SCHOLARSHIPS TENABLE AT RAMSGRANGE SCHOOL OF RURAL DOMESTIC ECONOMY

THE above Committee have made provision for FOUR Scholarships tenable at the above-mentioned School during the 1940-'41 session.

Candidates must be girls whose parents derive their livelihood wholly or substantially from farming pursuits and are resident, or holders of lands in the rural districts of the County.

Intending applicants must be not less than sixteen or more than thirty years of age on the 1st July, 1940.

The course of instruction given is intended to qualify the pupils to perform efficiently the work of rural life, and includes Dairying, Poultry-keeping, Household Management, Cookery, Laundry-work and Needlework.

The Scholarships will be awarded on the result of an examination to be held at an early date and forms of application for admission thereto may be obtained from the undersigned by whom all applications must be received not later than 18th March, 1940.

The examination will comprise questions in Arithmetic, (involving a knowledge of fractions, decimals, percentages and mensuration), English (including Essay and Dictation) and Irish.

Successful candidates must be prepared to take up the scholarships in the term immediately following the examination.

AGRICULTURAL SCHOLARSHIPS

THE above-named Committee have made provision for THREE Agricultural Scholarships tenable at the Department's Provincial Agricultural Schools during the 1940-'41 session.

Candidates must be boys whose parents derive their livelihood wholly or substantially from farming pursuits and are resident, or holders of land in the rural districts of the County.

Candidates who propose to attend one of the Department's Provincial Schools must be not less than 17 years of age or more than 30 years of age on the date of admission.

Each Scholarship entitles the holder to free training, board, and residence at the School or College selected by him; the school year extends from October to September in the case of the Department's Schools and from October to July in the case of other approved Agricultural Schools and Colleges.

The Scholarships will be awarded on the result of an examination to be held at an early date and forms of application for admission thereto may be obtained from the undersigned, with whom all applications should be lodged on or before the 18th March, 1940.

The examination will comprise questions in Agriculture, Arithmetic (involving a knowledge of fractions, decimals, percentages, and mensuration), English (including Essay and Dictation) and Irish.

Successful candidates will be required to furnish to the Committee of Agriculture evidence of age and good health.

ECONOMISE IN CALF REARING.

Heifer calves for the maintenance of the dairy herd must still be reared, in spite of a diminution of the acreage under grass, higher prices for whole milk and an increase in the price, and a shortage of supplies of good concentrates.

On milk-selling farms, however, the great majority of the calves reared must be brought up on the pail, and the question often asked is: How little whole milk is needed to rear a dairy calf?

THE GENERAL METHOD. The general method was to give the calves whole milk at the rate of one gallon daily (after four days' suckling) for up to about 25 days, and then, gradually to reduce the whole milk and give the calves free choice of a variety of concentrates.

POSSIBLE ALTERNATIVES. In present conditions it is rarely possible to obtain full quantities of the usual foods, and alternatives must be used. Linseed cake can be replaced partly or entirely by bean meal—15 per cent. bean meal, 10 per cent. dec. groundnut cake can replace the 30 per cent. linseed cake.
