#### Grassland Improvement

OBTAINING THE BEST RESULT FROM PHOSPHATE FERTILIZERS

Many farmers believe that they have far more grass than their beasts can use. They annot afford to buy in stock to consume the surplus, even if they wanted to; Why then should they spend time and money in growing more grass as every authority

The answer to this question is that nearly all farmers have surplus grass, but that is in Summer when it is of least value. Very few farmers, indeed, have enough in early spring and late autumn when stock need it most. There may be plenty of grassland on a farm, but it cannot produce grass of the right kind and at the right time unless it is efficiently managed.

MECHANICAL TREATMENT For a number of years past, experiments treatment of grass land, and the results of in this line of cultivation. It is only natural to suppose that grass land requires cultivation at times, just like any other crop, if it is to be maintained at the highest point of productivity for many years. Where there is a mat of fog or of undecayed vegetation, the pasture should be well harrowed before liming or manuring is carried out, if full benefits are to be obtained. In cases where a heavy mat of ungrazed grass has been allowed to remain it may even be necessary to mow this off before attempting the harrowing. No injury to the pasture need be feared, even if the surface of the land presents a red appearance after harrowing; in fact this is the ideal condition to be aimed at, as such cultivation facilitates the thorough incorposition of phosphatic manufe with the
