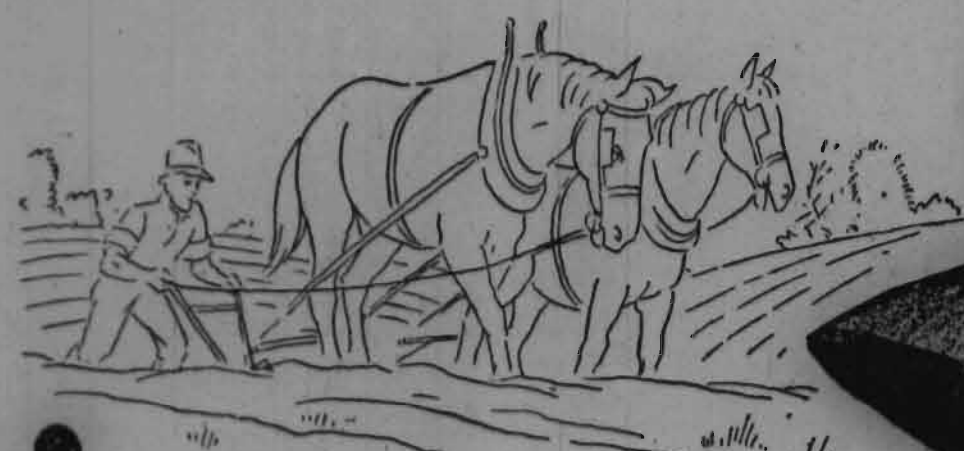

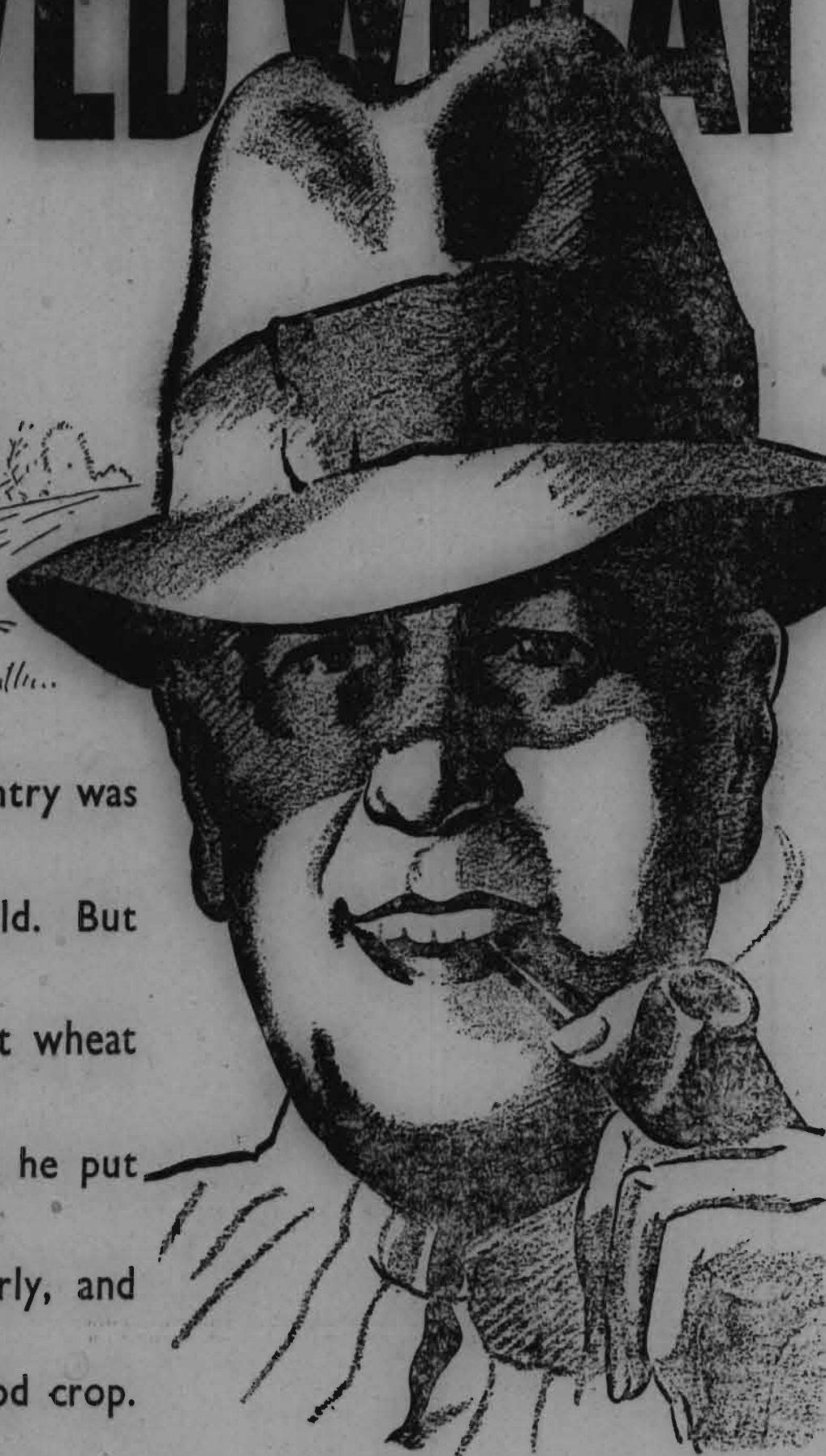

LEAGUE OF THE CROSS YOUGHAL

"Civic Spirit"

At the usual fortnightly meeting of the Debating Class, a very interesting paper on "Civic Spirit" was read by Mr. J. N. R. Macnamara, solicitor. Having defined his subject as "the realisation by the members of an organised community of their duties to the community, and the fulfilment of those duties," he dealt with the first aspect as public co-operation in the enforcement of the law—the very essence of civic spirit and, indeed, the foundation of civilised life. That did not mean that everyone should be a kind of public spirited Sherlock Holmes, but merely that they should give the police every assistance in their power in the detection of a crime. In Ireland, the commonest and most serious defect in that respect was the "Informers Complex," any person giving such information to the authorities by looking upon as a spy and a traitor. That extraordinary attitude was due to their unhappy history, when their laws were enacted and enforced by an alien tyranny. Those suffering from that complex were enemies of society and anarchist in spirit. In that they compared unfavourably with their neighbour, England, where help was given to the authorities in connection with serious crime. Again, juries were notoriously lenient in cases of serious crime, not referring to

the political cases, where there might be some intimidation. In France, the perpetrator of a "crime passionnal" need never fear the guillotine. Were their Irish juries going to follow suit? Another very important aspect of Civic Spirit was respect of public property. Here was one of the best tests of ascertaining whether the people had a proper civic or community spirit. There was a certain perverted type of mentality which revelled in destruction at one end of the scale the anarchists of Spain destroying