ABATEMENT OF RATES ON  
AGRICULTURAL LAND

EMPLOYMENT ALLOWANCES

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN, that forms, on which claims for abatement of rates in respect of male persons (17-70 years of age) at work during the whole of the year 1936, have been issued to every rated occupier of land whose holding (or combined holdings) in the County Health District exceeds £20 a year rateable valuation.

Any occupier of agricultural land exceeding £20 in valuation, who has not received a form, should notify the undersigned immediately.

An Employment Allowance by way of abatement of rates will not be allowed in the financial year commencing on the 1st April, 1937, unless a claim is made on the form provided by the County Council.

Every occupier who makes a claim will receive an acknowledgment of receipt of claim. If no acknowledgment is received in due course, a notification should be sent to the undersigned.

A false return made with a view to obtaining an abatement of rates renders the person making it liable to prosecution.

**TALLOW NEWS**

**Sewerage Scheme—**  
Since Mr. J. E. Bowen, B.E., has been appointed County Engineer, we feel sure that the proposed Sewerage Scheme for Tallow will now be definitely speeded up. This matter is very urgent, as the present system is so ancient that it may be stated, that it is completely obsolete, and it is a frightful state of affairs that the street in which the Male National Schools are situated is completely without any means to dispose of sewerage.

It is difficult to understand how it is that Tallow, has been so long neglected, from a Public Health point of view, and it is earnestly hoped that 1937 will see the undertaking put through to the satisfaction of all concerned.

Knowing the record of Mr. Bowen in connection with other County Schemes we feel assured that once he has started on Board of Health work he will not overlook the urgent necessity of putting Tallow on an equal status as far as sewerage conditions go, with the other towns in the County.

**Death Of Mr. John Mackey, Fountain—**  
We regret to announce the death of Mr. John Mackey, which took place on the 10th inst., at his residence Fountain, Tallow. Deceased was over ninety years old, the major portion of which he was employed on the Moorehill Estate, Tallow. He was father of the late Volunteer Thomas Mackey, Cork No. 2 Brigade, who was one of the last soldiers of the Irish Republican Army, to give his life in the Civil War, for the cause of Irish Freedom.

**'Flu Epidemic—**  
This has been raging in Tallow and district since the first of the New Year, and it certainly has not been a very nice New Year's Gift. Almost seven-eighths of the population have been stricken down with it, entire households in many cases, neighbours having to render what assistance they could to alleviate the distress caused in such cases.

Friends and relatives who were called in to render succour were themselves stricken with the malady. The sparseness of the congregation who attended the Masses on the Feast of the Epiphany was particularly noticeable and indicated that the Epidemic was undoubtedly the cause.

The local doctor, who was in constant attendance on all the patients possible, also fell a victim, with the result that outside Medical Assistance had to be sought to relieve the distress.

Happily, the Epidemic seems to be on the wane, and the children's voices are again to be heard on the streets, indicating that the younger generation have recovered from the severe attack made on them, and can now render assistance to their parents and elders, who at great personal sacrifices and inconveniences kept on their feet during the period.

**DUNGARVAN BEAGLES**

Dur local pack met at Ballyetra Cross, on Sunday last and moved off at 12 o'clock sharp. Hounds had barely got into the Ballyetra Bogs when a fine hare was sighted and Tommy Kieky, carrying the horns, got the hounds immediately on the line. After racing through Gliddane they crossed the road and circled again to Ballyetra. The pack then tried Killadangan where two hares were put up together, this divided the pack but they were soon got right again. After a good run towards Ballinacough the hare wheeled to the right and crossed the road near Killadangan Bridge and up through Miss Hearne's farm and back and through Messrs. Beresford's and Morrissey's where hounds were called off. This was an exceptionally good run and was enjoyed by all the followers. Our huntsman proved himself very capable, and is as much at home on foot with the hounds as he is in the piskin on the flat and over fences.

**Repairs to Footpaths at Lismore—**

The residents of New Street, Lismore, should indeed be grateful to Mr. Bowen, Co. Surveyor, for the new scheme he has inaugurated for the repairing of footpaths in the town. As well as giving employment to a considerable number of men it has also filled the missing link to the beauty of the town.

