PROTEST AT CORK MEETING
A meeting of the Executive of the New Land League was held in the Imperial Hotel, Cork, on Saturday.

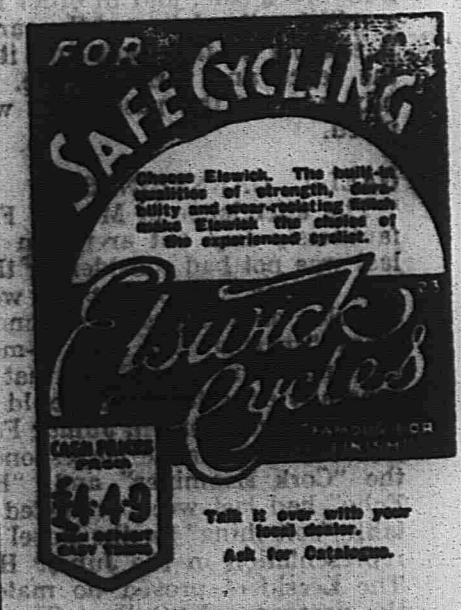
This he read as follows:—"The Exe-cutive Committee of the New Land League wish to enter the strongest protest against the allegation that the League or its members are engaged in a conspiracy against the collection of Land Annuities. They are engaged, and will continue to engage, in protest-ing against the impossible condi-tions under which farmers have now to exist, and which are, in their opinion, the direct result of Government policy in the perpetuation of the economic war.
