crashed into the kerb of the footpath on the opposite side and fell.

Defendant was then brought to the Barrack, where he made an allegation that he had been assaulted by witness, but there was no truth in that allegation. Defendant was sworn, and said he was returning from the hurling and football matches in Lismore on the night in question and had no lamp, as he thought he would be able to get home before lighting-up time.

HOUSING SCHEME FOR SMALL TOWNS. VIEWS OF MR. GOULDING, T.D.

Subsequent to the speech of Mr. S. T. O'Kelly, Minister for Local Government and Public Health, at the Devonshire Arms Hotel, Dungarvan, last week, on the occasion of the official opening of the Loughmore Housing Scheme.

Mr. Goulding, T.D., referred to the necessity of having something done to provide a housing scheme for the small towns in the county for which no provision at the moment existed.

The Lismore Town Commissioners put forward a small Housing Scheme, and even though they were told no slum problem existed there still they had a housing problem to deal with. There were several small towns and villages and nothing had been done for them in the matter of the provision of housing.

Waterford County had not done too badly in the matter of cottages. There was a great necessity for the erection of houses in the small towns of the County and also some means of livelihood should be provided for the workers in the towns.

Mr. T. McCarthy, U.D.C., said as a labour member, he had great pleasure in extending a hearty welcome to the tenants of the new houses and in doing so he wished them long life and happiness in peace and prosperity (hear, hear).

Mr. J. F. Foley, U.D.C., having in eloquent terms proposed the toast of the clergy.

Very Rev. Canon O'Brien, P.P., returned thanks, and said that speaking for himself and for his fellow-priests, they were deeply interested in what had been done for the clearance of the slum areas.

Mr. M. J. Sargent, P.C. Motor Agent, and Engineer, was granted a renewal of his licence for the storage of petrol, etc., in his Garage, Upper Main street, Cappoquin.

Exemption Orders. The usual Exemption Orders entitling them to open their licensed premises at 7 o'clock on the mornings of the monthly fair were granted to Mr. Wm. Walsh, "Walsh's Hotel," Cappoquin; Mr. Patk. Colender, Castle street, do.; and Mr. Thos. Griffin, Lower Main street, do., whose applications were late for the Annual Licensing Sessions in September.

A Motor's Driver's Licence. Guard King, Cappagh, summoned Patrick Mulcahy, Mill street, Cappoquin, for driving his motor car without having a driver's licence.

When the case was called, the Guard stated that defendant had already been convicted and fined at Ardmore Court at the suit of the Ardmore Guards for this offence, and he, therefore, wished to be allowed to withdraw the present summons.

The Justice having assented to this course, the case was accordingly marked "Withdrawn."

Currency and Banking. COMMISSION APPOINTED.

The Minister for Finance, has appointed a Commission of Inquiry into Currency and Banking problems in Saorstát Éireann. The terms of reference are:-

"To examine and report on the system in Saorstát Éireann of currency, banking, credit, public borrowing and lending, and the pledging of State credit on behalf of agriculture, industry and the social services, and to consider and report what changes, if any, are necessary or desirable to promote the social and economic welfare of the community and the interests of agriculture and industry."

"The first Banking Commission in the Free State was established in 1926 as a consequence of the change of Government, which took place in 1922, to inquire into the problems created by that change," says an official statement.

"The three main questions before it were:- (1) The standard of value. (2) Legal tender; and (3) Apportionment and re-allocation of the bank note issues.

NOT FINAL. In its main reports on banking and currency problems it dealt with these three questions and it furnished supplementary reports on such important matters as agricultural credit, industrial credit, savings bank business and the management of Government accounts.

The Commission appreciated that its conclusions on a number of important points could not be regarded as final, and that they would require re-examination in the course of time as a consequence of the change in the economic conditions on which they are based, and the establishment of a further Commission of Inquiry after an interval of five years was recommended in a Minority Report submitted by the Commission.

"Since the 1926 Commission presented its reports the problems of currency and credit regulation and the management of the foreign exchanges have become increasingly important and complex. In particular, the phenomena of a varying standard of value, not based on or associated with gold, have brought into existence new factors which did not exist for the Saorstát in 1926 in view of the return of Great Britain to the gold standard in 1925.

"The trend of development fits to have problems of the type thereby created dealt with on an international scale through national organisations independent of direct Governmental control, and capable of assuring that the agreed policy will be made effective.

"The World Monetary and Economic Conference in 1933 passed a resolution to the effect that, for certain purposes, independent Central Banks, with the requisite powers and freedom to carry out an appropriate currency and credit policy, should be created in such developed countries as have not at present an adequate Central Banking institution.

"Steps have been taken to set up Central Banks in India and in New Zealand, and the recommendation of a Commission that a similar organisation should be established in Canada has been accepted, and is being implemented by the Canadian Government.

"It is possible that the creation of a Central Bank in the Saorstát (if such were thought desirable) might give rise to special difficulties and problems, and it is felt, therefore, that the question needs very careful examination by a competent and representative Commission.

"The Government has embarked on a policy of extensive and intensive development of the national resources and is pledged to the removal of existing social evils, such as inadequate housing. In addition, the credit if the State is being hypothesized in the course of the policy of industrial de-

velopment and land settlement. The financial procedure of local authorities in regard to existing indebtedness and future requirements needs review. The Government has decided that these questions and the problems to which they give rise can best be dealt with, on the whole, by a Commission appointed to review the existing banking and credit system of the country.
