OLD I.R.A. LAND SETTLEMENT MEETING—At a meeting of the Old I.R.A. Land Settlement Committee in the 7th Barracks, Waterford, the secretary stated that official Old I.R.A. application forms had been received from Brigade secretary. Applicants for land were instructed to give the fullest particulars when completing these forms. In the course of a letter the Brigade secretary stated that the Land Commission had given an undertaking that in the event of a division of lands in any part of the County the Land Commission Inspectors would interview him regarding Old I.R.A. applicants.

The meeting considered this satisfactory arrangement as it eliminated all danger of victimisation of Old I.R.A. men. The committee wished to emphasise that there is no truth in the rumours in circulation to the effect that the Old I.R.A. do not favour granting parcels of land to un-economic holders and cottiers who reside in the vicinity of estates acquired for division. In the case of landless men, however, preference for those who fought in the wars of Independence will be demanded. It was stated that the lands of Ballydonagh, recently visited by Inspectors, will probably be acquired for division in the near future. Members of the committee pointed out that as Fianna Fail orations gave an undertaking at the elections to divide these lands they would scarcely have the hardihood to return after an interval of five years and ask votes if the promises were not fulfilled. The Batt. delegate appointed to attend the next Brigade meeting were instructed to seek all possible support from the Brigade committee in the matter of land division. Arrangements were made for public meetings at an early date for the purpose of reminding the Fianna Fail of the glowing promises made in regard to land division at the elections five years ago.

FLOODED FARMS

Tenants Meet

The Rev. J. Aberne, C.C., Ballymacoda, presided at a meeting at Youghal on Saturday evening of the tenant farmers from the neighbourhood, whose lands were seriously flooded owing to neglected breaches in embankments. Amongst those present were:—P. Walsh, Abavine; Mrs. O'Brien Neville, do.; Mrs. Fitzgerald, do.; Charles Lynch, Shanahiel, Maurice Lynch, do.; Mrs. Cunningham, Muckridge, Miss Beausang, do.; Roger Motherway, Clonpriest; Wm. Beausang, do.; Ed. Loughlin, Shanahiel; Wm. Walsh, do.; John Kenefick, do.; Wm. Beausang, Clonpriest; John Cashman, Cressmore, etc.

Mr. Wm. J. Broderick, T.D., Chairman of the Council, was also present.

The Rev. Chairman said the object of this meeting was to call public attention to the very serious grievances under which they laboured, and to see if some remedy could not be found. With that object they had invited their esteemed Dal representative, Mr. Broderick, to attend. It was a shocking and unjust state of things that while a considerable portion of their lands was rendered utterly useless through flooding owing to damaged embankments, they should be pursued

and summoned for the full amount of their annuities and rates.

Those present then individually gave details of the extent of the damage done by flooding, showing that from 23 up to 80 acres were rendered useless in the various cases. One said that the floods came up almost to her front door.

Another stated that a demand for £117 rates had been made, in face of the fact that 60 acres were covered. In one case the tenant at one time farmed 59 acres. Now 40 were flooded with the result that he had to seek work elsewhere to support his family. It was stated that practically all the embankments from Croompann Bridge to Gurtavaddi Cross were down for a considerable time, with the result, as one of them said "some of them were farmers only when the tide was out" (laughter).

Mr. Broderick said they had justice and equity on their side, but unfortunately the law was against them. The County Council had already passed a unanimous resolution asking that their claim for relief be considered, but it was turned down by the Department. Nevertheless, he would do all in his power to bring the question to a successful issue.

It was decided to draw up a Memorial to the Land Commission and the Government asking that an Inspector be sent down to investigate the conditions complained of.

A cordial vote of thanks to Mr. Broderick, closed the proceedings.

Clerk's Visit to Department

The Clerk gave an account of his visit to the Department in connection with the Sea Wall and other matters, which was declared satisfactory.

Several members complimented the Clerk on his action.

Mr. Power—The Clerk has had the interests of the town at heart the whole way through.

Mr. Macnamara—It is only what was expected.

New Bungalow

Mr. M. Hannan, Greencloyne, submitted plans, etc., of a bungalow he proposed to have built.

They were referred to the Town Surveyor.

Dances

The Chairman said it was becoming a case of dance night after night, Tuesday Wednesday, Thursday and Friday every week.

The names of the three applicants were then put in a hat and the hall granted to the first drawn.

Rent Arrears

The L.G. wrote asking what was the effect of the Notice to Quit served on tenants in arrears over 8 weeks.

The Clerk said that 8 out of 11 had made substantial payments on account. At present there were 14 tenants in arrears, owing from 4 weeks to 16 weeks.

The Clerk was directed to send warning notices demanding immediate payments.

Seaford Road Sewer

A letter was read from Messrs. Hodnett, solr., regarding the sewer on the Main Road, the pipe being laid in the mound at the side. Their opinion was that, three houses being connected, it became a public sewer, and it was the duty of the Council to attend to it.

