The Revival of the Irish Language.

When a native government first took over the reins of this country in the early years of the last decade, one of their chief aims was the revival of the Irish language, and the establishment of Gaelic culture all over the country. This they averred, was necessary, if Ireland were to become a completely free and self-respecting country and with this object in view, they decreed that Irish be taught in the schools, and that the passing of certain examinations in that subject be necessary for the holding of the more important Civil Service Posts. With the change of government in 1922 there came no slackening of this drive for the Irish language and to-day it continues unabated. One may be puzzled for asking, "What are the results?" And the melancholy reply is—That there are practically none.

Irish farmers, workers and professional men take no interest in their native language. They tell their children that it will be of no use to them when they leave school and that is "all nonsense." The children in their turn come to school cynical and slightly hostile, and decide that since their parents do not want them to learn any Irish, they are justified in paying no heed to their teachers. The result is that ninety-five per cent. of Irish boys and girls outside the Gaeltacht areas never speak a word of Irish outside of school hours.

If anybody were to suggest to the parents of these children that they were bad Irishmen or Irishwomen, they would almost certainly flare up immediately and deny the truth of the suggestion. Though they speak of the services which they and their ancestors rendered their country in the dark past, they deny that while our country spurns its native language, it is the home of a mongrel nation which is neither Irish nor English nor anything.

What about it, people of Dungarvan? It is in your power to bring back Irish to your homes. You live beside an Irish-speaking district and have every opportunity of achieving this object. We believe that you wish Gaelic culture well, and therefore have decided to publish each week an Irish feature of local interest. This feature—"Séar-Chuntas Dhungarvan" by Liam O. Míghacháin is a masterly and interesting history of Dungarvan which would be worth reading in any language. The writer Mr. William Meehan is an able Irish scholar, and it is his enthusiasm for the language largely which has made possible the printing of this weekly feature. You also can demonstrate your enthusiasm by reading the history of your native town, and leading it through the medium of your native tongue.

For the benefit of motorists we give the following guide to traffic light signals in Dublin.

Green—means you may go (with due care for the safety of others).

Amber (alone) means stop before entering the intersection unless you are so close to the intersection when Amber first appears that you cannot stop with safety, in which case you may go on.

Red—means stop. (Do not pass the Stop-Line.)

Red and Amber means prepare to Stop. You must not start before Green shows.

If Turning—Left Hand Turn.—Signal your intention. Keep near kerb.

Wait for Green (or Green Arrow, if provided). Watch for Pedestrians. Move carefully round corner.

Right Hand Turn.—Signal your intention. Keep to left of centre of road. Wait for Green.

Never pass the Red. It is an offence against the Road Traffic Act, 1933, to act in disregard of the Signals.

(For Regulations regarding Traffic Light Signals, and Signals to be given by Drivers, see General Bye-Laws for the Control of Traffic, 1937.)

(1) There are now 17 Intersections in Dublin controlled by Traffic Light Signals, which are in operation Day and Night.

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The Late Very Rev. Patrick B. Walshe, New Orleans, U.S.A.

Impressive Funeral at Mount Melleray, Cappoquin

The late Very Rev. Patrick B. Walshe, Pastor of St. Rita's Church, New Orleans, U.S.A., whose death occurred in New Orleans on November 23rd, was a native of Farnane, Milstreet, and was brother of Mr. Edmond Walshe, a popular and highly respected farmer there, and uncle of the Rev. James B. Walshe, Motherwell, Glasgow, and the Rev. Nicholas Walshe, Netche, U.S.A.

He was a brilliant student in the famous Seminary at Mount Melleray, Cappoquin, for several years, completing his studies in St. John's College, Waterford, where he was ordained to the priesthood nearly forty years ago.

He expressed a wish that when he was dead his remains should be taken home to Ireland and interred at Mount Melleray, that hallowed spot where he had spent his early student days, and which he loved so well to the end.

The remains were enclosed in a beautiful mahogany casket, fitted with a sliding glass panel on the lid, through which his remains were able to gaze on the calm and happy-looking features of the deceased inside.

