PUBLIC MEETING IN DUNGARVAN.

INDUSTRIES TO BE STARTED. A largely attended public meeting was held in the Town Hall, Dungarvan, on Thursday, for the purpose of discussing ways and means for the establishment of a suitable factory or industry in Dungarvan. Messrs. S. Goulding, T.D., and N. Wall, T.D., were present. Mr. M. Morrissey, Chairman of the Urban Council, after explaining the object of the meeting read a letter from the Parliamentary Secretary, Mr. P. Little, in which it was pointed out that the starting of an industry would depend very much upon their initiative and on their courage to back their wishes by putting up at least a portion of the capital required. The letter also added that if a good offer to put up the capital was made, the necessary information as to the best industry or any assistance by way of information regarding tariffs and further capital would be given by the Government. Mr. Sean Goulding, T.D., pointed out that Portlaw had started an industry and Dungarvan could follow the lead by starting some industry. The meeting unanimously decided to form a committee and accordingly appointed the following:—Rev. Fr. Walsh, C.C.; Messrs. B. Mulcahy, M. Clancy, Main St., P. J. Moloney, Dr. Casey, J. Christopher, Commissioner Moynihan, J. J. Crotty, M. Morrissey, and M. Moloney. Rev. Fr. Walsh, C.C., was appointed Chairman of the committee, with Mr. P. J. Moloney, Vice-Chairman and Mr. M. O'Meara, Hon. Sec., pro tem. After a long discussion it was decided to ask Messrs. Goulding and Wall, T.D.'s to approach the Department with a view to getting further information. It was further decided that the committee be called the Dungarvan Industrial Development Association, with a nominal membership fee of 5/-. Full report next issue.

DUNGARVAN CIRCUIT COURT SEED WHEAT.

ALLEGED BREACH OF WARRANTY INTERESTING CASE. At the Dungarvan Circuit Court on Thursday, before Mr. Justice Sealy, Mr. M. O'Brien, Kereen, Aghish, sued the Dungarvan Co-Op Creamery Ltd., for £100 damages for breach of warranty, in the sale of seed wheat. Mr. Ryan, solr., for plaintiff. Mr. Budd, B.L., (instructed by Mr. A. R. Farrell, solr.) for the defendants. After giving the case a lengthy hearing His Lordship dismissed the case with costs. A sum of £6 5s. expenses was allowed. President and the Times.

WHAT THE GOVERNMENT ARE DOING. President de Valera spoke at a meeting at Limerick in support of the Fianna Fail candidates for Limerick Corporation elections. He wanted, he said, the people of Limerick to do their part to put an end to the type of opposition which was absolutely senseless and damaging in every way to the nation. Attempts had been made to show that the present was a tyrannical Government. The Local elections last summer, however, had shown that this country decided to be free to play its part independent of anything from outside. For the past two or three months a campaign had been indulged in to cut the communications of the country and to prevent normal life going on, a campaign that had been disowned by the people.

He asked the people of Limerick to see that an answer was given to that campaign which would completely put the kybosh on that sort of business. "We know," said President de Valera, "that the people of Ireland are with us. We came into office with our country on the brink of destruction as a result of the collapse of the agricultural industry. Agricultural produce which, in 1929, stood at 100, fell in the next year to 87, and in the following year to 67."

That one-third drop occurred before Fianna Fail came into office, continued the President, Fianna Fail at that time begged the then Government to try and produce other things than cattle. They pointed to the production of wheat, but it was no use. The Government of the day went on the same way. They consented to the paying of £5,000,000 to Britain, payment which the Opposition of that time had said for years was not due. That payment had been the cause of the economic war for which Fianna Fail was blamed.

Fianna Fail believed they were entitled to this money. "My watch may be taken from me by a robber," said the President, "but it is not his. If I give him my watch it is his. The farmers are undoubtedly suffering. I want them to know their suffering is not due to the economic war." Dealing with the annuities question, the President said these had been halved and a free gift had been given from the community to the farmers. The annuities had been reduced to such an extent that only the sum necessary to complete land purchase on the terms already allowed to old purchasers would be collected.

The Government had particularly in mind, said the President, the good of the small farmer and of the working classes, who represented the biggest class in the community. Their opponents said unemployment had gone up. They did not say that the population was increasing at the rate of 20,000 a year. The recent figures given by the Minister for Industry and Commerce showed that there were tens of thousands of people actually in employment. They knew, by looking around, there was more employment than before the present Government came into office. "I hate," he said, "to see people getting money simply to keep them in existence. I prefer them to get it for useful work done. But it is a task to organise that useful work."

World economic conditions had changed, and it was necessary to re-organise themselves to face an altogether new situation. Even when this State was organised in an industrial way, able to produce the most of its requirements, there would still be a surplus left unemployed. He suggested that these might be employed in improving the national estate, roads, accommodation of various kinds, reclaiming and draining land, reforesting the country where reforestation was possible. Strangers who came into the country, close observers of European conditions, had told him time after time that there was no country in Europe, notwithstanding the economic war, in a better condition than the Free State. "The work of granting full freedom to this country still remains to be accomplished," proceeded the President.
