While "Hidden Page" had previously won several races on the Clonmel Greyhound Track, this was her first appearance at an Open meeting, so that she had never coursed a real hare as distinct from the electrically-driven substitute, and her fine performance on her first outing at Open Coursing gives every promise of even better performances in the future. NEED FOR CATHOLIC APOSTOLATE OF C.Y.M.S.

Very Rev. A. M. Crofts, O.P., Prior, Waterford, in the course of a lecture to a crowded congregation in St. Mary's Church, Cahir, in connection with the proposed establishment of a C.Y.M.S. branch, said from the beginning the C.Y.M.S. was dedicated to the Holy Mother of God. Being solidly founded on religion and strengthened through its devotion to Mary, the C.Y.M.S. fulfils the first condition for the achievement of its supreme purpose, namely, to take part in the campaign of Catholic Action. It has received its mandate for this from the Bishops of Ireland.

This official recognition gives a wonderful dignity to the entire movement, and an extraordinary privilege to each member. Henceforth members enter into the apostolate which was first established by the Divine Master and given to the Apostles and their successors.

The Holy Father had defined it as "Participation in the apostolate of the Hierarchy." This apostolate raises the organism above the trivial things of life above political rancour, above all class distinction.

Every day the need becomes more evident; the clash between the powers of good and evil is apparent. Countries that have forgotten the spiritual, that have allowed evil to grow up in their midst, no matter how Catholic they appeared to be, are now drenched in blood, but Christ will conquer as of old but will conquer through His Church, through His Vicar on Earth.

HOW WAGES ACT WILL WORK

An outline of the manner in which it is proposed to operate the Agricultural Wages Act was conveyed to the meeting of Co. Dublin Committee of Agriculture (Mr. R. Blake, Co. C. presiding), when a letter was read from the Department of Agriculture which invited co-operation in the setting up of area committees.

For the purpose of the Act, the communication from the Department stated, it was proposed to divide the Saorstát into a number of "wages districts," which will be grouped into a smaller number of "wages areas." For each "wages area" a committee is to be established comprising representatives of each of the "wages districts" included in the area, one half of which will be representative of the agricultural employers and the other half of the agricultural workers.

The fixing of minimum rates of wages for agricultural workers in the districts comprising the "wages area" will, however, devolve upon the Central Agricultural Wages Board to be established under the Act, but this Board is required before fixing minimum rates of wages for any "wages district" to consult the Committee for the "wages area" and to consider any recommendations that Committee may make.

The meeting decided to submit to the Department a panel of suitable nominees to act for the Dublin area.

Going to Zurich to Consult Eye Specialist

Mr. de Valera has gone to Zurich to consult Dr. Vogt, the specialist regarding his eyes. It is stated that there is no cause for anxiety regarding the condition of Mr. de Valera's eyesight.

On his return from Switzerland last May it was explained that he would go back after an interval for an examination on the result of the operation performed by Dr. Vogt on March 26.

DAIRY INDUSTRY

World Congress To Be Held At Berlin

The Eleventh World Dairy Congress will be held in Berlin from August 22nd to 28th. The problems to be handled by this Congress will deal with milk production, the milk industry in the tropics, the processing and the improvement of milk, legal measures, the sale of milk and dairy products, sales propaganda, instruction in the management of dairies and factories, and general training. The International Dairy Exhibition, which will be connected with the Congress, will comprise a national exhibit, an international competition for dairy products and an industrial action. There will also be a number of special exhibits, giving a survey of the historical development of the dairying industry and the methods of publicity employed in the various countries for stimulating milk consumption.

Countless numbers bear grateful testimony to the extraordinary spiritual and temporal blessings bestowed upon them through St. Philomena's intercession; and we are confident that Irish Catholics will welcome this opportunity of making some return for the many favours secured through her help, and form an Association of her clients to render the Shrine at Mount Melleray worthy of the great Saint and worthy of the wonderful traditions of Mount Melleray.

U. S. NEUTRALITY
President's Address To Congress

An addition to the present United States Neutrality Act as a result of the "unfortunate civil strife in Spain," was announced by President Roosevelt in his annual message to Congress.

He also indicated that he did not intend to challenge the Supreme Court by means of a constitutional amendment. The vital need, he said, is not the alteration of our fundamental law, but an increasingly enlightened view with reference to it. It is not to be assumed that there will be a prolonged failure to bring legislative and judicial into closer harmony.

The galleries and doorways were crowded and all possible accommodation taken up when President Roosevelt came in to speak. He was received with bursts of cheering.

Congress passed the Spanish Arms Embargo Resolution, but meanwhile the Spanish steamer, Mar Cantabrico, loaded with arms for Spain, had sailed.