Mr. John O'Sullivan, has ably supervised the work done in the town and the surrounding districts within the last 15 or 16 years. The residents of the town should highly appreciate the work done at present for their convenience under his expert supervision.

Over half a hundred delegates were present at the West Waterford Divisional Convention in Tallow last Sunday.

It was a Convention of Young men. Not four years present had passed their fortieth birthday.

Proceedings opened on a tame note. Discussion of the Accounts called forth some candid comments.

The disparity between net and gross "gate" returns was stressed. The match expenses, consisting of rent of field and cost of labour, seemed abnormally large in proportion to the takings.

Many delegates criticised the arrangement whereby alternate County Board meetings were held in Waterford City and maintained that it was a great injustice to the Western Board.

Despite the general wish of the assembly and the insistent appeals of many of his colleagues, Frank Ryan could not be prevailed upon to accept office for another year.

Hardly had he taken the Chair when sniping opened fire on an unexpected quarter. The new occupant was called on to account for being excessively chummy with one Paddy Moore, a Soccer international.

The unopposed re-election of Pax Wheeler as rumahide and Seamus Hayes as treasurer, passed almost unnoticed after the volcanic eruptions had subsided.

The result is unusual in that for the first time in many years, the Dungarvan Board has no representative on the County Board.

The motions scarcely caused a ripple. The delegates could see little virtue in operating the Parish Rule and refused by a big majority to endorse it.

Tom Ryan, whose logic at times is most disconcerting, caused no little flutter by elaborating the case of a "proxy" and insisting on getting a definition of the status of that shadowy figure.

The incorrigible jokers among the delegates commented dryly on the choice of a Temperance Hall as this year's meeting place.

It was arranged to receive affiliations up to and including Sunday, February 14th 1937. The Draw for all Championships in the Western Division will be held on that day at a meeting of the Popes in Dungarvan.

WATERFORD CO. COMMITTEE OF AGRICULTURE.

PREMIUMS TO BULLS, 1937.

The County Waterford Committee of Agriculture invite applications from persons intending to compete for Premiums to Bulls under the conditions set forth in the Department's Live Stock Schemes 1937 and who are prepared to purchase or exhibit such animals at any of the following Spring Shows or Sales approved by the Department.

Premiums will be as follows:— Pure-bred Registered Dairy Bulls (Class A) £20 Pure-bred Registered Dairy Bulls (Class B) £18 Half-bred Registered Dairy Bulls £16 Pure-bred Shorthorn Bulls £15 Aberdeen Angus and Hereford Bulls £12

The Committee shall have regard to the need for securing the location of an adequate number of bulls of the Shorthorn (including Dairy Shorthorn) Breed. Towards this end the Committee shall allocate at least one-third of the available Premiums for bulls of that breed.

The Committee require all Applicants for Premiums to deposit with their applications £2, such deposit to be refunded in case the Applicant is not selected by the Committee or if he procures a Premium Bull. In the event of an Applicant failing to procure a Premium Bull, the deposit so made shall be forfeited.

The Committee shall not select any applicant who has an undischarged liability to the Co. Council on foot of rates for the financial year ended 31st March, 1936.

Applications on Forms, which may be had from the undersigned, will be considered at a Meeting of the Committee to be held on the 23rd JANUARY, 1937.

amount of gross disease, but they have found a large number of children among every class of the population suffering from minor defects, due to wrong diet. The staple diet of a large amount of our population might be said to be bread and tea, a small quantity of butter—especially in the winter months and an excessive quantity of sugar.

Now, this diet is altogether inadequate. I know of my own knowledge that it is impossible in rural areas to get a sufficient quantity of milk for families in winter. If it was only for the sake of the health of our own people alone, large scale winter dairying should be encouraged. Education should be directed to the importance of having more cows and better cows in full milk during the winter months, and to the value of milk, butter and cheese in protecting the body against disease.

Granted some very easily attainable conditions, there is a hopeful future for our dairy farmers, there will be an increasing demand in Great Britain for dairy products which, due to the fertility of our land we can supply at a lower cost and of a better quality than any other country. By increasing our milk yield, improving our marketing and cultivating better relations with Great Britain, we can have a market for all the dairy products we are able to export (apart from).
