





Millionaire Buried At STRADBALLY

The interment took place at Stradbally on Wednesday last, of Mr. Ernest A. Capelli the South African millionaire, who died on Sept. 13, 1938.

Large numbers visited the graveyard and either side of the road outside the grave yard was lined with motor cars. The grave was not covered in for some hours after the casket had been placed therein and a constant stream of people viewed the decorated grave and magnificent oak casket. The widow and the deceased's brother and daughter posed for a photograph beside the GRAVE LINED WITH SATIN.

The grave, which was eight feet six inches deep, was lined with satin, on which were superimposed pink and white carnations interspersed with black rosettes. At the head of the grave a plaque, also su faced with white satin, bore in inscriptions "R.I.P." embossed in gold letters and flanked on either side by figures of angels, the whole being surrmounted by a golden cross. The scheme of decoration of the grave was executed in the most artistic manner under the personal supervision of Mr. Frank Power, of Messrs. Wm. Power and Sons, nurserymen and seed merchants Waterford.

BEAUTIFUL WREATHS. The outer casket, containing the suite of coffins was of massive polished oak with heavy silver mountings. Amongst the very large number of magnificent wreaths,

WILD BIRDS (COUNTY WATER-FORD) ORDER, 1938.

Whereas it is enacted by subsection (2) of Section 2 of the Wild Birds Protection Act, 1930 (No. 18 of 1930), that the Minister for Justice may by order made on the appliccation of the council of a county or a county borough extended or vary in such county or county borough the close time in respect of all wild birds or any particular kinds or kind of

1. This Order may be cited as the Wild Birds (County Waterford) Order, 1938.

2. The Interpretation Act. 1937 (No, 38 of 1937) applies to this

3. The close time in the County of Waterford in respect of the following kinds of wild birds, that is to say:— Owl (all species); kestrel, goldfinch. chaffinch, linnet, redpoll. siskin, skylark, wagtail (all species). chough, kingfisher, hoopoe, is hereby extended to the first day of December to the intent that the close time in the said county for the said kinds of wild birds shall be the period between the 1st day of March and the 1st day of December (both days inclusive) in every year.

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
