ARGUMENTS AT TRAMORE THE BISHOP'S VIEWS

There was a lengthy argument regarding the ethics of Sunday dances at the Tramore annual Licensing Sessions, when three applications for dance licences were granted with some restrictions.

The hour should not be later than 1 or 2 a.m., and no intoxicating liquor should be permitted. Other conditions were that all persons under 18 years should be excluded, and, where possible, "the stranger" should be kept out.

When District Justice McCabe asked if any objection had been made before Judge Sealy against Sunday dancing, which had been carried on in Tramore ever since he came to Waterford eleven years ago, Mr. Keane replied that, personally, on the matter he supposed there was an agreement with the parish priest whereby Sunday dancing was allowed, but his Lordship had now chanced the policy for the entire Diocese.

The District Justice asked why should dancing be wrong on Sunday any more than any other night. When he was in Kilkenny, last week a priest came forward, and when an application was made for certain days said he objected to those days, with the exception of Sunday.

Mr. Keane—In Waterford there is a strong local tradition as regards the sacredness of the Sunday and requirements of the Church.

District Justice—But surely you are not going to tell me there has been any tradition against dancing in Tramore on Sundays? I tell you that tradition does not exist and did not exist during the eleven years I have been here. It is only right that I give full weight to the Bishop's views, but at the same time I have got to exercise the discretion given me under the statute in a judicial manner.

Mr. Keane—My point is that trespasses against the tradition to which I have referred have now gone to an extreme.

The District Justice said that Tramore was definitely a holiday resort, and he had to recognise that people on holiday could be up later than when at work. He wanted his discretion to reflect opinion as to what should be permitted at dances, and he had got to take into consideration what had been done before.

Rev. W. Flynn said that in Waterford there had been a feeling at all times against Sunday dancing.

Justice—The only evidence of it I have is that they have danced on Sunday.

Father Flynn said he had been instructed by his ecclesiastical authorities to state the reasons against Sunday dancing. His Bishop had a very strong objection to dancing later than 11 o'clock.

The District Justice said that a couple of weeks ago they had over 40,000 people at a hurling match in Dublin, and an Archbishop threw in the ball so that there was no point in suggesting that the tradition of the Church in this country was Sabbatarianism.

Fr. Flynn—There are too many encroachments on the Sunday already in the way of sport and everything else.

The Justice replied that he did not think anyone could say that all hurling and football matches, etc., which were held throughout Ireland on Sundays interfered with the Irish people in the discharge of their religion.

Father Flynn said their actions in reality were in favour of Tramore people and their good name.

The Justice fixed the closing hour for ordinary nights at 11.30 p.m. and 1 a.m. for Thursdays and Sundays from mid-July to mid-September, with two late sessions during race week to 2.30 a.m. on August 13 and 15. He also allowed dances until 1 a.m. on Easter Monday and Whit Monday nights. No person under 18 years to be admitted, and no intoxicating liquor to be consumed.
