New machinery is being erected, new vats, new setting tanks and aerating plants, are being installed at the factory of Irish Tanners, Limited, Portlannington, in furtherance of the development policy now in progress in the Leather City and which includes a fifty per cent. increase in plant. The Company are at present manufacturing 75 per cent. of the sole

leather required for the home market, and as there are 35 boot and shoe factories in operation in Eire, it can be appreciated that the market for the Portlannington product is a wide one. The progress of Irish Tanners, Ltd., since its establishment in the erstwhile "Lost City" two and a half years ago has really been rapid.

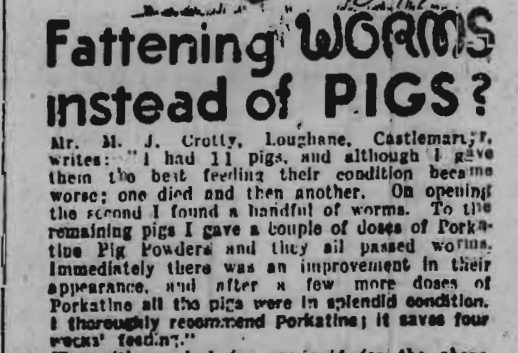

The County Waterford Committee of Agriculture invite applications from persons intending to compete for Premiums to Bulls under the conditions set forth in the Department's Live Stock Schemes 1938 and who are prepared to purchase or exhibit such Animals at any of the following Spring Shows or Sales approved by the Department:—

February 23rd and 24th—Cork Munster Agricultural Society's Sale.

March 1st, 2nd and 3rd—Dublin—Royal Dublin Society's Bull Sale.

March 22nd—Waterford—Irish Shorthorn Breeders Society Sale.

The Breeds of Bulls eligible for Premiums and the Values of such Premiums will be as follows:—

Pure-bred Registered Dairy Bulls (Class A) ... £20

Pure-bred Registered Dairy Bulls (Class B) ... £18

Half-bred Registered Dairy Bulls ... £16

Pure-bred Shorthorn Bulls ... £15

Aberdeen Angus and Hereford Bulls ... £12

In making selections, the Committee shall have regard to the need for securing the location of an adequate number of bulls of the Shorthorn (including Dairy Shorthorn) Breed. Towards this end the Committee shall allocate at least one-third of the available Premiums for bulls of that breed.

The Committee require all Applicants for Premiums to deposit with their applications £2, such deposit to be refunded in case the Applicant is not selected by the Committee or if he procures a Premium Bull. In the event of an Applicant failing to procure a Premium Bull, the deposit so made shall be forfeited.

The Water Supply Mr. Troy, Water Curator, reported that the height in the reservoir was 15' 6". The weekly supply to the Mental Hospital was 80,000.

The Clerk said the supply for the previous week was 83,000. When the Council decided on putting down a new main he wrote to the Hospital Authorities suggesting that it would be desirable to have the internal fittings overhauled as they were some 30 years in use and must, therefore, require replacing.

Mr. Savage asked if there had been an improvement in the supply since the discovery of fixing of the leak in Nile street.

The Curator said the water supply was much better since.

Vaccination The M.O.H. wrote stating that there were 35 children in the district over 3 months of age, who hadn't been vaccinated.

The Clerk said that a number of those had since been vaccinated.

A letter was read from Messrs. Hodnett and Son, solrs., regarding the steps to be taken against Mr. T. J. O'Donovan, who refused to have two of his children vaccinated.

Allotments The Clerk said he had received 33 applications for Allotments, as compared with 53 last year. That meant that 20 still had the implements supplied by the Council. What was to be done for their recovery?

Mr. Broderick—The cost of their recovery would be greater than their value.

Acknowledgment Mrs. Nellie O'Neill, Waterford, wrote thanking the Council for their kind vote of sympathy on the death of her husband.

ARDMORE DISTRICT COURT.

Before Mr. G. P. Farrell, D.J.

Congratulations

Before the ordinary business of the Court was taken up.

Mr. A. R. Farrell, solr., Dungarvan, tendered a cordial welcome to the District Justice, on his first appearance in that court after his marriage. On behalf of all his colleagues and himself, he wished his namesake many years of happiness and expressed the hope that they would have the pleasure of seeing him preside in their courts for a long time.

Superintendent Walsh, Dungarvan, on behalf of the Garda Síochána, availed of that opportunity to convey their sincerest congratulations to Justice Farrell on his happy event.

Mr. Sean O Broin, Court Clerk, asked to be associated with the good wishes extended to Mr. Farrell.

The District Justice said he accepted their kind wishes most gratefully, and hoped he would be left amongst the good people of that district for the rest of his time as District Justice.

Motor Cases John Mitchell, Dungarvan, was charged with having no road tax paid, and no insurance policy.

Supt. Walsh, Dungarvan, prosecuted, and Mr. A. R. Farrell, solr., Dungarvan, defended.

Mr. Farrell, pleading guilty, said there was a difference between the Insurance Company and the defendant regarding the bonus to be allowed him. Having had no accident for some years his client expected an increased allowance, which the Insurance Co., refused, on the occasion in question defendant was carrying an employee on the pillow. There was an accident, and Mr. Mitchell was the only one injured, sustaining a fractured leg.

As the Court could see he was still somewhat disabled. The tax had since been taken out for the full period.

Fining the defendant 1/- for having no road tax and 10/- for not having the Insurance policy, the Justice said he looked upon the question of Insurance as most important.

Guard M. J. Browne, charged Terence McLoughlin, Eglinward Road, Cork, with not having a driving license. Fined 2/6.

Guard Browne, charged John Lee and Francis Wise, the former with having no road tax and no driver's license, and the latter with having no road tax.

From the evidence it appeared that the car in question was left for repair, and was merely being tested on the two occasions it was held up by the Guards.

Wise was fined 20/- for having no road tax, and Lee was fined 1/- in each of the other charges.

Guard Ryan, charged Philip French, Kinsalebeg, with having no driving license, for a motor cycle, and Patk. Mulcahy, was charged in connection with the same machine with having no road tax, no policy of Insurance and no driving license.

From the evidence it appeared that the cycle in question was an old crock belonging to a man named McCarthy from Ardmore. Mulcahy stated they were trying it, and they had to push it along the road.

French was fined 1/- and Mulcahy 4/6 in the three charges.

Alleged Larceny A young man named Nicholas Terry, was charged in custody with the larceny of the property of Mrs. Alice Foley, Ballymacart.

Supt. Walsh, prosecuted, and Mr. A. R. Farrell, solr., defended.

After a protracted hearing, lasting over an hour, a number of witnesses having been examined and cross-examined.

Mr. Farrell asked for a direction, as there was no actual evidence against his client.

The Justice said he thought the evidence aroused suspicion, but there was not sufficient proof to put him on trial. Mr. Farrell was entitled to his direction. The case was accordingly dismissed.