The casket was soon transferred to a motor hearse, and the funeral then proceeded to Mount Melleray, via Youghal, Clashmore and Cappoquin, being met at various points en route by numbers of other relatives and friends from Farnane, Modeligo, Cappoquin and other places, despite the lateness of the hour.

Mount Melleray was reached about 11.30 where by the special and gracious permission of the Lord Abbot, the Church was kept open and the casket reposed before the High Altar during the night.

At 11 o'clock on Wednesday Solemn Requiem High Mass was offered up for the repose of the soul of the deceased before a large and devout congregation of mourners drawn from practically all parts of West Waterford, whose presence proved a striking and touching tribute of respect to the memory of the dead and beloved Pastor.

The Right Rev. Dean Colusa O'Connell, Lord Abbot of Mount Melleray, presided over the solemn ceremonies, the celebrant of the Mass being the Rev. James B. Walshe (nephew of deceased); deacon, Rev. D. Quinlan, C.C.; Modeligo; sub-deacon, Rev. Father Murren, C.C.; Ballinacorney, and Master of Ceremonies, the Rev. Father Columban, O.Cist., Mount Melleray.

The chanting and choir music were provided by the full Community Choir, which lent an added impressiveness to the solemn proceedings. The other clergy present included: Very Rev. Canon O'Brien, P.P., Dungarvan; Very Rev. J. Walsh, P.P., Modeligo; Very Rev. J. Cullinan, P.P., Touraneena; Very Rev. T. Fitzgerald, P.P., Cappoquin; Very Rev. M. Dowley, P.P., Ballyduff; Rev. T. Dunphy, C.C., Cappoquin; Rev. Father Power, C.C., Kilpobteen; Rev. Father Tobin, C.C., Lismore; Rev. M. Lane, S.T.L., St. John's Waterford, while the Rev. Father McGrath, C.C., Touraneena (a relative of deceased) was unavoidably absent.

At the conclusion of the ceremonies, the final Absolution was pronounced by the Lord Abbot, after which the casket was reverently borne to the Abbey Cemetery opposite the Church, where the interment took place. The Lord Abbot and all the priests of the Community, as well as the other priests who had assisted at the High Mass, accompanied the funeral to the cemetery, where the last prayers at the grave were recited by the Lord Abbot, and amid a tense and solemn silence all that was mortal of a kind and saintly priest and a sterling Irishman was committed to mother earth, almost within the shadow of his stately "Alma Mater" where he had spent so many happy and brilliant student days 40 years ago. R.I.P.

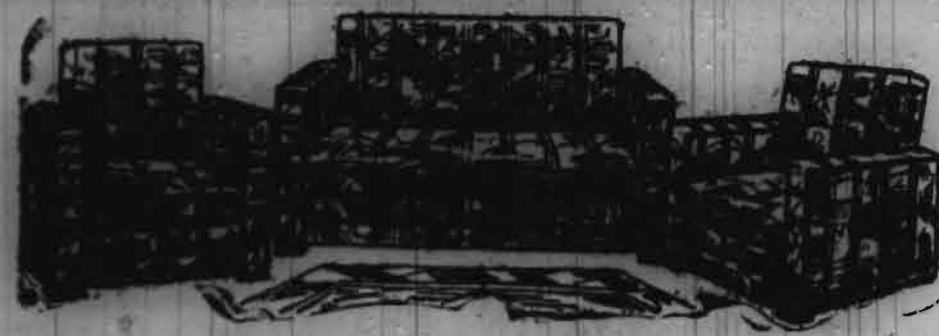

ARDMORE COURT

Before Mr. G. P. Farrell, D.J.

THE BUSINESS

There were over eighty cases on the books, and a number were adjourned owing to the temporary closing of Youghal Bridge for repairs.

AD INTERIM TRANSFER

Mr. T. C. Williams, Solr. Dungarvan, applied on behalf of Nora Kiely, Pulla for an Ad Interim Transfer of the license held by Philip Kiely deceased.

Supt. Walsh, Dungarvan, stated that there was no objection.

The application was granted.

RECKLESS DRIVING

Francis W. Wise, Ardmore, was charged with reckless driving.

