By the reckless and imprudent imposition of tariffs, quotas, and monopolies, the Irish industrial revival is beginning to assume the form of a very grievous burden on the masses of the people.

BLACKWATER FISHERIES.

At a special meeting of the Lismore or No. 4 Board of Blackwater Fishery Conservators at Tallow, on Friday, their attended Mr. J. Kennedy, Chairman, Lord Charles Cavendish, Vice-Chairman, E. P. Maxwell, W. Baldwin, W. Dunne, E. O'Brien, J. Joseph, P. Murphy, E. O'Hey, M. Kenney, Capt. R. Holroyd Smyth, Ion Villiers Stuart, W. O'Neill, Messrs. T. Drohan, Clerk and Inspector, and W. Buckley, Assistant Inspector, were also in attendance.

The meeting was summoned to consider a series of motions handed in by Major Longfield, appearing on the agenda of the Conference of Irish Fishery Conservators to be held in Dublin on the 28th. The Chairman said that Mr. Annesley and he had been originally appointed as a delegation, but as he (the Chairman) was unable to attend, it was suggested that the Major might go instead.

Proposed Notices of Motion. (1) That this meeting endorse the Minister's approval of the following major recommendations of the recent Fishery Commission:—(a) That all netting be abolished; (b) That all salmon be trapped on their passage up river, with the subsequent sale and release of such trapped salmon, in proportions not determined; (c) That Board of Conservators be abolished and substituted by a Central Board with Local Committees.

The Clerk then read the notices of motion referred to, as follows:— (1) That this meeting endorse the Minister's approval of the following major recommendations of the recent Fishery Commission:—(a) That all netting be abolished; (b) That all salmon be trapped on their passage up river, with the subsequent sale and release of such trapped salmon, in proportions not determined; (c) That Board of Conservators be abolished and substituted by a Central Board with Local Committees.

Mr. Maxwell—Was the Major appointed as representative of that Board? The Chairman—No. Mr. Maxwell—In what position was he going? The Chairman—In Mr. Annesley's place, I understand.

Mr. Power—This Board never approved of Major Longfield as delegate? The Clerk—Not directly. The arrangement was between the Chairman and the Major. After some further discussion, Mr. Hey moved "That Major Longfield in submitting those private notices of motion in the name of this Board has been guilty of misapprehension of the opinions of the Board. Such being the case that his name be withdrawn from the delegation to the Conference and that the Secretary of the Conference be notified and ordered to erase those private notices of motion from the agenda. Further, that this Board pass a vote of censure on Major Longfield for what I submit might be deemed an attempted breach of trust, and that this be recorded on the minutes."

Mr. Power seconded. The Clerk said the only other item on the Conference agenda was from the Sligo Conservators to the effect that the claims for compensation and officials of Conservators whose services might be dispensed with by legislation be discussed. Mr. Maxwell said he would like to make his position clear on the matter. He was in entire agreement with many of the Major's suggestions, but as representative of the Board, he should not have put forward the suggestion in his own name.

The Chairman said if the Major were present he would have something to say to him. In the circumstances he would leave it to the Clerk to convey the opinions of the Board. Lord Charles Cavendish and Messrs. Hey and Villiers Stuart were appointed delegates to the Conference.

Mr. Hey said he took it that the Board wished them to support the suggestion of the Sligo Board? The Chairman—Certainly. Other members having agreed, the Clerk on behalf of the other officials and himself thanked the Board for their attitude in that matter. He had spent 27 of the best years of his life in the service of the Board, handling thousands of pounds year by year and with never a complaint against him. In the circumstances it would be a most unjust hardship if his services were to be dispensed without any compensation.

The Clerk and the Assistant Inspector, gave several recent instances of the good work done and the great risks undertaken by some of the balliffs in the upper reaches of the river in endeavouring to put down poaching. Some of those balliffs were in the service of the Board for a long time.

Mr. Murphy said if the Government began by taking over the upper part of the river they would not stop there. The Chairman—We are in favour of leaving things practically as they are, with certain improvements. Capt. Smyth: The present system has been tried over 70 years. Mr. Kenney—They tried nationalisation in France and it was a complete failure. The Clerk said that the changes suggested would inflict untold hardships on many poor people. There were over 600 men employed in connection with the fishing on the Blackwater, and that meant some 2,000 persons in all.

The delegates appointed were asked to put the views of the Board before the Conference.

EMPLOYMENT IN SAORSTADT

Far-Reaching Regulations HOURS AND HOLIDAYS

THE Minister for Industry and Commerce has made an Order bringing in the Conditions of Employment Act, 1936, on May 20.

The provisions of this Act are of great importance to all industrial undertakings to which the Act applies. Some of the principal features, which will be effective immediately, are:

The institution of a 48-hour week for adult workers and a 40-hour week for workers under 18 years of age. Nobody under the age of 14 years can be employed in industrial work under any circumstances.

No worker, with certain exceptions, can work on Sundays or public holidays, except adult male workers, who are limited to three hours on a Sunday.

