A paysheet amounting to £14 15s. 0d. was passed for the week's wages. Mr. Butler said at a previous meeting the Clerk had given them a gloomy picture of their finances. As the paysheets are being signed it is the custom to read out the amount to be passed, and the amount passed the corresponding week last year. Mr. Quinn said while they were on the question of sewers he was of opinion that the nuisance which was created by the Council at Davis street, should be first attended to. Mr. O'Dwyer asked the B.S. if the plans were yet ready. B.S.—Yes, the plans are ready. A further discussion took place on the question of finance for Davis street sewer.

The Clerk said the original scheme was to be done out of revenue in the event of a grant being refused.

FREE MILK SUPPLY

The Department wrote stating that in regard to the Free Milk Supply a sum of £90,000 is made available for the period ending March 1935. The precise amount allocated to the Council will be forwarded as soon as possible.

On the proposition of Mr. J. F. Foley seconded by Mr. Dahill, it was decided to continue the scheme. Tenders from suppliers to be considered on Friday, 15th March.

HOUSING SITES

A deputation of persons who are to be housed in the next scheme of houses waited on the Council. The Council, on the proposition of Mr. Foley, decided to admit five from the deputation.

Three men and two women appeared, and Mr. Moylan, speaking for the deputation (which he said was 100 strong) said they came there to protest against the site at Ryan's field.
