L.G.D.'S LETTER-ATTENDANCES AT MEETINGS

RENT ARREARS ON NEW HOUSES

At a meeting of Youghal U.D.C., there were present—Messrs. M. D. Broderrick, Chairman; E. D. Condon, R. Power, J. Forrest, T. Beausang, E. P. Lynch, D. McCarthy, J. Whelan, J. Daly, B.E.

On the proposition of Mr. Whelan, seconded by Mr. Forrest, a cheque for £275 11s. labour and wages, was passed.

Mr. Beausang enquired what about the work in the Quarry Road, which was ordered months ago.

The Chairman said he would see that the work was carried out without further delay.

Mr. Power said it was strange that work ordered some three months ago had been neglected so long.

The Chairman said he would see the Engineer and have him attend to the matter at once. He was on holidays last week.

Some discussion took place on the question of certain houses in bad repair.

Mr. McCarthy said he feared the Council had no legal right to intervene.

Mr. Power said they had a Christian right to intervene. Landlords took care to extract rents for wretched slums.

Mr. Forrest said he had frequently raised the question of compelling landlords to supply sanitary conveniences where required.

It was ordered to proceed with one case as a test.

Dr. T. Kennedy, M.O.H., reported that there was a third child of Mr. T. J. O'Donovan, Gibraltar Terrace, not vaccinated.

From the discussion which ensued it appeared that there were already two cases of the kind pending against Mr. O'Donovan for some time past, having been adjourned from Court to Court.

Rent Arrears

The L.G.D. wrote asking to be informed of the precise steps taken and proposed to be taken by the Council to collect the arrears of rents due by the tenants in the Council's new houses.

The Clerk stated that the arrears due up to the 31st inst., was equal to 149 weeks.

Mr. Lynch—Why should we be asked to take action?

The Chairman—Why should the Council be disbanded and call for a new election?

Mr. Power asked how many meetings would have been held for the past six months if the Fianna Fail members did not attend. They were entitled to the fresh air as much as the others.

Mr. Beausang—Why should the minority sign the notices to quit? Why not the fresh air merchants be here? I would second a proposition that we call for a Commissioner.

The Clerk—There is a standing resolution that proceedings be taken against any tenant owing over eight weeks.

Mr. Whelan said they would have to face their responsibilities in the matter. Those houses were subsidised out of the rates, and while they appreciated the terrible hardships on some of the tenants, due to economic stress, others could pay, but would not. They could not let things continue to drift in face of the resolution on the books.

Mr. Power—Issue a special whip to all the members. If there was a job on they would all be here to a blooming man.

The Chairman suggested that the matter be put on the agenda for next meeting.

Mr. Daly—Remind the defaulters that drastic action must be taken.

A Commissioner

Mr. Whelan—It is a Commissioner you want here. If in order I propose it.

Mr. Condon said he would second it.

Mr. Beausang—We all agree. They could see what happened in some places where a Commissioner was appointed.

Drainage Scheme

On the proposition of Mr. Daly, seconded by Mr. Lynch, and strongly supported by Mr. Power, a resolution was unanimously adopted protesting against the arrest of Mr. E. Donnelly, while visiting his family in the North.

Mr. Power said in view of the harmonious relations existing in the South between Protestants and Catholics he suggested that it was up to the former to join with them in protesting against the narrow-minded action of the Government in the North.

The Clerk said he had written to the Board of Works on 30th July and 3rd August.

Mr. Daly—Send a copy of the report to the Land Commission also.

The proposition was unanimously adopted.

The Chairman—That is a very fine report of the Co. Surveyor.

The Clerk said he had written to the Minister of Defence asking why the Council or the Chairman was not invited to the ceremony of the taking over of the forts, and had received a reply to the effect that all the members of the Cove Council had been invited and the Chairman of the other Councils in the county.

The Chairman said he had received no invitation, nor had his predecessor, Mr. O'Gorman.

Mr. Power—I think we should follow this up.

The Clerk—They must have thought we were in the County Waterford.

Mr. Whelan—It was commented on that Youghal was not invited.

Heise Broken Into

In reply to a query by Mr. Lynch, regarding one of the Council's houses which was vacant, and which he (Mr. Lynch) had been informed was open at the back.

The Clerk stated that some person had broken the lock. They had it repaired, but it was broken again.

It was decided to put a new tenant in immediately.

New Housing Scheme

A letter was read from the L.G.D. stating that the Minister had approved of the proposed new scheme of 28 houses, and asking for certain particulars.

The Clerk said that the matter had been referred to the Architects to deal with.

Upper Strand Services

The L.G.D. wrote regarding the proposed extension of sewer and water services on the Upper Strand Road, making certain suggestions and returning the documents dealing with it for amendment.

Mr. Daly suggested that the matter be referred to the Town Surveyor to deal with without further delay and this was agreed to.

Dance Licenses

A letter was read from Mr. W. R. Hodnett, solr., in connection with the renewal of the Dance License and pointing out that the license duty had been increased from 2/6 to £2.

The Clerk said that as the matter was urgent he had instructed the solicitor to take the necessary steps.