churches, etc., at the other those wretched individuals at home who smashed public street lamps, trees, etc., they were "Public Enemies No. 1." Others defaced public property with political slogans, worthy only of half-wits. Here again they compared unfavourably with other countries. Civic Spirit found another important outlet in improving and beautifying their towns. The civic motto in many small towns seemed to be "What was good enough for our grandfathers is good enough for us." It was better to progress and make mistakes than not to progress at all. It was not only a civic, but a Christian duty to do away with slums at any cost. Ornamental work should not be taken up till the slum problem was seriously tackled. In their buildings they should look for guidance to artistic nations like France and Italy, and not to the coal-fields of England. Another way of beautifying the town was by tree-planting in public places, creating as far as possible a veritable "rus in urbe." Civic Spirit could be fostered by

(1) Education; (2) Propaganda and (3) Punishment for civic misconduct. The future citizen was crammed with subjects, which, however ornamental, were absolutely useless to him in 99 cases out of 100, when he left school. Their whole conception of education needed revising. In a properly organised State lessons in Civic Spirit would be second only in importance to Religious Instruction. He recommended various methods of propaganda—public notices, pamphlets asking citizens to respect their own property and drawing attention to abuses. Concluding, they should remember that their own old town was second to none amongst Irish towns for its storied past, its historical buildings, its quaint and picturesque streets and its beautiful situation. They had a heritage which they should guard jealously and they should show by their Civic Spirit that they were worthy citizens of such a great old town.

