"THE POOR SCHOLAR"

PATRICK DENN OF CAPPOQUIN

Mr. Sean O'Flonin, of Carrick-on-Suir, has the following interesting article on Religious Teaching and Gaelic Cathed-isms 120 years ago, in the "Examiner."

In the years between the Catholic Relief Act (1793) and the establishment of the National Schools in 1831, while Catholics might teach and learn as they wished, there were no school buildings in the rural districts, no books, and no teachers outside of the priests and the "hedge schoolmaster" the latter was usually the clerk of the church, catechist helping the priest on Sunday after Mass, and a general factotum in the parish.

Patrick Denn, of Cappoquin, was the most notable of these catechists in the districts between Cappoquin and Clonmel. He wrote for his Christian Doctrine pupils at Cappoquin in Irish a Catechism and Explanation of the Mass and the Ten Commandments, a work on the Rosary, and Prayers for the Dying and Dead, Irish Hymns, a poem of about 200 verses (Eachtra an Bhaic), a dialogue between Death and the Sinner, and he translated into Irish Dr. Challoner's "Think Well On It."

That scholarly worker with boundless energy and enthusiasm, Rev. P. Power, M.K.A., D.Litt., University College, Cork, has rescued poor Patrick Denn's name and good work for religion and for the Irish language from the obscurity into which they had been allowed to sink. This is but one of the long list of debts of gratitude we owe to Rev. Canon Power for his work on behalf of Gaelic scholarships and forgotten Deise Gaelic and neglected men of note, scholars and churchmen.

We have before us as we write two little books printed by John Hackett, Clonmel, one in 1818, and the other in 1819. Both are printed in Roman (commonly called English) type. No. 1 is a little book of 49 pages, 4 in. by 2 1/2 in.; it is written by Patrick Denn, of Cappoquin, and the title page reads: "Leabhar Beag na Rosaries, Mar anois leis na Laoidin agus Le Tuirt Suan an Anama ag dul go Eit." (The Little Book of the Rosaries together with Litanies and the Departing of the Dying Soul). At the end of the title page we read: "Air na chúir i gCloí Seáyan Acaoya, Leabhar Reiceoir, a gCluainmeala, annsó mbliayain do avís an Tiarne 1818" (printed by John Hackett, Bookseller, Clonmel in the year of Our Lord, 1818).