Six days consecutive annual leave, with pay, will have to be given to every industrial worker in his complete employment year, or as an alternative, where employment is broken one day's pay for every two months' work.

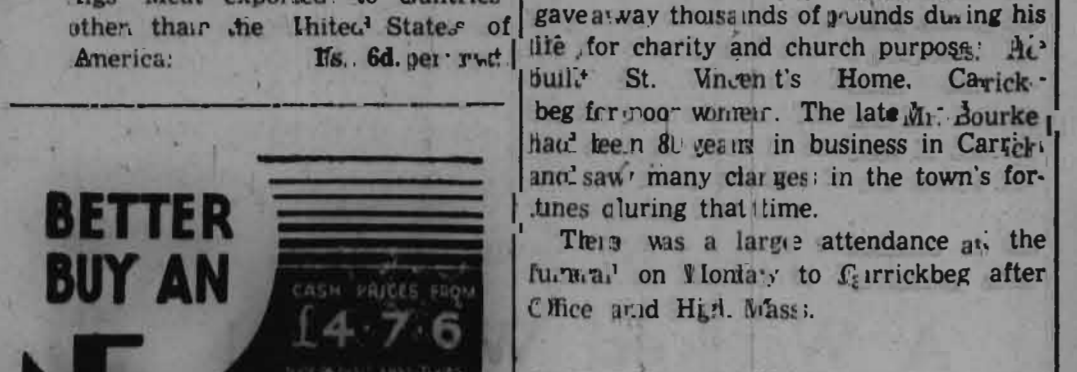

LOCAL HAPPENINGS.

MISSION IN DUNGARVAN—A 3 weeks Mission was opened in the Dungarvan Parish Church, on Sunday last. The Mission is conducted by three distinguished members of the Redemptorist Order—Fr. Murphy, Fr. Fox and Fr. Fitzgerald. Each morning at 7 o'clock there is Mass followed by a lecture. At 9.30 there is a Mission Mass for school children and in the afternoon at 3 p.m. there are also devotions for school children and a lecture. In the evening at 8 o'clock there is Rosary and Sermon followed by Benediction. The spacious Church is thronged night and morning with the faithful who follow the discourses of the learned preachers most carefully. Each evening Very Rev. Canon O'Brien, P.P., V.F., presides at Benediction.

DICKENS LEATHER FACTORY—The public at large will be glad to learn that the newly-established Leather Factory at Cuddy's Quay, Dungarvan, is now in production and is giving much needed employment. In addition to the ordinary workers a number of boys have been taken on as trainees for the particular work and they are taught both at the Factory and at the local Technical Schools the subjects needed for their specialisation in industrial work later on. Thus our Technical School will fill a most important part in preparing the rising generation to take their proper place in the development of the industrial life of the nation.

NEW TECHNICAL SCHOOL—The new Technical School at Fair Lane, Dungarvan, will, when completed, be a tremendous advantage to the pupils and the teachers, and will give them facilities for training which hitherto were badly needed. Standing on its own grounds with a good area for the teaching of such subjects as Rural Science, etc., the new school will enable our efficient Chief Executive Officer—Mr. Lanigan—to utilise to the full the services of the able staff of teachers he controls and so give the pupils who avail of the classes the full benefits of the particular technical course they need. With the opening of the new school in the Autumn there will dawn a bright period in the Technical Education of the youth of Dungarvan and the surrounding districts.

ABOLISHED—Following the abolition of the Oath and the Governor-General, the abolition of the Senate will be a fait accompli next week. Undoubtedly we have more law-tries in such lines than our poor country can afford, and if all redundant or at least such services as we could do well without were abolished, it would be a very good thing.

Kilkenny) man and three for £5,000 each on the 3d horse (2 in Dublin and 1 in Kerry). All the rest of the big money went to various centres all over the world.

It is high time that workers in general in industrial occupations got due attention. Under the new law no man in industry can work more than a 48 hour week with a half holiday each week off. All Bank holidays are non-workable, but payable and he must get a week's paid holidays. What a pity that no account is taken of the rural worker whether farmer or labourer and no provision is made to shorten his hours or give him a holiday. Surely the man who milks the cow and follows the plough and saves the food of the people is entitled to some consideration, but so far he is outside the pale. His work is not governed by hours but from daylight to dark in all weathers and at all seasons. Perhaps soon an Act will be passed to fix his time table of work and regulate his job generally. Of course with the present type of cow in use the farm which has to be milked morning and evening on Sunday as on Saturday, it is very difficult to arrange matters.

