The Truth of the Position.
 Indications are not lacking that
 the next phase of the European
 conflict will be of an even more
 titanic nature than anything that
 has yet been seen. With the
 approach of more favourable con-
 ditions climatical the principal
 protagonists, it may be taken for
 granted, will exert their utmost—
 the one to endeavour to force the
 conflict up to a decisive climax;
 the other to delay a decision until
 such a moment as the resources at
 his command will have been
 appreciably augmented. The ar-
 rival of that time will mark not
 alone the crisis of the belligerent
 powers, but our crisis as well.
 Ours is a neutral country in so far
 as the struggle is concerned, but
 our neutrality of itself will not
 save us. As has been frequently
 stressed, we must depend solely on
 our own resources if we are to sur-
 vive the frightful perils that sur-
 round us. Plainly, it is a position
 that needs unexampled efforts and
 sacrifices on the part of us all.
 That is the naked truth of the
 situation, and it certainly cannot
 be counted other than an uncom-
 fortable truth. The grim fact to
 be recognised is that the nearer the
 present war draws to its inevitable
 climax, the greater our danger.
 Happily, up to the present we have
 escaped its worst consequences.
 Although our trade has been hit
 and our supplies cut off, and our
 rights as a neutral State have in
 some measure been violated (with-
 out occasion, loss of life or injury),
 our territory has not been invaded
 nor our national life seriously dis-
 located. However, it would be
 sheer folly to think that because
 nothing on a large scale has so far
 transpired it will never transpire
 here in Eire. The direct opposite
 is accurate. The longer the war
 drags on the greater the peril.
 There must, therefore, be a steady
 increase of the national effort.
 Every unit of our defence organi-
 sation, military and economic,
 must be tuned up to the highest
 key of proficiency. Let every
 Irishman and Irishwoman bear
 well in mind that apathy or pro-
 crastination might easily prove
 disastrous. If we are to come
 through the ordeal unscathed, it
 will be, under Providence, alto-
 gether attributable to our own
 powers of resistance.

Monthly Report Of Dr. M. O'Farrell, Co. M.O.H. January, 1941. INFECTIOUS DISEASES. The following Infectious Diseases were notified during the month—Scarlet Fever 2; Puerperal Fever 1; Tuberculosis 1.

NOTIFICATION OF BIRTHS. Births notified during the month numbered 53. Five records of sending for medical assistance were received. MATERNITY AND CHILD WELFARE. Jubilee nurses in their districts throughout the county attended six clinics. The attendance was as follows:—mothers 45; infants 28; children 30.

GENEAL SANITATION. The Sanitary Inspector reports that 386 inspections were carried out by Sanitary Sub-Officers. SHOPS (CONDITIONS OF EMPLOYMENT) ACT, 1938. A general inspection of shops in the district shows that the necessary stoves and heaters have been provided.

STREET ASSAULT Claim Against Guard Mr. Justice Sealy, at Waterford Circuit Court, gave a decree for £1 with District Court costs in a claim of £100 brought by Percy Brett, Morrison's Avenue, Waterford, a member of the Eire Army against John Lannon, The Terrace, Barrack Street, Waterford, a member of the Waterford Garda Síochána, on Monday.

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BELL'S Warble Fly Powder Judge Sealy said that in his view Garda Lannon exceeded his duties. Brett or his companions were not guilty of any offence in standing and talking in the pavement. He did not know whether they were responsible for the noise complained of by Guard Lannon, and they were entitled to the benefit of the doubt. Brett, however, seemed to him to be a pugnacious man, and he thought that after being told to move off, and pushed by Guard Lannon, he squared up to the Guard, and the latter then drew his baton and struck him. Brett was not entitled to aim a kick at Lannon unless his life was in danger and Lannon was entitled to defend himself from such a ferocious attack. Lannon, however, was wrong in the first instance and exceeded his rights.

ARDMORE COURT

UNLICENSED BULLS. Michael Collins, Ballinmorna, was charged with having an unlicensed bull. Dr. Counihan, State Selector, prosecuted. The offence having been proved against the defendant, he was fined 5s. and 14/6 costs.

SHEEP DIPPING CASES. Commissioner Moylan, Waterford, charged Richard Tobin, Kilmaloo, with an offence under the Sheep Dipping Act. Mr. M. M. Halley, Solicitor, Waterford, prosecuted. Evidence having been given by Mr. J. J. Walsh, M.R.C.V.S., defendant was fined 1s. with 10s. costs.

UNLICENSED VEHICLES. Sergeants Kilbride and Gallagher and Guard Devaney had a large number of persons summoned for using unlicensed vehicles and fines up to 5s. were imposed. SHERIFF'S COURT. Commissioner Moylan, Waterford, charged Richard Tobin, Kilmaloo, with an offence under the Sheep Dipping Act.

UNLICENSED CIVIL BILLS. A number of unlicensed civil bills were disposed of, Messrs. T. K. Keane, J. N. R. MacNamara and W. St. Clair Rice, appearing for the plaintiffs. HENNESSY v. WHITE. This was a civil bill for £10, for breach of warranty by Mee. Hennessy, Knockmonie, against John White, Castlemary, in connection with the sale of a pony.

TIMBER ON QUAY. Mr. Dalton, Timber Merchant, Carrick-on-Suir, owner of the quay wrote:—I very much regret to hear that you are obliged to leave my timber on the quay, but I am sure you will be able to find whatever of marketing the timber, I would have been glad to allow it to deteriorate during the period which it has been on the quay. I have been in touch with my various customers, and thing could be done to place it and enable me to restart my van district where I have a first of pitwood. I have been from one of my customers, a timber merchant, who is a first place in the demand for good and for the little bit of the question of transport. Ports is the all-important factor in a recent order from the Government no coal was exported to Eire from the quay. There the difficulty arises in bringing the timber to the quay. If, however, you can put us with guaranteed delivery, all out to promote trade.

Following the letter to me above is an extract we got from shipbrokers in Waterford, who are surrounding areas to assist in the quay. I have even got in touch with the motor vessel lying at Quay, could interest him, but up to you without success.

I am also making inquiries in Cardiff for the timber at present lying at the quay but will re-start drawing up and thereby pay a weekly sum to you. I feel satisfied that from the above that I am possible effort to relieve the timber. I therefore feel certain that receive favourable consideration for the timber. I am sure that you will mean that far more be circulated in Dungarvan the case with timber on the quay.
