#### Killeagh Coursing Club

Up to the present the members of this popular coursing club have had their good sport at their meetings which on the whole, and taking into consideration the counter-attractions of the past few Sundays—have been fairly well attended. Some good courses have been witnessed, and though as yet only the outskirts of the district have been beaten a fair number of good hares have been found. #### A CANNED HISTORY OF CANNED FOODS

#### Cinema Strike Settled

A largely attended meeting was held in Lady Lane on Friday last to discuss the terms of settlement offered in connection with the threatened Waterford cinema strike. Mr. Dan O'Callaghan (Chairman of the Cinema section of the I. T. & G. W. U.) presided, and he had the assistance of Mr. T. Dunne, local Secretary, I. T. & G. W. U., and Mr. Frank Robbins, organiser, Dublin.

#### Strike Notice To Be Served

A meeting of the Bacon Curers' section of the Waterford branch of the I. T. & G. W. U. was held in the Town Hall this afternoon, and was addressed by Mr. Dom Sullivan, Head Office representative from Dublin. A ballot was taken on the question at issue between employers and employees.

#### LARGE ATTENDANCE AT DON BOSCO FILM

The Cinema at Carrickon-Suir, was full to the doors for the matinee and the night presentations of the film of the life and work of St. Don Bosco. The film was in charge of Rev. Father Ciantar of the Salesian Order, who gave an interesting lecture on the life and work of Don Bosco, who was born about 170 years ago and canonised four years ago.

#### Strike Threat in Bacon Factory

About 1,400 employees in the bacon curing industry in Cork, Waterford, Limerick, and Tralee, it is reported, threatened to strike on November 7, if their claims for national minimum rates are not met. It is thought that a stoppage would affect about 50 per cent. of the internal and export bacon trade of the Free State.

#### Food Tins First Used on a Large Scale

A typical issue was a long rectangular tin containing a stick of half chocolate and half pemmican. Iron rations were produced in small quantities as early as the Crimean War. There is still in existence a tin of bacon and vegetables packed by an Irish firm for the troops in 1885. Another tin of the same period was opened recently and the contents found to be perfectly good.

#### Investigations in Germany

The importance of the sugar beet as a source of feed for live stock is being seriously investigated in Germany. The crop of leaves and tops alone is estimated at about eight tons per acre, the equivalent of an average meadow. If no sugar is produced, but only high-grade beet slices, the farmer obtains—in addition to the tops and leaves—a feeding product the nutritive value of which is about the same as that of barley. Whether it would pay him to turn out feed slices as well as sugar would depend upon the price which the former could command.

#### SUGAR BEETS AS FEED FOR LIVE STOCK

More than 350 varieties of food-stuffs are marketed in cans today. Of these 25 varieties are home produced fruits and 35 are British vegetables. They are available all the year round. Canning has done away with seasons.

#### Canned Foods Have Since Been Used

variably in military and other expeditions. Parry's Arctic expedition of 1822 furnished dramatic evidence of their keeping qualities. Parry made a cache of canned goods which was found eight years later by Sir John Ross. The cans were brought back to England. In 1911—eighty-seven years later—they were opened. The contents—roast and boiled beef, vegetables and soups—were eaten and enjoyed. They were perfectly fresh.
