Stuart Muir, spoke of the attempted assassination of O'Donovan Rossa, and said that "a deed had lately been committed of which Christian minister as he was, he much approved-(laughter)-by a woman who deserved to be ranked with Jael, the wife of Heber, who put an end to the enemy of her country; for what would one do with ravenous wolves but shoot them?" That, spoken by a clergyman from the pulpit, was a fair index of the feeling of the English and Scotch people with regard to these outrages. But the Rev. Mr. Muir went a little farther and said that he regretted that the bullet had been extracted from Rossa-(laughter)—and then he added what in Ireland would immediately involve six months on a plank bed, an incitement to murder; for he said "he hoped that there would arise a woman of equal courage to put bullets into Rossa to defy the skill of all physicians. (Laughter.) This was the Christianity which was preached by the Rev. Mr. Muir. Then the "Saturday Review" spoke of the members of the Irish Parliamentary Party being detained as hostages, one to be hung without judge or jury every time a dynamite outrage occurred, so that Mr. Jenkinson need only cause a certain amount of dynamite outrages to take place to wipe out the whole of the Irish Party.
