Accordingly any of the 400,000 contracts made with the British Government were now contracts with the Government of Saorstat Eireann, no more and no less binding on the land annuitant or the tenant farmer than on the Government of Saorstat Eireann. One of the two parties to that contract proceeded to alter the terms and conditions obtaining when it was signed. The tenant farmer or Land Commission annuitant had no longer prices for his produce which subsisted when he entered into and signed his contract. Those were the conditions under which the Land Commission was satisfied that the lands were value for the advance of the money to the farmer tenant, and that the lands had an annual earning worth in excess of the annual liability undertaken. The contract was made on the basis of the earning worth of the lands, and land annuitants were entitled to urge that the conditions of the contract no longer obtained.

If it be urged in extenuation of the Government's claim that the change of conditions affecting the contract was not a positive act of the Executive or Legislature, then it was some other agency over which the Government had no control. It mattered little to the farmer what the agency was which had altered the conditions of his contract. The fact that those conditions were altered to his detriment was all that mattered.





The seed must afterwards be spread out to dry or may be dusted with slaked lime or ground mineral phosphate. Formalin is sometimes used in the same way, but, unless careis exercised, the germination of the seed is apt to be depressed. The simplest method is to dust the seed with a suitable powder at the rate of about 8 ozs. per barrel. The powder may consist of finely-ground copper carbonate or of one of the proprietary powders sold for the purpose. Special machines for use in this "dry" treatment have been placed on the market, but, if an old churn barrel is available, it will serve the purpose admirably; the wheat seed and an appropriate quantity of powder being placed in the barrel and the latter turned over repeatedly. Failing a barrel of this type or a proper machine, a quantity of seed and an appropriate quantity of powder may be placed in a close sack and the latter turned over repeatedly until all grains are coated with podwer.

The foregoing treatment is simple, and, above all, inexpensive, and, as wheat infected with Bunt would be objectionable from a milling point of view, it is incumbent on all growers to ensure that their seed is free from Bunt spores, or that, if they are present, they are killed by proper methods of disinfection.

HOUSING LIVE STOCK.

SOME SEASONAL PRECAUTIONS

With the approach of winter, the farmer must make preparations for the housing of his live stock. When one remembers that cattle, horses, and pigs will be confined to stalls, stables, and piggeries almost continuously for six months of the year, the importance of seeing to their proper housing cannot be over-estimated. If the animals so confined are to remain in good health and in a profitable thriving conhealth and in a profitable thriving condition, very careful attention must be paid to feeding and sanitation. The feeding of the stock is of primary importance, and very exacting methods of nuitrition must be practised, but to protect the health of the cattle so confined much attention should be paid to the drainage, sanitation, cleanliness and lighting of the farm buildings.

Importance of Cleanliness.
Cleanliness is accepted in every civilised country as the first and chief safeguard of the health of the human race. It is likewise the first safeguard of the health of our domestic animals. This fact should be constantly before our minds when making arrangements for the housing of the live stock, and our every action should be directed towards the improvement of existing conditions of cleanliness, both within and around the different buildings. Practically all diseases of domestic animals are caused by minute organisms, and in our fight against these germs of disease thorough sanitation is our most deadly weapon. It must not be concluded, of course, that efficient sanitation will effectively check all loss from animal disease, but, when the principles of sanitation are wisely and carefully observed, the outbreaks of disease will be very much minimised.

The Housing Of Pigs. For the successful housing of pigs no elaborate or costly structures are necessary.