NEW POINT-TO-POINT RULE

The Cork and West Waterford gathering of point-to-point horseowners and farmers, who recently sent a deputation to the Irish National Hunt Stewards to seek the deletion of Rule 29 of the new rules for point-to-points and failed, met in Cork on Saturday. The rule in question laid down that the minimum weight should be not less than 12st except in the case of cobs or the races confined to lady riders, when it should be not less than 11st 7 lbs.

Mr. G. Heskin, Tallow, presided at Saturday's meeting, and Mr. J. Cronin, Boherbue, Banteer, acted as secretary.

In the course of a discussion, it was complained that the deputation to Dublin did not get the opportunity of putting their views before the Committee of the National Hunt who had to decide it, but had to address themselves to the three stewards. They believed that when a vote was taken on their application that they were only defeated by a narrow majority, and if they had been able to address the committee, they believed they would have won their case. The view of the stewards was that the only objection to the rule was that from Cork, and they could not make a special rule for Cork. The meeting reiterated the views expressed at previous meetings that the new rule was the greatest possible hardship on owners of young horses, and it was eventually decided on the suggestion of Mr.

IRISH BRIGADE FOR SPAIN

HEADED by General O'Duffy, fifty young Irishmen have left for Spain to fight with the Patriotic Forces.

Before his departure from Dublin for Spain General O'Duffy issued the following message to the Irish people:—
"You ask me for a message to the Irish people at the moment of my departure for Spain. Such messages are too often tainted by political interests, and I am conscious of no personal right entitling me to make any statement. But since the struggle in defence of the Faith began in Spain, and realising its paramount importance not only to Spain but to Ireland and the entire Christian world, I have ceased all social and political manifestations, and have concentrated on one thing alone—on helping the cause of Christian Spain. I may, therefore, be held justified in giving a simple message to my fellow-Irishmen, as I do not, and cannot speak alone, but only in the name of, and for all who, equally with myself, share and will share, the dangers and, I hope, the glories of this venture."

"We are leaving tonight for the Christian Front, and, to quote the words of a distinguished priest of the Limerick Diocese last Sunday, 'Irishmen had taken part in the Crusades of other days, and the Irish Legion of today will, please God, lead in the march on Barcelona,' to the strains of the 'Faith of Our Fathers,' and place the Cross of Christ the King high over that city, where every priest has been slain and where every church is a shambles. 'We are leaving for a battlefield, and now words seem in a sense to have no great significance, for we have entered on that phase when action will speak far louder. Intensely conscious of my own responsibilities and, moved by the realisation of the personal sacrifice and the consequent individual greatness of every Volunteer, I am reminded of Lincoln's simple words at Gettysburg: 'The world will little note nor long remember what we say here, but it can never forget what they did here.' Applying this sentiment to the occasion, I may note or remember what we say now; but none can forget what our Volunteers now offer to Spain, and, through Spain, to the Christian world."

"Let our message then be an appeal to fellow Irishmen to reserve judgment, even when they cannot, or will not, understand our motive or our object."

"Our motive is simple, our object is definite. The motive of Christianity, and the object is defence of Christianity; both are deep-rooted in the traditions of our race and inseparable from any true conception of the Irish nature. This being so, I see no reason to depart from my first judgment that Communism in Ireland can best be attacked on the Spanish front; rather has my judgment been confirmed by the contracts made abroad and by authoritative opinions received at home."

It becomes increasingly evident that the Spanish War represent the first massed attack of International Communism against Christianity, and especially against the Catholic Church, which being International, stands as the obstacle to the world domination of Bolshevism. But yet

Hyde (Fermoy) to present a memorial to the Stewards and National Hunt Committee at their meeting in January, the purpose of the memorial being to request that the terms of Rule 29 be not applicable to County Cork and West Waterford. It was decided to invite all connected with the sport in Munster, including Point-to-Point Committees to join the Association, and the subscription was fixed at 5/- per annum.

A general meeting of the new body will be held in the near future for the purpose of electing officers and committee and to decide the scope of its activities. I would not have urged any Irishman to

go to the assistance of Christian Spain were I not persuaded that the war in that country, is the opening action in the long expected clash of the new barbarism and the ancient Christian civilisation; and were I not convinced that the motive of the Patriotic leaders in Spain is genuinely Christian and their fundamental object the defence of Christian civilisation.

