DUNGARVAN FOOT BEAGLES—

The Dungarvan pack are enjoying splendid sport this season which is drawing to a close. Hunting during March has been allowed by Permit from the Minister for Justice. Beagle hunting is a sport which is becoming very popular, and this was clearly demonstrated on Sunday last, when at the "meet" at Dr. Hall's Bridge, we had visitors from the Waterford Beagle Club, Tramore and Portlaur. Hounds tried the curve at the slope near the electric light standard, and were only a few minutes in the high leather when a hare was sighted and the tally-ho given. A good pack here, he faced boldly up the hill with hounds hot on his heels, and having got to the flat made a wide circle to the left, towards Renagalea, where hounds checked. He

then turned sharply to the west but hounds held the line well. After hunting this hare for some time, two fresh hares (one jumped up in front of the hounds) divided the pack, the major portion held the line of the hunted hare. Having made several circles scent finally gave up and hounds were called off. The hunt was very fast, but owing to the nature of this delightful hunting country it was possible to keep in touch with hounds and have them in view all the time. The visitors, many of them keen followers of the Waterford Beagles, were loud in their praise of the local pack and their keen scent and hunting through difficult country. The view from this hill both north and south, is magnificent, and it was regrettable that the day was not clear.

CO. WATERFORD LAND SETTLEMENT ASSOCIATION

An Executive Committee meeting of the above was held in the Town Hall, Dungarvan, on Sunday, March 20th. The following branches were represented: Dungarvan, Tramore, Kilmeehan, Touraneena, Clashmore, Grange, Ballinacoola, Stradbally, and Kilsenny.

Apologies for non-attendance were read from the Hon. Secretaries of various branches and also from Mr. M. Morrissey, T.D., and Mr. P. J. Little, T.D., both expressing their co-operation.

The Hon. Sec. (Mr. E. Curran) read various correspondence from the Private Secretary to Mr. G. Boland, Minister for Lands, re the activities of his Department throughout the county, and also letters were read from the T.D.'s relative to matters which were referred to them for reply.

Long correspondence from the Hon. Sec. Villierstown branch protesting that Section 38 Land Act 1933 and Section 13 Land Act 1936 were not yet put into operation, and calling on the Minister for Lands and the T.D.'s to enforce these two sections so that judicial tenants could then have their annuities revised. The letter also quoted a citation of the 1920 Act passed in the English Houses of Commons and Lords, granting the annuities collected in Southern and Northern Ireland to the respective Governments. The branch held that these monies should never have been handed over to England by any Government of Southern Ireland and asked that England should refund all these monies in the Settlement now about to be negotiated between England and this country.

The Chairman pointed out that it was unanimously decided at last meeting to request the responsible Minister and the local T.D.'s to have these sections of the Land Acts 1933 and 1936 put in force without further delay. He said the correspondence already read at the meeting shows that the Minister is now giving the matter serious consideration.

The Hon. Sec. was instructed to communicate with the Villierstown branch and asked that they bring a copy of the 1920 Act to next meeting and to express the thanks of the Association for their interest in matters of vital importance to Ireland.

It was reported to the meeting that four inspectors from the Department of Lands have now arrived in Dungarvan and that offices would be opened as soon as a suitable building was available. It was decided that each branch Secretary should call at this new office and give his active co-operation in furthering the policy of land division and helping the offices as much as possible.

A long discussion took place re the deductions made on the Agricultural Grant each year owing to defaulters not paying their annuities. Many of these derelict farms are now being taken over for division and the Land Commission will hold back in the "redemption monies" an amount equal to all arrears in annuities. It was decided that the Chairman approach the Commissioner for Co. Waterford and report to next meeting the result of the interview.

Important matters of local interest to the various branches were discussed.
