AN RIOGHACT.-At the Annual Ard Fheis of an Rioghact on the 6th November, the following Statement was approved for publication:-

The Ard-Fheis wishes again to stress the urgent need of decisive measures to re-move, before it is too late, the economic causes of the continued decline of the rural population which is now approaching the stage when the practical extinction of the historic Irish Nation is a definite possibility. The immediate causes of the decline, namely, abnormal and forced emigration, an abnormally low marriage rate (both unparalleled in any other nation in the world) and excessive urbanisation, are confessedly rooted in an economic system and regime under which it is practically impossible to develop it to an adequate degree, our usual natural resources; and which leads inevitably to social injustice. The Ard-Fheis consequently urges the Government to make such a reform in the monetary system of the country as may render possible the practical realisation of the "Principles of Social Policy" which are set down in the Irish Constitution (Art. 45, Nos. 1, 2 and 4) but which must remain for the most part inoperative until the present monetary system is duly reformed.

The Ard-Fheis cordially welcomes the Minority Reports of the recent banking Commission which are all alike directed towards implementing the principles of Social Justice set out in the Papeal Encyclical on the Irish Constitution. It comes in a special way the third Minority Report, signed by Mr. P. J. O'Loughlin, T.D., in which it is elaborated in detail a conservative scheme of a monetary and economic reform, aiming at full employment and family security which would make possible a social construction in accordance with the Papeal Encyclical and the Irish Constitution.
