### Thousands of Dead Fish in Blackwater.

Shallows Choked.

STRONG PROTEST BY MALLOW TROUT ANGLERS.

An extraordinary sight was witnessed on the Blackwater river at Mallow on Saturday, when from an early hour thousands of dead fish were observed floating downstream. Thousands of trout, salmon, ells, pike, and the smaller river denizens were all apparently the victims of some mysterious "Blitzkrieg."

For hours the melancholy scene was witnessed and hundreds of curious spectators thronged the river banks. At Carrigoon, about two miles below the Mallow town bridge the shallows were choked with thousands of trout in such a fashion that it was possible to cross the river by walking over dead fish.

It was learned in Mallow on Sunday night that from seven to ten miles of the

river was affected. Dead fish were found along the banks stretching for a distance up to ten miles. a local man stated. Some of these were salmon ten and twenty pounds in weight. It is wiser, in the case of milch cows, to spread it out on a grass field, as this greatly rangements should be made, when lifting The cheapest and best way I know of making beet tops into silage is to dig a shallow pit 2ft. or 3ft. deep, about 14ft, Many members spoke in support of the wide and any convenient length. The same pit will last an indefinite number of years. On all but sandy land, drainage must be

provided from the lowest point. The tops are carted into the pit and tipped up. The whole is levelled, and the pit so filled and carried upwards like a draw-over manure heap, as high as possible-say, 4ft. above the general level of the surrounding ground. The whole is then topped up and rounded off, after which it is covered with soil to a depth of 9 inches. The heap sinks a lot, and if, as is probable, cracks appear in the soil, these should be filled up. The secret of making good. silage is to keep both air and water out of

The material is removed by cutting out with a hay knife. Where a deeper pit can be made, a greater bulk of tops can be put together in a mass, thus reducing wastage; but depth increases drainage difficulty.

Surface rainwater must not be allowed to accumulate in that part of the pit from which the silage has been removed. If the soil and position won't allow drainage, the silage can be made on the surface of the ground like a clamp. This means, however, proportionately rather more waste. The depth from top to bottom cannot be as great as in a pit. As a rule, there is not as much waste on the sides as with stack

silage of ordinary green stuff. I think the reason for this is that sugarbeet tops are made into silage at a time of the year when there is very little drying, also the crowns in any case dry out less readily than do ordinary green crops. I have never seen growth of mould occur much in sugar-beet top silage. If the completed heap is given reasonable attention on the sides and top, and cracks in the earth filled up, little waste should occur.

Beet leaves can also be made into silage in various other types of containers. I once came across a case in which the tops were cut up, but I am sure that the extra trouble and expense were quite unnecessary. The simplest and least expensive methods are in my experience, as good as, if not better than, more elaborate ones for making good sugar-beet top silage.







Surely it is time that the Bacon Marketing Board and the factories, who benefit so much more than the feeders do, should settle the disputes that have arisen between themwhich is given as the cause of the unsatisfactory state of the market; otherwise both parties will wake up to the fact that prothat supplies will not be available in a short time, and consequently there will be an increase in the number of unemployed to record. Conditions of sale offered at Tuesday's market were that producers hand over to the factories' representatives their pigs, producers being paid £3 per pig deposit, the balance to be fowarded from the factories, calculated at 70/- per cwt. on the live weight basis on all pigs weighed on arrival there, with deduction of 2/6 for carriage per animal, and where weight was in excess of the standard rates.
