

The man who is said to have started the bobbed hair fashion has died. The revived mode for long hair is given as the cause of his death. He was Henri Grieben (73) barber who died in New York of Per nicious Anaemia. Doctors say he was half starved because of poor business. Before his death Grieben said that the new fashion for wearing long hair had ruined him.

NO EXCUSE IN BULL LICENSING CASE.

When summoned for keeping an unlicensed bull at Tramore monthly Court, the defendant admitted the offence but pleaded that the bull in question was wicked and could not be taken to any centre. The Justice observed that it was a habit of bulls to be rather wicked. If he were to accept that excuse it would be put forward by others. "It's the first amiable laughing," and it impresses me a lot, being very much afraid of bulls myself; but I think it is not a serious defence." He imposed a fine of £1 10s. with 25s. witnesses expenses.

COUNTY COUNCIL OF WATERFORD

WILD BIRDS (COUNTY WATERFORD) ORDER, 1938.

Whereas it is enacted by sub-section (2) of Section 2 of the Wild Birds Protection Act, 1930 (No. 16 of 1930), that the Minister for Justice may by order made on the application of the council of a county or in each county or county borough the close time in respect of all wild birds or any particular kinds or kind of wild birds.

And Whereas the Council of the County of Waterford has applied to the said Minister to make an order under the said sub-section extending until the 1st day of December in every year the close time in the County of Waterford in respect of the kinds of wild birds hereinafter mentioned.

Now, the Minister for Justice, in exercise of the powers conferred on him by sub-section (2) of Section 2 of the Wild Birds Protection Act, 1930 (No. 16, of 1930), and of every other power him in this behalf enabling, hereby orders as follows:—

1. This Order may be cited as the Wild Birds (County Waterford) Order, 1938.

2. The Interpretation Act, 1937 (No. 38 of 1937) applies to this Order.

3. The close time in the County of Waterford in respect of the following kinds of wild birds, that is to say:—Owl (all species); kestrel, goldfinch, chaffinch, linnet, redpoll, siskin, skylark, wagtail (all species), chough, kingfisher, hoopoe, is hereby extended to the first day of December to the intent that the close time in the said county for the said kinds of wild birds shall be the period between the 1st day of March and the 1st day of December (both days inclusive) in every year.

Given under the Official Seal of the Minister for Justice, this 24th day of August, 1938.

IN SEPTEMBER 1938

In the South and West three weeks in September fairly fine, while in parts Midlands unsettled weather conditions were experienced throughout the month. PASTURES AND LIVES

HAY

CEREALS AND WHEAT

OATS
Harvesting of the oats crop fair weather conditions, but still remained in field stocks end of September. Ripen late and most of the grain as well developed as in a season. Lodging which was or less general, rendered operations slow and laborious most districts yields reached average. Many of the firstings were found to range 17 and 19 cwt. per acre paid to farmers varied from 14s. for white, and 10s. to barrel (14 stones) for black.

BARLEY
This crop provided returns what less variable than the cereals. Lodging was frequent with, but harvesting was out under reasonably favourable weather conditions. Bushel were somewhat light—around 50 to 52 lb.—and the and colour were in some cases to be below the standard by malsters. Prices paid for ting barley were 17/6 to 18 barrel (16 stones), while suitable for maize admixture turned 15/- to 16/6 per barrel.

ROOT CROPS
Root crops generally made progress in September, but to recover completely from the paritively sunless and cold crop prevalent during the Summer development was further retarded by the more than ordinary dry of keeping weeds under control.

SUGAR BEET
This crop grew out well, but roots were still small in proportion to the tops. Many crops patchy and irregular, and yields generally indicated somewhat below average.

MANGELS
In many areas mangels gave promise of yields approaching normal but generally the roots were small and the final returns probably not reach normal.

TURNIPS
This crop also made good progress during the month, and the of the crops seemed likely to almost average yields.

POTATOES
The digging of the main crop commenced at the end of September, and generally the yields up to the average. number of cases, however, turns were less satisfactory weeds took their toll from the. Although blight was almost where noticeable in August disease caused comparatively damage.
