MR. DE VALERA'S BROADCAST.

An Taoiseach, Mr. de Valera, broadcast to the nation from Radio Eireann on last Saturday night. His address was relayed to America by Columbia.

The change that has taken place is to be seen also in the domain of our national economy. Twenty-five years ago there was no national body to take charge of Irish economic interests.

HOUSING SCHEMES. "Schemes for the proper housing of our people are in progress. Soon we shall be within sight of the 100,000th dwelling completed or reconstructed since the present Government took office.

"Add to the facts I have already given you that the separated territory contains some of the places held most sacred by our people and you will see why we feel this wrong so deeply—the place where St. Patrick, as a slave boy, tended his herds; the place where he landed when he returned to preach the Christian Faith; the place where as the Apostle of a nation which had accepted Christ he founded his Primatial see, and the place where his body lies buried—all lie within the severed area.

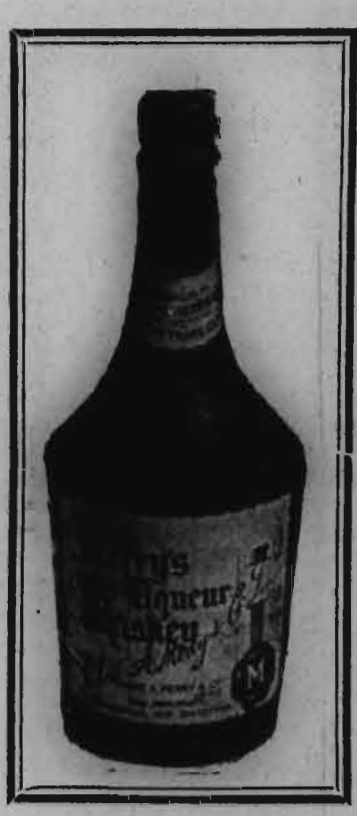
