

Great care should be taken to see that teat cups are properly adjusted and that the cup liners are not worn or ineffective For this and other reasons it is advisable that the owner of the herd should personally superintenci the milking; operations or all least make one person-and, if

notwithstanding that they are not as yet FOR quite free from slight drawbacks, they are on the whole a decided advantage over hand milking. In a large herd there is a saving of at least fifty per cent. in labour

While there is no conclusive evidence that milking machines carry infection from a diseased udder to a healty one, it care in dealing with cows in which in this respect there is anything amiss or doubtful. Such cows should be milked separately and not until the milking of the othe cows is completed and the milk should be kept apart. Often the machine is blamed for udder troubles, which arise from other causes. Disease producing bacteria may from one cause or another, be already present in the udder, and will develop whether the cow is milked by hand or ma

As regards the hygienic purity of milk drawn by the machine there is practically no difference to that from good hand milking. It is in both cases a question of the precautions taken to ensure cleanliness and sterilization of utensils. Once a proper routine is established and maintained with the machine it is probable that it will, if anything, make for milk of a lower bacteriological count than the average from hand milkers, not all of whom can be relied on for either skill or carefulness. The human being working by hand can, no doubt, if he wishes, more quickly adjust himself to varying conditions and carry out any work to greater perfection, but the machine, within its limitationsnow, only trifling-is less liable to make

pay in any individual case must of course lepend on the size of herd, the amount paid for hand milking and other circumstances. But so far as one can gather from independent inquiry and actual results there need be no fear of difficulty in search of half a century.

Before purchasing a machine it would be well to obtain the "literature" of the different makers, for all makes are not alike. But though much can be learned from the very clear explanations given in manufacturers' circulars the intending buyer should also visit some one in his county or locality who has already a ma the users of different makes, having first read the literature of the manufacturers While taking every precaution to see that his money is invested in the best type of machine and get the opinions of actual users of recent makes, he should not pay much attention to the opinions of those who may have used older types and discarded them. A visit to present users will serve the triple purpose of deciding whether he should invest in a machine at all; if so, what machine he should buy and get some useful information as to the methool of operation.