A Coastguard aeroplane and cutter halted her off Sandy Hook, but she was later allowed to proceed on her way.

NOTE TO GENEVA
Valencia Government's Protest
MADRID SHELLED

The Valencia Government has sent a note to the League of Nations protesting against German naval activities in Spanish waters. The Parish Newspapers are advocating an Anglo-French blockade of the Spanish coast to prevent further German and Italian intervention, though one of these remarks that "in certain circles in England the view is held that French non-intervention is at present imaginary."


Another Parish paper declares that Hitler has decided to assure the victory of General Franco at all costs.

A London telegram states that the British Government has given no consideration to the question of a Franco-British blockade. The main object of British diplomacy, it is stated, is to obtain as rapidly as possible an international ban on volunteers for Spain.

The British Ambassador in Berlin called at the German Foreign Office on Wednesday to inquire how soon it would be possible to obtain the German reply to the non-intervention proposals.

A New Year of Gaelic activity opens before us. The achievements, failures and disappointments of 1936 are already fading into the mists of the Past and the anxieties and concerns of the Gael are directed towards the problems of future progress and development. "Hope Springs Eternal in the Human Breast." Full well does your hurler and footballer "lay this flattering unction to his soul." No matter how bitterly the gall of defeat may have tasted a few short months before, no matter how deeply the old Club may have sunk into the slough of despond, with the coming of January a new spirit of endeavour appears to pervade the Gaelic mind everywhere. Feverish activities consume Club officials, organisations are lightened up, finances are adjusted, policy and programmes are debated and an exhaustive census of the probable playing strength is taken.

He fumes and frets like a high-class hunter for the physical activity of the field of action. The tactical manoeuvrings and the oratorical excesses so typical of the ordinary convention, leave him cold. He craves the thrill of combat and the call of the flying ball. His general attitude to officialdom carries much of the lofty cynical disregard which the Colum fighter of 1920 and 1921 affected towards the politicians.

The Munster Council met in Limerick on Saturday last, and selected the teams to represent Munster in the Inter-Provincial Competitions. It affords much pleasure to see that the rapid revival of Decies hurling prestige has been recognised to the extent of conferring playing honours on two Waterford hurlers, Christy Moylan of Dungarvan and John Keane of Mount Sion. The whole county will heartily endorse this tribute to two players who have already won their spurs in League hurling. It is significant that both players are very young men, Moylan being twenty-one, whilst Keane has not yet celebrated his twentieth birthday. I make bold to say that Keane is the youngest hurler that was ever honoured in this way—he is the first hurler in his teens to represent Munster and this in itself is a record of which Waterford may justly be proud. Here is the full Munster hurling line-out to meet Connacht in Ennis on February 14th 1937.

The reserves are:—McMahon and D. Cloghessy (Limerick); O'Callaghan (goal) and Loughmane (Clare); W. Wall and J. Ryan (Tipp.) and Sean Barrett (Cork). Few will quarrel with the team as arranged—it is a powerful combination of lusty youth. Hennessey is the only veteran starred, and his choice as full forward in preference to the brawny McMahon is in the nature of a surprise.

The appeal of Tallow against the Waterford Co. Board's action in overruling their objection to Mount Sion was also dealt with. Much additional evidence was produced by Tallow in support of their case and accepted as admissible by the Council. As this evidence had not been before the Waterford Board in its trial of the case, the matter was referred to their jurisdiction with instructions to re-open the investigation of the objection in the light of the new evidence submitted. Tallow were instructed to produce the relevant witnesses and the Waterford County Board was authorised to examine them. The player, Patrick O'Connor of Mount Sion, whose status is the subject of appeal, is to be instructed to appear at the resumed trial. Father Hamilton and the other Clare delegates pressed strongly to award the appeal to Tallow. John Joe Sheehy criticised such a suggestion, contending that it would be most unjust to the Waterford Chairman and Board and would react unfavourably on their authority and prestige. The majority concurred with John Joe's view and, on a vote, the question was referred back as stated.

The action of the Senior Hurling Selection Committee in picking the team as early as December to represent the Decies in the next League has been adversely commented on in some quarters particularly by a City Contemporary. "Absurd to select a team two months in advance" quoth they. Nevertheless, the Leinster Council selected their Provincial teams ten weeks before their matches. Why? Obviously to give the players timely notice so that they should be quite fit and ready. A similar progressive step by the Waterford Committee is decided. It is even hinted that some subtle manoeuvre is at the bottom of it. The tortuous intriguing mind is incapable of appraising honest straight-forward action.

In the event of an Applicant failing to procure a Premium Bull, the deposit so made shall be forfeited.

The Committee shall not select any applicant who has an uncharged liability to the Co. Council on foot of rates for the financial year ended 31st March, 1936.