Acknowledgment

A letter was read from Mr. E. P. Lynch, U.D.C., thanking the Council for their kind vote of sympathy on the death of his uncle, Mr. T. Nagle, Cork.

Strand Water Main

A letter was read from the Cleansing Co., who had scoured the water main on the Strand, stating that a quantity of their dissolving fluid had been wasted owing to a defect in the Railway connection. They estimated the loss at £20.

The Clerk was directed to bring the matter before the Railway Company.

The Chairman said he was glad to say that the job was done with most satisfactory results.

The Clerk said the Town Surveyor was very pleased with the result. He was sub-

mitting a report for next meeting.

On the proposition of Mr. Ahern, seconded by Mr. McCarthy, a vote of sympathy was passed to the relatives of the late Mr. E. Fitzgerald, McCurtainstown. A similar vote was passed to Mr. R. Morgan, North Main Street and family, on the sad death of his wife.

PETROL PUMP LICENSE CASE AT YOUGHAL

At Youghal Court, before Mr. G. P. Farrell, D.J., Mr. M. Sheehan, Devonshire Square, Youghal, was charged with maintaining a petrol pump on the public road without a license from the Co. Council, under the L.G. Act, 1925, Section 35.

Supt. Kelly, prosecuted and Mr. J. N. R. Macnamara, solr., defended.

Mr. D. Flynn, B.E., Assistant County Surveyor, stated that the Square was portion of the Cork-Waterford road, and as such was under the jurisdiction of the Co. Council for maintenance. He produced the Minister's Order declaring that the portion of the Cork-Waterford road in the Urban District of Youghal was a main road under the L.G. Act of 1925. The pump in question was erected in the Square and projected 16" into the public road.

Cross-examined by Mr. Macnamara—He denied that Mr. Sheehan or Mr. E. J. Halpin, Devonshire Arms, had been maintaining and repairing the Square for many years past. He had never noticed them doing any such repairs. The Co. Council removed a water trough from the Square some years ago and carried out some repairs there since.

Mr. Macnamara raised the point that the maintenance of the Square was actually carried out by his client and Mr. Halpin, and that the Co. Council did nothing there. It could not be regarded as portion of the public road as there was no traffic there and had originally been derelict where rubbish was thrown and with no proper surface for traffic. He submitted the onus was on the prosecution to prove that the duty of maintaining the Square was vested in the Co. Council and that they had not discharged that onus.

The defendant stated that he had resided on the Square for 30 years. When he first went there it was not surfaced or maintained by anyone. Since the removal of the trough Mr. Halpin and he had surfaced the Square with tar and gravel at their own expense. The Co. Council did nothing to the Square.

Cross-examined by the Superintendent—He said he might have applied for a license from the Co. Council some years ago, but that was in respect of a pump in a different position.

Mr. Macnamara submitted that where a series of Acts had been carried out over a great many years there was a legal presumption that these Acts had a lawful origin, and must be attributed to some right or duty of that person. Mr. Sheehan had proved that he and Mr. Halpin had maintained the surface of the Square for many years, and he submitted that that evidence rebutted the claim of the Co. Council to be the authority on which the maintenance was vested.

The Justice said he could not agree that the Acts and any private persons took away from the jurisdiction of the Co. Council and he felt bound to hold that Devonshire Square was vested in the Co. Council.

Defendant was fined 4/- with 16/- expenses.

The importance of having gilts well-nourished and reared under healthy conditions is strongly advised so that they may be ready for service at about eight to nine months.

The Farrowing Pen

The feeding of the sow during the last month of pregnancy is important, and the composition of a suggested ration is set out. The farrowing pen should be sufficiently roomy to accommodate the sow and her litter, and the minimum dimensions of a farrowing pen are given.

HAY FOR DAIRY COWS

Probably no feeding stuff has been used so extensively and over so long a period as hay; and it is strange, therefore, that generally speaking, its relative feeding value is not better appreciated, and that comparatively few farmers either handle it or feed it to cattle with the intelligence that efficient use demands.

POTATO BLACKENING

Causes to be Investigated

At the Rothamstead Experimental Station representatives of the British Ministry of Agriculture, the Agricultural Research Council, and the Potato Marketing Board discussed with the scientific experts of Rothamstead and the Plant Physiology Research Institute the final details of an

extensive investigation of the problem of the blackening of potatoes.

The tendency of potatoes to blacken on cooking or steaming is a hindrance to consumption, and though some more or less spasmodic attempts have been made to probe the cause or causes, no really thorough investigation has so far been carried out.

A three-year programme is contemplated, and simultaneously the more fundamental aspects of potato physiology in relation to blackening will be studied by a biochemist attached to the Physiology Institute's staff, from funds provided by the Potato Board.
