SERIOUS MOTORING ACCIDENT

At Barnawee, Abbeyside.

On Wednesday night last about 9.30 p.m. a serious motoring accident occurred at Barnawee when a Ford V 8 car, the property of Mr. Patrick Burke, Garage, Dungarvan, driven by Mr. J. (Nipper) McCarthy was conveying two passengers—Sergt. Furey and Vol. George Ward, to Ballinacourty. When rounding the bend approaching Barnawee Bridge, the car for some unexplained reason struck the low fence on the left hand side. The left wheels of the car mounted the fence and travelled along the top for over 30 yards, the car then leaped the fence and landed about 6 yards in, on the strand where there is a drop down of over 6 feet, it then went along the strand about 30 yards and came to rest in the water just opposite the bridge. It was a wonderful stroke of good luck that the tide was full out at the time otherwise the 3 occupants would have no chance of escape. The alarm was quickly raised by pedestrians who were near the scene of the accident and a telephone message from Mr. P. J. Moloney, Ducks-pool House, to the Barracks at Dungarvan had the desired effect of hurrying assistance to the scene. Meantime Mr. Patrick Dwan who lives nearby had secured his car and quickly removed the three injured men to the Dungarvan Hospital, where they were attended to by Dr. McCarthy. After examination and treatment Vol. Ward was discharged on Thursday morning, but the other two, who are suffering from more severe injuries are still detained at the hospital, where, we understand, they are progressing favourably. The car was badly smashed, the hood being lashed into a V shape, while the bonnet, headlights, seats, etc., were also badly twisted, from its general appearance it would appear to have summarised when it struck the strand. Many sightseers visited the scene on Thursday morning and watched the removal of the car from the strand (where it had remained all night) by the military assisted by many willing helpers. When they had succeeded in bringing the car back to the fence, a County Council engine working nearby pulled it through a gap in the fence on to the road. Later it was brought to the owners garage. All who saw the car after the accident and the condition it was in, were filled with wonderment at the occupants' escape.

Dungarvan Parish Council.

At a meeting of the above held in the Town Hall, Dungarvan, on Wednesday night at 9 p.m., Very Rev. T. Canon O'Brien, P.P., V.F., presided. Also present were—C. J. Murphy, Hon. Secretary; Messrs. Martin, Whelan, Power, Lee, Curran and Noonan.

The following letter was read from the Department—

With reference to your letter of 4th inst I am directed by the Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Defence to inform you that the erection of A.R.S. for the occupation of institutions mentioned by you is the responsibility of their management. I am to state that the cost of public A.R.S. is contributed to from the State only where the need arises for making such shelter available for persons caught in the open during an air raid or in tenement areas. The Parliamentary Secretary having regard to the size and population of Dungarvan considers that the domestic shelters would be sufficient to meet this need. The provision of private shelters is the responsibility of the individual and every effort should be made to get householders to construct their own shelters. Advice on the construction of these shelters is contained in the pamphlet "Civilian War Duties" which was published by the Department and a copy of which was handed to every householder.

The Parliamentary Secretary would appreciate any encouragement you could give the householders on this matter. The Waterford County Council which is the statutory local A.R.P. authority was advised by this Department on 22nd Aug., 1940, of the A.R.P. measures to be taken in Co. Waterford.

Mr. Noonan proposed erecting one large air raid shelter in Loughmore.

The Chairman disagreed remarking that the consequences would be very serious in case of a direct hit.

It was unanimously decided to take up the matter with the County Council Secretary and find out what grant was available for tenement shelters.

Mr. Lee said there was a dire necessity for a shelter in Loughmore and in the Co. Home.

FOOD SUPPLIES.

The Secretary said that Mr. Lee had delivered 38 forms to the merchants in town which would be returned within the next ten days.

It was decided to get the returns in future at the beginning of each month.

The Secretary was directed to write to Rev. Fr. Hayes, the Organising Secretary of Muintir na Tire, to find out what progress regarding the Parish Council had been made in Tipperary.

SCHEME FOR UNEMPLOYED.

With regard to the Scheme of work for the unemployed at present in the hands of the Urban Council the Chairman said he would see the Chairman of the Urban Council concerning the getting in order of the matter.

WATERFORD'S HARD LUCK

Narrowest of Defeats

Limerick's Lucky Win.

The weather conditions for last Sunday's hurling encounter with the All-Ireland champions at Waterford were atrocious. Pouring rain and slippery field made scientific play impossible. But in advance let us say, that the Limerick men seemed more acclimatised to the conditions prevailing than the Waterford men and their style of ground hitting suited the occasion better than their opponents' ill-timed and generally vain efforts at lifting the ball. And we had again the painful absence of co-ordinated effort, cohesion and combination among the members of the team. To be quite frank some members of our team seem to suffer from a very bad dose of swollen head and they seem to think if they serve up a purple patch of individual display that they have done enough to justify their presence on the team. In our opinion players who through pitiable vanity, or blind, stupid selfishness won't combine with fellow players should be relegated to the side line and left there to learn the elements of success for any team. An honest sterling player who combines with others is a hundred times preferable to the showy brilliant fellow who is thinking in terms of himself only and ignores his team mates. Let us hope this is the last time we shall have to refer to this glaring defect. The game on Sunday last was necessarily uneven, still it was an exciting game for both the players and spectators. Waterford led by one point at half-time and later by a large margin, then Limerick equalised and led, winning by the smallest of margins, one point. The last five minutes were spent by Waterford hammering at the Limerick goal, and one seventy and two frees were taken in that time from which at least one point could have been scored. It seemed so from the side line.

