Best 1 1/2 year olds made from £7 10s. to £10 10s. 2 1/2 year olds, £13 to £16; 3 year olds, £17 to £20 although some well finished lots made up to £24; good young fat cows made up to £20; other sorts realised £9 to £14; springers were scarce and dear and made from £18 to £37. Some 3 male from 45s. to £13; lambs, 5s. to 45s. Pigs made from 25s. to £3 20th choice lbs. making up to £4. Bonbons £1 to 3d.
