WEST WATERFORD NEWS

The Fishing Season

The salmon fishing season, just concluded, has been a record failure. Conditions on the Blackwater have been particularly bad and several crews operating on the Clashmore section of the river did not even make their expenses, much less make a profit. Not even the oldest fisherman can advance any definite reason for the unprecedented absence of fish. It is hoped that the responsible authorities will do something practical to alleviate the hard lot of those, who for the past six months, toiled unceasingly and patiently at an unremunerative and thankless task.

The Reads

During recent weeks several necessary improvements have been carried out on the main roads. To facilitate tourists arrows and sign-posts have been erected at various points, while all dangerous and "blind" corners have been removed and "dips" levelled out. County Waterford roads are now second to none and their condition reflects creditably on the energy and initiative of the County Surveyor, Mr. J. Bowen, B.E., and his efficient staff.

Vocational Organisation

Why do not more of our legislators take a greater interest amongst all Vocational Organisation? In other countries this system has been successfully applied and has resulted in the solution of the Unemployment Problem and the Agricultural Problem. Further, it places the State on a sound economic basis and creates unanimity amongst all classes of the community. For from being a buttress for Dictatorship, it strengthens Democratic Institutions against both Capitalistic tyranny and Communistic anarchy.

The Rural Population

Why is it that successive natural Governments have trifled with rural problems? Our rural population has been the mainstay of every national movement, still rural decadence has not been effectively checked.

Popular Pastor

Since his appointment to the pastoral charge of the parish in 1937, Very Rev. Fr. Murphy, P.P., Clashmore, has been responsible for carrying out extensive parochial improvements. These include the entire reconstruction and re-roofing of Kinsalebeg Church; the renovation of the Parish Church at Clashmore; the erection of a new parish hall; the acquisition of a new public cemetery at Clashmore and extensive improvements to the Churchyard. These are works which will forever remain a monument to his initiative.

Crops

In Clashmore and district crops, generally, are doing well. Grain crops are highly satisfactory and granted favourable weather good yields are assured. Both in yield and quality potatoes are satisfactory, but the appearance of blight will retard further development. Root crops are also doing well.

Fishermen's Grievances

Certainly no section of the community has a greater cause for grievance than the salmon fishermen. This is particularly so with crews operating on the Blackwater. For the past few years their work has been most unremunerative—a dead loss. Still they have to pay big overhead expenses in licences, etc., when their duty should be to themselves and their families. They are an important section of the community and it is the duty of the responsible authorities to do something practical to alleviate their hard lot. We hope that our legislators will take the matter in hand and ensure that the Blackwater fishermen get their rights.