Of this I was abundantly convinced from personal contact with the Patriotic leaders, even as the world also was, or should have been, convinced by General Franco's declaration of policy made on his appointment as head of the Government.

In this historic declaration of the rights of man in Spain he solemnly and specifically undertakes to establish a system of Government based upon the tenets of Christianity, and formed in accordance with the principles of the Papal Encyclicals.

In my recollection this is the first occasion, on which the head of a State, in modern times, has so declared his definite adhesion to the Christian ideal of State, in Constitution and Government. It brings the wheel round full cycle to the mediaeval ages, of faith, the fraternal cooperation of the Guilds, the harmony between capital and labour, and Christian morality in administration and in the social life.

Perhaps history was intended by Providence to repeat itself, just as when the infidel with the different weapons of heresy began to create confusion and dissension in the world, a ricocheting cannon-ball in Pamplona wounded a Spanish knight—Ignatius of Loyola—and from Spain arose three members of the Society of Jesus who stopped and rolled back the waves of heresy.

And so in our time the hammer and sickle of the Bolsheviks begin to rise on the horizon, again we find the Cross raised against these atheistic emblems in Spain.

We, of the Irish Brigade, are convinced that Christianity, which is our faith and heritage, is being deliberately attacked on the Spanish Front, and we consider it our duty to fight with our Spanish brothers for a common cause. As to the rest we can afford to await the future judgment of our fellow-Christians, with the same calm as we expect the present condemnation of our opponents.

MR. BELTON IN SPAIN

"Government" Run by Agents of Russia

The Irish Christian Front has received from Salamanca the following message from Mr. Belton:—

I have made arrangements for long service message each day. After a terrific passage of seven days at sea, I came ashore at Lisbon at 3.30 p.m. on Saturday. I was met at the boat by the Spanish Minister and the Mayor of Lisbon. I was very warmly received. On Sunday morning I left for Salamanca by car. It was a journey of nearly 400 miles through the mountain ranges of Northern Portugal. I reached the Spanish frontier at sunset and arrived in Salamanca about 10 o'clock. There I found a complete war atmosphere. After having supper I went to bed for the first real sleep for nine days in the course of which I had covered 1,500 miles. I was up early the next day and with the Rector, watched from the balcony of the Irish College a display of aerial force. I counted 24 planes high in the sky, moving in formation. It was a thrilling sight. The sky was quite clear, and it was like a May day in Ireland. The planes faded out of sight towards Madrid. During the day I had several interviews with leading men in Salamanca, and the authorities conveyed to me the thanks of Christian Patriot Spain to the Irish Christian Front for its sympathy and support. Hotel accommodation, car and all other facilities I require have been placed at my disposal.

The tide of battle in Madrid—120 miles away—is the topic of conversation. Good progress was made by the National Army today. There are over 30,000 hostages in Madrid, and many thousands have been shot already. For every bombardment of the city a number of prisoners have been shot. In the next few days I will be able to send you particulars of conditions before and subsequent to the revolution. In the areas which the Reds control they have seized factories, the orange crop and the merchandise generally from its rightful owners. Ireland has clearly expressed itself in support of the Christian cause in Spain.

GIVING MEDICINE TO HORSES
 Physic, in the case of horses, is frequently very much abused. Some physic their horses at stated intervals, whether medicine is required or not; others as fancy dictates, in order, as they say, to prevent the horse from getting out of order. Unless there is absolute necessity for giving medicine, its use should be rigidly avoided; and even when the animal does appear a little out of order there are many cases when the mere preparation for physic will produce all the effects required.
 Taking it for granted that the horse really requires medicine, a course of preparation is necessary before the physic is administered. This consists of giving him bran mash for a period of not less than twenty-four and up to forty-eight hours, and, if the case is slight, these mashes, being in themselves laxative, will frequently be all that is required.
 Physic is usually administered to a horse in the form of a ball, which is given on an empty stomach, followed by a drink of tepid water, or water from which the chill has been removed, by keeping it near the kitchen fire for some time, then a warm bran mash, and half an hour to an hour's exercise. The horse should have as much tepid water as he will drink, and gentle exercise may also be given.
 Considerable nicety is required in administering a ball, which should be rather of a soft consistency, and about the size of a pullet's egg. In administering it, the operator stands before the horse, which is unbound, and turned with its head out of the stall, and having a halter
