The creamery representatives discussed with the Minister a revision in the arrangements made in regard to creamery butter values during the present season.

The Minister reminded the deputation that the price offered by the British Ministry of Food for creamery butter was 126/per cwt., delivered, and expressed his regret that despite all efforts no increase in this price had yet been obtained, but negotiations in the matter were still proceeding.

The reduction in output, with the consequent reduction in exports, had resulted in a substantial saving in bounty and subsidy, which would enable him to authorise an additional payment of 6/- per cwt. on all creamery butter produced this year. 

"I am glad to hear that an attempt is being made in Cork to draw the Gaelic League and the G.A.A. into close alliance with one another. This is a thing for which I have hoped for years and which I often tried to bring about, but so far the two bodies have kept much more apart than is, in my opinion, good for either of them. I was myself one of the original group of the G.A.A. when it was founded and was in close touch with Michael Cusack, and Oh! give me the field on a Sunday morn'. much as he cared for Irish games, I am convinced that not only he but the founders of the Association cared more for Ireland and that they saw in the revival of Irish games one means to defeat the deleterious foreign influences then at work in our race, just as we in the Gaelic League saw a different means to the same end in the reviving of the national language."

Truly, the aim of the G.A.A. is to foster the Irish language and Irish culture generally, apart altogether from organising games. Many members of the Association. 

L.S.F. AND NEW CIVIC SPIRIT. The Justice said there was a case of robbery with violence before him recently in that Court. His duty being confined to taking depositions, he was precluded from making any comments. Now that the case had been disposed of, and the men charged had been convicted, he desired to say that he was very much impressed by the efficiency and promptitude displayed by the Civic Guards both of Killeagh and Youghal in detecting the culprits, who were both from a distance, in an adjoining county, which fact added to their difficulties. He. therefore, could not allow the occasion to pass without expressing his sincere appreciation of the action of the Gardai. For some time past the Gardai hadn't been before him so frequently with minor cases, and he ascribed that fact to the establishment of the Local Security Force, which had evidently given rise to a new sense of a new civic spirit that would prove of incalculable benefit to the nation.

Supt. Kelly, Midleton, thanked the Justice for his complimentary remarks regarding the Gardai, and said he would have pleasure in bringing them to the notice of the proper authorities. 