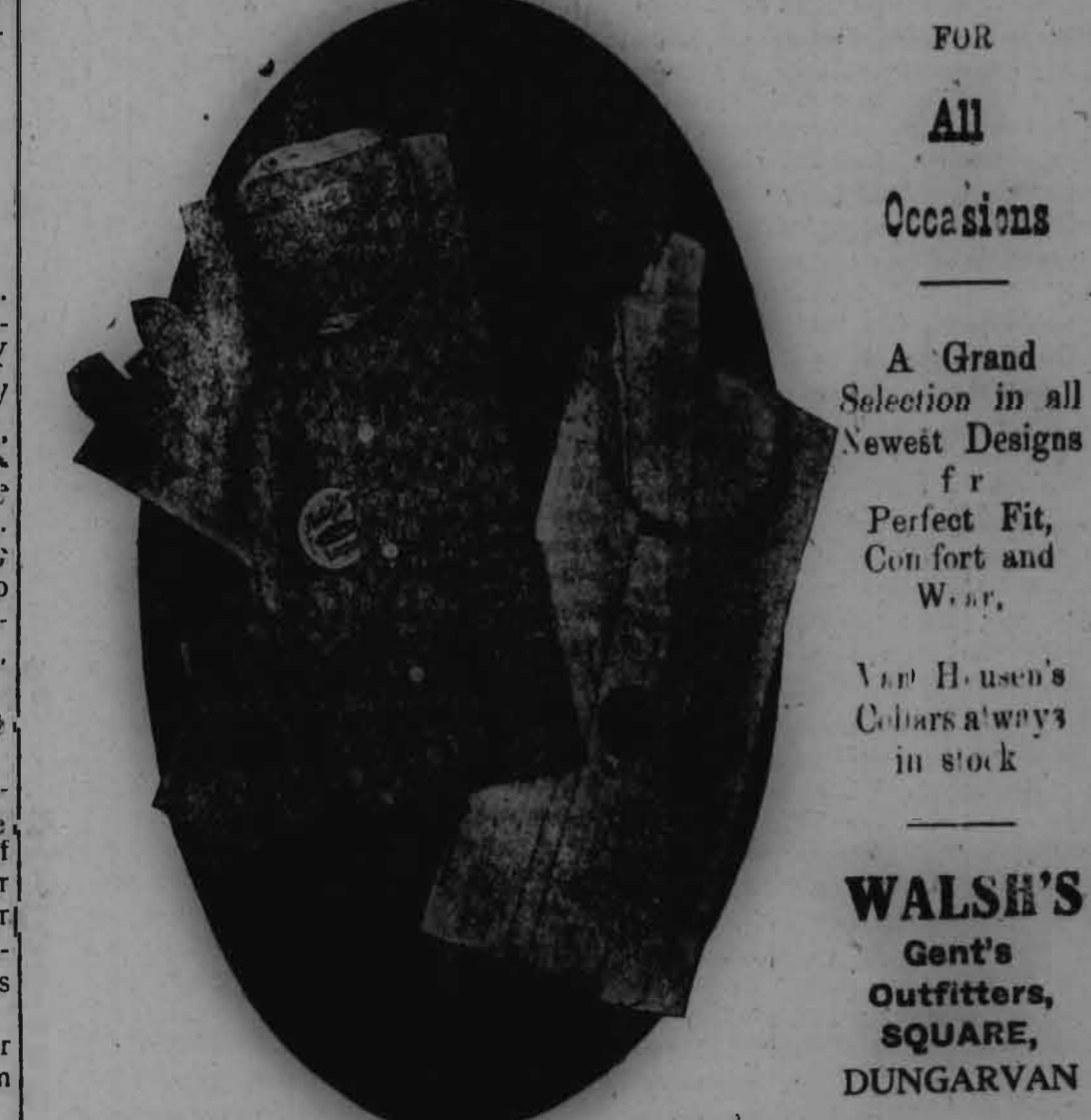

IRISH CEMENT

New Industry For The Free State

For many long years the desirability of establishing a factory for the manufacture of cement has been discussed, both before and after the Great War, which proved a turning point in the building trade as well as in other concerns.

The authorised capital of the new company is 300,000, divided into £1 shares, but the company propose to raise a further £450,000 by means of the issue of first mortgage Debenture stock bearing 3 1/2 per cent interest.

The total consumption of cement in the Irish Free State during the past three years has been as follows:—1933, 285,097 tons; 1934, 329,571 tons; 1935, 335,005 tons; the average of which is considerably in excess of the contemplated output of the two factories.

ARE STOCK OVERDONE FOR SHOWS

There have always been some who question the value of agriculture shows on the grounds that the preparation of stock for exhibition is carried to a stage beyond the realisation of economic returns.

The successful exhibition of stock involves the expenditure of much time, thought and money; and for this reason it is important that those who intend to launch out in this direction should carefully distinguish between animals which will justify special treatment and those which will not.

Many suggestions have been made to the effect that what is known as "ordinary breeding condition" should be the limit of fattening for the summer shows.

Even the fattening of dairy cows is justified within limits; for, provided milking capacity has been proved by actual records, a well-fleshed cow is likely to start her lactation period with a decided advantage over the cow which has been drained of her flesh by heavy milking without any recompense being made.

With regard to the exact method of fattening stock for exhibition, the first essential is to prepare the animals gradually, or in other words, without over-fattening at any period. That this is of supreme