Capt. John Keane gave a very fine display of brilliant play, in defence and attack and it was a pity his valiant efforts didn't reap their due reward. Our centre-field paid were both at sea in the rough conditions. Mick Hickey is, we all know a thoroughly honest and hard-working player. We just wonder what would have been the result if the stalwart, Mick Regan was brought out centre and M. Hickey in his place as back where he used to be. The forward line was not strong or sturdy enough. Jacques has not the calibre as yet anyhow for inter-county play. Fleming was as always, reliable and even trying. Dec. Goode had almost to triplicate himself, being changed between full-forward and centre positions. Poor innocent Mick Mackey felt it his duty to complain Dec. to the referee for not being nice to him. Christy Moylan didn't seem to be at his best, certainly he didn't play the trojan game that he did the previous Sunday for the semi-final of the County.

In spite of all these criticisms friendly and we hope helpful, we must give credit to our team for the amount of play against the champion team of the year and very relieved and very delighted the Limerick team and supporters were when the final whistle blew leaving them, I believe, unexpected winners by one poor point. We congratulate them and hope we will have the pleasure of meeting them again and reversing the verdict—two years ago we thrashed them in Waterford. Waterford's day will come, the luck will turn and learning by experience and craft of rival teams we shall snatch the laurels that are due. But one thing we need in this County very badly is self-confidence—the will to win. Away with pessimism, away with the badge of inferiority! This is true, not only of our supporters but unfortunately of the team. Our team must march into the field not merely to just give a game to the opposing team, to pass the hour, but to win. And there is not a team in Ireland to-day that they cannot beat and beat decisively. But they must get rid of the inferiority complex, must realise and feel they have in them the power to conquer all comers.

Late Lieut. R. Pollock.

LISMORE DISTRICT COURT

(Before Mr. G. P. Farrell, D.J.)

UNDEFENDED CIVIL BILLS

A large number of undefended civil bills were first disposed of in which Messrs. Farrell, Casey, Hutch, Kenny and Carroll were for plaintiffs. In some cases decrees were given while others were dismissed.

GLEESON v. CONDON.

This was a case in which Mrs. E. Gleeson, Knockalara, brought a Civil Bill against Maurice Condon, Modeligo for £30.

Mr. Kenny, solr. for plaintiff.
Mr. Farrell, solr. for defendant.
The decree was refused.

UNLIGHTED BICYCLES.

Guard McLoughlin v. J. Geoghan, Ballyduff, for having an unlighted bicycle. Fined 3/- and 2/-.

Same v. D. Hoare, Carrageen, Conna, for having unlighted bicycle. Fined 3/6.

Same v. J. Coughlan, Carrageen, Conna, same offence. Fined 3/6.

Same v. E. Fitzgerald, Waterpark, same offence. Fined 3/6.

SCHOOL ATTENDANCE CASE.

This was a case in which Guard T. Tully, Ballyduff prosecuted Patrick Curley for non attendance of his children at school. There were two children in default. One went to school 15 days out of 31 while the other went five days out of 26.

Defendant was fined 6d. each case.

BREACH OF LICENSING ACT.

Inspector Holland prosecuted Mary Smith Tallow Road, with a breach of the Licensing Act.

Mr. Farrell for defendant.

Sergt. O'Shea said he found four men on the premises after hours. Two men he believed travellers were invited guests, but the other two D. Lehane and T. Hayes were not bona fide travellers. Lehane lived 2 miles 500 yards away, while Hayes lived 232 yards short of the three miles.

To Mr. Farrell—if they were by main road Hayes would be over the three-mile limit and Lehane would be a little short of it.

Miss Smith said her sister let in the travellers. She thought they were bona fide travellers.

Then, Hayes said he always reckoned that he was a bona fide traveller.

D. Lehane said he was reckoned by all the forces in Tallow for the past 33 years to be a traveller.

Mr. Farrell said that Miss Smith definitely thought these men were travellers and on that account he would ask the Justice to dismiss the case against her.

The case against Mary Smith was dismissed but Lehane and Hayes were fined 1/- each.

YOUTHS FINED.

The Attorney General v. Ballyduff youths.

Five youths from Ballyduff were charged with breaking six telegraph insulators in the Arglan-Ballyduff line.

Guard McLoughlin said he investigated this case.

Mr. Ed. Barry (telegraph official) said that in that area eighteen insulators had altogether been broken.

The ages of the boys ranged from 11 to 14 years.

The Justice imposed a fine of 2/6 with 2/6 compensation and 1/6 costs in each case.

One youth who broke two insulators was fined 2/6 extra.

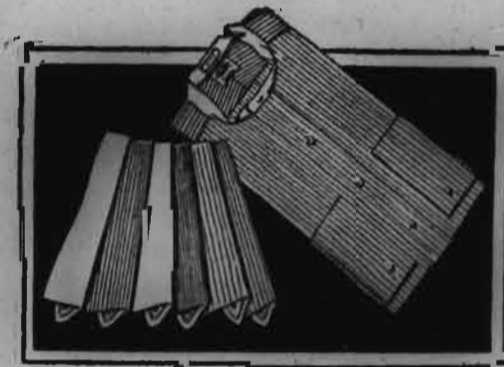