Supt. Walsh prosecuted and Mr. W. J. Barry, Solr., Middleton, defended.

The Supt. said the case arose out of an accident at Piltown Cross last July. Miss Beatrice Dillon, Dublin stated that on the day in question she was in a motor car coming from Monatra, driven by Mr. Palmer.

When approaching the four Cross Roads she saw the big car coming on the Main Road and turning it struck their car, she ducked and cut her head with the mirror. Their car was in bits. The other car came along like a flash. He must have been on their side of the road.

Cross-examined by Mr. Barry witness said the car was doing about 15 m.p.h. They did not see the other car till it was almost on them.

If Mr. Palmer had kept his eyes opened would he not have seen the car coming on us.

Mr. S. Palmer, Dublin gave corroborative evidence. When he began to turn towards Youghal he noted the other car coming from the direction of Youghal, witness was on his own side and he realised the other car was coming straight on them, it was slightly on the wrong side. The next thing, the collision occurred. It swerved into him, crushing the front right half. The right wing of the front of the radiator was crushed.

Cross-examined by Mr. Barry.

He was four years driving. It was his first accident. He was doing about 15 m.p.h.

The Justice—When did you change into second gear?
As I got near the cross before going round the corner.

Cross-examined Mr. Barry—He was just round the corner where Mr. Wise appeared on the scene. He was then about 40 yards off.

You know anyone on the main road has right of way? Yes, if he is on his own side.

He heard no horn. He was travelling slowly and carefully.

Guard J. Ryan stated he visited the scene the evening of the accident. He made a map of the scene. When he landed Mr. Palmer's car was there. Mr. Wise's car had gone to Youghal with Miss Dillon. The road was 39 feet wide at the Youghal side and 48 feet nine inches where the accident occurred.

The Justice—Had Mr. Palmer a reasonably good view turning round coming from Monatra?
There was a slight incline from the main road, but he had a clear view of about forty yards.

He warned Mr. Wise that he would be prosecuted.

Witness here gave details of his examination of Mr. Wise's brakes.

Mr. Barry pointed out that this was after the accident when his axle was six inches out as a result.

Cross-examined Mr. Barry—Did you caution the others? Yes. They are not prosecuted? No.

Mr. Barry—That is extraordinary. If this man was driving carefully why should he collide with Mr. Wise? I can't say. Even if Mr. Wise was on his wrong side, he had ample room to pull up and let him pass by? I can't answer this.

Mr. Barry said Mr. Wise was an experienced driver. Coming from Youghal on the evening he questioned he was a little over his proper side. Approaching the Cross he sounded his horn two or three times. At the Cross this man came on to the main road, he alleged, 15 m.p.h. They held he had a view for one hundred yards and could have seen the other car in time to pull up and avoid the accident, if they were driving properly and kept a proper look out.

Mr. Wise stated he blew his horn approaching the Cross. He was doing thirty to thirty five m.p.h. and must be on his proper side. He heard no horn from Palmer, nor did he see him till he hit him. (Witness)

J. Leo stated that Mr. Wise's brakes were adjusted at their garage a week previous and tested on the evening before the accident.

Mr. Barry submitted that if anybody was to blame it was Mr. Palmer. Even on his own evidence he was 12 feet nine inches out on the road which was 23 feet wide. The civil side of the case had been settled. On the criminal side it was a very serious offence. They said that the man was bound to give the right of way to them. The onus and criminal negligence were not established.

The Justice said he was compelled to hold that there was some degree of negligence on the part of the defendant which was not very serious.

The defendant was fined 20/- with 24 costs.

The Justice said that the Guard gave them great help in the case. The map he made was first class and he would like to compliment him on it.

The Supt.—Thank you, your Worship.

NO LIGHTS

Guard P. J. Ryan charged John Leo with having no rear light.
Fined 3/-.

NO INSURANCE

Guard J. Ryan charged Patrick Hickey, Bawnass, with having an expired insurance on his motor cycle.
Fined 2/6.

NO TAX OR INSURANCE

Guard Cooper, Ardmore, charged Francis Brown, with using a car with no road tax or insurance.