This was approved of.

Mr. Lynch—Will all the Dance Halls have to pay £2?

The Clerk—Yes.

Mr. Daly—What is the revenue from the Hall for Dances?

The Clerk—About £30.

The Chairman—It is a paying proposition.

Tar Casks Tapped

Mr. Power said he had been informed that some of the tar casks on the back road were leaking.

The Clerk said that some person or persons had broken them and taken a quantity of the bitumen.

Replying to a query, the Clerk stated that they had got the tar sprayer from Waterford County Council.

Mr. Power asked why wasn't the work of tar-spraying put in hand. There were a large number of men idle and if the Engineer was on holidays, they ought get someone else to supervise and give the poor men a chance of earning something.

Mr. Beausang said there was something wrong somewhere. Orders had been given long ago to go on with the work in the Quarry Road.

Fair Field

Mr. Power said the work on the Fair Field had been started 3 years ago and it wasn't finished yet.

Mr. Beausang—And what about the Quarry Road?

Mr. Lynch said that the excuse given for the work was that they had no tar to make "breeze." He suggested that in future no tar be sold at the Gas Works until their own requirements were supplied.

This was unanimously agreed to.

Town Superintendent's Duties

Mr. Whelan proposed that the Town Superintendent should be given each week a list of the works to be done and that he should submit a report at the following meeting as to how they were dealt with.

This was seconded by Mr. Beausang and passed unanimously.

Band Promenade

Letters were read from two Cork City bands offering their services for promenades on the Strand.

"THE TROUBLED HOUSE"

A NOVEL OF DUBLIN DURING THE TERROR

Many of our readers will recall the associations of Miss Rosemund Jacob, Waterford, with the work of the Gaelic League and King College some years ago. Those who keep in touch with contemporary literature in Ireland will own or have borrowed her valuable work, "The Rise of the United Irishmen," a book that was warmly praised in the Press of Ireland, England and America. Her novel "Callaghan" published a few years ago gave evidence of her talent as an interpreter of Irish political and social life and evoked a demand for further work of that kind from her. In "The Troubled House" (Browne and Nolan 7/6), Miss Jacob has given us one of the best novels of Dublin during the Black and Tan terror that has yet appeared.

The Cullen household—a typical Dublin middleclass family is "The Troubled House" of Miss Jacob's story.

Jim Cullen, a prosperous solicitor is "loyal" and conservative and highly respectable, his sons Liam and Roddy are ardent Republicans and active I.R.A. men; the third son although of a pacifist nature is in sympathy with the I.R.A. aims. Mrs. Cullen, Jim's wife returns from a trip to Australia to find her son Liam banished from the house by his father for his I.R.A. activities and throws in her sympathy with her sons. All the stirring events of Dublin in 1920-21 stand out in the book through the activities of the Cullen boys in street ambushes and other phases of I.R.A. work. The whereabouts of Liam and Theo are discovered by the Auxiliaries with the inevitable consequences of raids, threats, torture beatings and imprisonment in the tortuous Chamber of Dublin Castle, where the Auxie friends practised their devilish tortments in their vain efforts to extract confessions from their victims.

The heights of the poignant tragedy is reached when Liam is taking part in an ambush in Baggot Street, accidentally shoots his father who was leaving a tobacco shop and refused to be warned of the danger by these inside. The father was taken home and dies after a short time in the arms of his wife with Liam standing by.

The splendid standard of writing that marks the entire book reaches its best in the chapter that deals with the ambush and Jim's death. The brutality and Imperialistic arrogance of the Auxiliaries and British officers, are splendidly portrayed in the chapters dealing with raids and arrests.

We were pleased to see a few days ago that Miss Jacob's "Troubled House" is in the list of books in greatest demand in Dublin libraries and book shops.—S.O'F.

HAY-MAKING PROBLEM

Weight of Crop in Contrast to Quality. The relation of the weight of hay crop to the time at which it is cut is a matter which has always concerned farmers.

Experience can be claimed to prove that early cutting need not necessarily lead to a loss of weight, and very late cutting has invariably led to a poorer yield. There is one interesting reservation, however, where the seed mixture contains a certain proportion of Late Flowering Red Clover, there is a considerable increase in growth after the majority of the other plants have reached their maximum. But here again in waiting for the Late Flowering Red to mature, there is a deterioration going on in the already ripened clovers and grasses, so that the additional weight obtained from the former is offset by the decreasing weight of the latter.

Moreover, tests have also proved that the late cut hay is not of the same high standard of quality as the earlier cut. It is pointed out, at the same time, that growers should not necessarily be tempted to discard Late Flowering Red Clover on account of its late ripening, as it is superior to the Standard Leaved Red in second, and in many cases third year's pastures. And it is well, too, that it should not be allowed to reach full growth in the hay crop, as it then exercises a depressing effect upon the development not only of the White Clover, but also the natural grasses, Cockfoot and Timothy.

HINTS FOR HOUSEWIVES

To Prevent Jam-Pot Covers Sticking. Jam-pot covers often stick together just when you want to use them. Place them in a colander and set this over a vessel half-filled with boiling water. Keep the water boiling and in a few minutes the covers can easily be separated.