The case was adjourned for inquiry as to whether the tax etc. had been paid since.

HOME FROM DANCE

The same Complainant charged a number of young men with using unlighted bicycles at 1.5 a.m. coming from a dance. They were fined 2/6 each.

INSURANCE CASE

The Minister for Local Government charged David Stanton with failing to affix the necessary insurance stamps.

Mr. E. A. Ryan, State Solr. Dungarvan, prosecuted.

Mr. Ryan said the inspector Mr. Mortell was put to considerable trouble and expense in some of these cases. He did not prosecute until driven to it.

The Justice—I would like to be dealing with Mr. Mortell as an official.
A fine of 10/- was imposed.

UNLICENSED STALLION

Michael Murray, Knockatorr, was charged with keeping an unlicensed stallion.

Mr. Ryan prosecuting said that the case had been before the Court several times. It was adjourned to allow him apply for a permit. It expired last April and the defendant had not complied with the law since.

Defendant's son said they wanted the horse to work. It was the only one they had.

Guard McCarthy stated he interviewed the defendant on 2nd. August and found the Stallion "Mountain Dew" on his land.

Mr. Ryan said the Department looked on the case as a very serious one.
He was fined 40/-.

The Justice stating that he might be fined up to £5 if brought up again.

UNLICENSED BULLS

Declan French, Reenaguella, was charged with having an unlicensed bull.

Mr. A. R. Farrell, Dungarvan, said his client pleaded guilty. In the circumstances he pleaded for leniency.

He was fined 5/- with 10/- costs.

Mr. Doyle, Inspector gave evidence in this and other similar cases.

Jas. Allen, Goulane, was charged with a similar offence and Daniel Costin, Monaghan, was charged with having the animal on his lands.

Mr. Ryan prosecuted and Mr. Farrell defended.

There being some doubt as to the age of the animal, both cases were dismissed.

Michael Hayes, Moying, was fined 10/- with 20/- costs for a like offence.

NOXIOUS WEEDS

Richard Power, Duffcarrick, was charged with an offence under the Noxious Weeds Act 1936.

Mr. Ryan prosecuted.

Guard Cooper stated there were 87 acres in the farm and six were covered with weeds. It was in a very bad condition, all thistles.

Defendant said he made an attempt to clear it, but the machine broke.

Defendant was fined 10/- on the understanding that he would comply with the Act on the first opportunity.

UNLICENSED GUN

Supt. Walsh charged Thos. and Patrick Hickey, Frap, with carrying an unlicensed gun.

Mr. Farrell for defendants pleaded guilty. Their father sent them out with the gun to scare crows. It was a single barrel gun. They didn't fire it.

The Superintendent said he brought the case more or less as a warning. The father had a limit certificate they had no right to take it out.

Mr. Farrell said they would give an undertaking not to use it again.

They were each fined 2/6, the gun 10/- to be forfeited.

CONSCIENTIOUS OBJECTORS

There were an unusually large number of cases of unlighted bicycles and horses and carts brought by Sergeants Gallagher, O'Leary and Vaughan and Guards Cooper, McCarthy, Ryan, Moloney, O'Malley, and others.

The usual fines were imposed.

The Justice said, to use a war-time saying there seemed to be a lot of "Conscientious Objectors" amongst cyclists regarding the use of lights (laughter)

SCHOOL ATTENDANCE CASES

Guard P. J. O'Malley had ten persons from the Ring district charged with the non-attendance of their children at school and fines ranging up to 5/- were imposed.

CRUELTY TO JENNET

Guard J. Ryan charged Patrick Power, Lisarrow, with cruelty to a jennet.

Complainant said there was a fairly large sore behind the left foreleg. It was coming into contact with the straddle. The wound was red and raw. It was covered with a dirty cloth.

Defendant said he had to use the animal to remove some corn. The sore had healed since.

A nominal fine of 1/- was imposed.

NO TAX

The same Complainant charged Wm. Murphy, Ballyhooley Road, Cork, with using an unlicensed motor.

Defendant said it had been used only one day by his sister who had to return unexpectedly to U.S.A.
It hadn't been used since.
Fined 1/-.

The same Complainant charged James O'Brien, Blackrock Road, Cork with a like offence.

NO FRONT BRAKE

The same Complainant charged Patrick Hayes, Aglish, with having no front brake on his motor cycle.
Fined 1/6

NO TAX

Guard Cooper charged John McCarthy, Gortnashilly, with using an unlicensed motor-bicycle. It was new.
Fined 2/-

NO DRIVERS' LICENSE ETC.

Guard M. J. Browne charged John Corkery, Inchiglinella, with having no drivers license.
Fined 2/6

Supt. Walsh stated that James Drummey,

Tom, Macroom, owner of the tractor in question was to be charged with not having the wheels properly shod, but the summons had not been served yet.

The Justice—Has he finished now?

The Supt.—He is out of the Co. Waterford Timothy McSweeney, Coolmonora, Bantry was charged with a similar offence.

Sergt. Gallagher having given evidence, Mr. Farrell Solr. for defendant pleaded it was impossible to comply with the regulations and carry on the work in the country. As a result farmers were left in a desperate position with their crops, much of which would be ruined.

The Supt. said the Guards had to see the Regulations complied with. He understood that they were to be made more drastic.

Mr. Farrell said things were bad enough at present, but if the authorities were to increase and insist upon the present regulations the unfortunate farmers would suffer heavily. As it was, there was such a scarcity of tractors that a big lot of corn had been ruined by the bad weather prevailing.

The Supt. said they had to carry out the law.

Defendant was fined 2/6

Guard Moloney charged John De, Scane, with leaving a jennet and cart on the public road with nobody in charge.
Fined 5/-.

NO LIGHTS

Supt. O'Leary charged Patrick Mulcahy with using an unlighted horse and cart.

Complainant said defendant tried to lash the animal to get away. When held up he gave a false name.

Defendant admitted the offence. He didn't mean any harm (laughter).

Guard Cooper had similar charges against the same defendant on a subsequent date. He was demonstrative and intelligent.

He was fined 10/6 and 7/6 and administered a severe warning.

MALIGNANT DAMAGE

Three young boys from Ring District were charged for malicious damage by throwing twines with stones attached onto the ends over the telegraph wires.

Evidence was given that there were 11 instances of the offence, which took place in the neighbourhood.

WATER FOR THE SICK COW
Contrary to the opinion of many farmers the sick cow unless she is purging badly, should have plenty of good drinking water and some advocate the salting of the sick cow's food, in order to induce thirst, and at the same time make the food more palatable. A cow cannot digest her food properly if her drinking water is much curtailed. In the case of severe diarrhoea, flour gruel should be given in preference to water. The gruel is prepared in the following manner:—
Put a pint of flour in a gallon cooking pan, add a little water and mix thoroughly; then add two teaspoons of warm water starch, and fill the pan three parts full with milk and water in equal parts and boil ten minutes. Some of the paste mixture should be given (dissolved with water or boiled milk) thrice daily.

CO. COUNCIL EMPLOYEES.
The Council decided to send a copy of the following resolution proposed by Mr. Byrne and seconded by Mr. Mansfield, to Mr. Commissioner Moynihan: "That men who are constantly employed by the Co. Council be removed from the relief work now in progress at the Quay and the quarry, and that the men be employed through the unemployment office."

FLOODING OF MARSH.
Mr. Clancy proposed, and Mr. McCarthy seconded, the following, which was passed unanimously: "That the Clerk request Messrs. Deán and Waller, engineers to the Dungarvan sewerage scheme, to inform the Council forthwith as to the cause of the abnormal flooding of Williams' Marsh and other lands adjacent to the sewerage tank, recently constructed there. This flooding commenced when the tank was constructed at the original sluice existing there. Further, that the Council desire to know what steps are to be taken by them to have this abnormal flooding stopped."

VALUER APPOINTED.
Mr. J. Hayes, auctioneer and valuer, was appointed to value, on behalf of the Council, the damage done by the sewerage to land the property of Mr. Paul F. Power, for which there is a claim for compensation lodged by Mr. Power.

CAPPOQUIN NOTES