To Prevent Cakes from being Burnt. When you put your cakes or puddings in the oven, set the alarm-clock to the time when you will need to look at them. You will be sure to hear the bell and in this way save many a burnt and spoilt cake.

Gramophone Records. Old gramophone records make good bulb bowls. Warm the record in a cool oven until it is just soft enough to bend, and then mould it into the required shape, taking care not to break the record. The centre hole may be used for drainage of filled with sealing wax.

Coffee Stains on Linen. Soak the linen for a few minutes in soapy water, do not wring, then put out in the strong sunshine until the stain has disappeared. Continually wetting the stain with the soapy water as it dries.

Stained Aluminium Saucepans. To remove the stains in aluminium saucepans by boiling a few chubarb leaves in them for about ten minutes.

To Remove Rust Stain. Lemon juice and salt rubbed into a cloth spread over a saucer will remove rust stains if persevered with. Salts of lemon from the chemist is good, but is a poison and will eat a hole in the article if left on too long.

Canadian Cattle. During the week ended July 30, a consignment of 744 cattle from Canada was landed at Birkenhead and 348 cattle were landed at Glasgow. In the first six months of this year the total number of Canadian cattle exported to Great Britain amounted to 20,872, as compared with 3,665 during the corresponding period of 1937.

Cattle Exports from Eire. During the first seven months of the year 1938, 13,115 more fat cattle were exported from Eire, and 90,260 less stores than during the corresponding period last year.

A Freak Cabbage. Crown on the lands of Mr. James Kieley, Ballynabonogue North, Bonmahon, Co. Waterford, a cabbage head developed to an enormous size. The bulb scales 16lb. 3 ozs., and is 22 inches in circumference, and is of the flat Dutch variety.

Germany Produces New Cereal. Agricultural experts in Germany, it is stated, are developing a new grain—a combination of wheat and rye—which they believe, will bring this country closer to her aim of national self-sufficiency and make her independent of foreign corn supplies in the event of war.

CARRICK LADY'S BEREAVEMENT. The late Mr. Philip Hayes, Licensed Vintner and Grocer, Glanworth, Suse, Limerick, was married to a sister of Mr. Richard Simott, Carrickbeg, Carrick-on-Suir. Mr. Hayes died after a brief illness at his residence, Midross, Ballinacorra, Limerick. He was a prominent figure in the Commercial and social life of Limerick and was a keen sportsman. Much sympathy is felt for his bereaved widow and children.

Jumpers Off to Germany. The Irish Army's jumping team horses, Limerick Luce, Red Hugh, Dahallow and Limerick's Corn, left Dublin by the L.M.S. boat on Monday en route for Germany, where they will compete at Aachen. They will return on August 24. The officers who will participate are Captains Corry, Ahern and Lewis, and Lieut. Heffernan.

Next Meeting. It was agreed to hold the next general meeting on Wednesday September 14th, at 8.30 p.m.

Sympathy. Major Tynan paid tribute to the late Sergt-Major Pyre, who was, he said, a great and untiring worker for the Legion, and a vote of condolence was passed with his relatives.

From Denmark to Buy Horses. Two Danish officers have arrived in Dublin to purchase remounts for the Danish Army. They are Colonel Hausel and Lieut-Col. For. Danish breed horses, Col. Hausel said, were mostly used for farm work and their army would always require Irish horses.

WATER AND SEWERAGE PROPOSED WORKS AT QUAY

Water and Sewerage. The Borough Surveyor was instructed to report on the matter.

Mrs. Dempsey, Shandon, wrote thanking the Council for their resolution of sympathy passed on the death of her husband.

The Dungarvan Coursing Club were granted the use of the Town Hall for a Ciderella dance to be held on September 11th.

A letter from the L.G.D. inquired if the bye-laws governing the sale of meat had been approved of.

The Clerk said that copies of the bye-laws would be ready for circulation among the members next week.

Water and Sewerage. The Chairman said that the Borough Surveyor and himself had an interview with the County Surveyor regarding the quay sewers and water main.

It was arranged that a 3-inch water main be laid, and where required 9-inch sewer pipes.

Mr. McCarthy said it was most unfair that men employed on the work on the quay only got 4 days' work, and on that account were debarred from signing the following week. They should at least get a full week's work.

The Chairman said that question had been raised from time to time in the Dail, but nothing could be done until the law was changed.

The Board adopted unanimously a resolution from Kilkenny calling on the British Government to hand over the remains of the late Sir Roger Casement for re-interment at Glasnevin.

It was ordered that copies of the resolution be sent to the British Home Office.

Waterford Hurlers. The Chairman said that they should take this opportunity to congratulate the Waterford senior hurlers on their fine success in the Munster Championship. It was the first time in the history of the G.A.A. that Waterford had reached an All-Ireland Final and they all wished them success.

Mr. J. Foley—We are all in accordance with your resolution. Years ago the "Hopes" and "Rovers" went to the border line, and let us hope now that Waterford will this year get over that line.
