PARISH COUNCILS  
Regional Commissioner to  
Attend.  
The following correspondence has been received by Mr. C. J. Murphy, P.C., hon. sec. Parish Council:—  
"National Bank Buildings, The Quay, Waterford, 13th Feb. 1941. To C. J. Murphy, Esq., Secretary, Dungarvan Parish Council. Dear Mr. Murphy:—I regret having been unable to write you earlier on the question of a Group meeting of Parish Councils as there have been a number of difficulties to overcome. If you would make arrangements for such a meeting on the 26th inst., I shall be glad. I do not know definitely as yet what Parish Councils would attend this meeting, but a number, such as Old Parish, Ring and possibly, Modeligo, etc.—would be willing to attend. It may be of interest to know that I am bringing the Regional Commissioner (in whom all ultimate power in the event of an emergency would be vested) with me. I shall be glad to learn that you will make the necessary arrangements. I would suggest that the hour of 8.30 p.m. (new time) be fixed, and I shall let you know later what Councils precisely will be attending.—Miss, E. Meas, W. S. McGarry, County Commissioner, Waterford."  
A further letter, under date 18th inst. from Mr. McGarry to Mr. Murphy, stated:—  
"I am much obliged for your prompt reply of the 15th inst. I will notify the Parish Councils. I cannot state yet how many may be expected. As regards the attendance of your own Council, I think that all members might attend. I note your commendable work in connection with the allotment schemes, and hope that they prove successful."  
Meetings will be held at three centres, viz., Dungarvan (26th), Cappoquin (27th), and Portlaw (28th). All meetings will be held at 8.30 p.m. (new time), and Parish Councils should make a special effort to attend one or other of these meetings.

**COUNTY BOARD OF PUBLIC ASSISTANCE.**  
**ATTENDANTS AT CO. HOME.**  
The Matron, Co. Home, reported—The Inspector, Local Government and Public Health objected to the number of attendants employed in the Co. Home. I was therefore obliged to disperse with the services of Josie Kiely who was engaged on the 4th inst. I find it would be impossible to do without a male attendant in the Home Hospital as the services of Mr. Convery who was employed on 8th ult. were therefore retained. Josie Kiely left on the 15th.  
The Board decided to ask the sanction of the Minister for Local Government and Public Health, to the appointment of Mr. Convery.

**ALLOTMENT PLOTS.**  
Mr. Hegarty, City Manager and Town Clerk, wrote regarding the national emergency, and stated that he understood that the Board of Assistance own a field situated at the back of the Fever Hospital, and asking whether the Board would be prepared to let it to the Corporation for the purpose of allotments.  
The Board unanimously decided to give the field, which contains one acre, for £1.  
**TENDER FOR EGGS.**  
The tender of Mrs. Farrell, Ardagh, Lismore, for the supply of eggs to the Lismore District Hospital for the month of March, at 1/8 per dozen, was accepted.  
**STOCKTAKERS APPOINTED.**  
There were three applicants for the position of stocktaker at the County Home and District Hospital, viz. Mr. C. Moylan, Dungarvan; Mr. James Hayes, Main Street, do, and Mr. Michael O'Connor, Duckpool.  
Mr. M. Cullen—Christy Moylan was the stocktaker last term?  
Secretary—Yes.  
Mr. Cullen—Did he carry out the duties satisfactorily?  
Secretary—Yes. He was stocktaker the last few terms.  
Mr. Cullen—I propose that the three names be put in a hat and drawn.  
Mr. Cullen proposed that Christy Moylan be appointed.  
It was decided to take a vote between the three, and the following was the result:—  
For Moylan—Messrs. T. Cullen, M. Cullen, and the Chairmen—(3).  
For Hayes—Commissioner Moynihan, Messrs. Caulfield, Power, and C. O'Riordan—(4).  
Mr. Hayes was appointed, subject to sanction.

**FINANCIAL STATEMENT.**  
The financial statement submitted by the Secretary showed a credit balance of £4,921 at the end of the month.  
**CO. HOME SEWERS.**  
A letter from Mr. Bowen, Co. Surveyor, regarding the above was referred to the Urban District Council for their attention.  
**REPORT OF MR. ORMONDE, B.E.**  
Mr. Ormonde, B.E., reported on dampness in two wards at the Co. Home. These are two top wards of the female section. The dampness does not seem to be very serious but the existing plaster is of little use. It would be advisable to replaster both wards. Some external attention to roof and gutters is also required. Estimated cost £48.  
It was ordered that the engineer carry out the work.  
**SCULLERY AT CO. HOME.**  
With reference to the application for scullery for attendant's kitchen at Co. Home, Mr. Ormonde reported that it would be very desirable. There is very little space or convenience for the purpose of washing and no possibility of embodying it within the building. Under the circumstances it would be necessary to construct an annex off the kitchen at the rear. This would consist of concrete wall, floor and roof, complete with water and all necessary apparatuses would cost from £80 to £90.  
The matter was adjourned.

**TIMBER, ETC., FOR REPAIRS.**  
Mr. Ormonde wrote requesting authority to get a supply of timber for repairs to windows, doors, floors, etc., at Co. Home, also for nails screws and other small items, at an estimated cost of the requirements of about £60.  
Mr. Caulfield—That is nearly £200 in the three reports.  
Commissioner Moynihan—Timber will hardly get any dearer.  
It was decided to get the timber as required only.  
**RETREAT FOR CO. HOME INMATES.**  
Canon O'Brien wrote regarding the custom of having retreats for inmates in County House, stating the expenses of these retreats are borne by the Boards of Health. The total cost would not exceed £10. He will gladly keep the Retreat Father during his stay.  
The Board decided to adopt the custom.  
The Board approved of the provision of 60 yards of steam piping to replace deficient piping in Co. Hospital on the recommendation of Mr. Jephson, engineer.

**PLOUGHING.**  
Mr. Foley reported that the ploughing of the field was begun that day and it was agreed that Mr. Ormonde, B.E. be asked to measure the plots when same was completed, after which the plots would be numbered and drawn for at the meeting on Monday night next at 9 p.m.

**CARETAKER FOR LISMORE DISPENSARY.**  
Mrs. E.M. Wright was appointed as caretaker of the above in succession to her mother who died recently.  
**INCREASE FOR CARETAKER.**  
The adjourned application of Miss Delaney, caretaker, for an increase of salary was considered.  
The Secretary said her salary was increased in 1935 from £4 to £5.  
Mr. Cunningham—Is this for tenancy?  
Secretary—No, she has £3 for rent and £5 as caretaker.  
Mr. Cunningham—I understand she has other duties now.  
Secretary—If clinics are held there she is allowed 2/6 for each.  
Mr. Caulfield proposed that she get an increase of £1.  
Mr. Cunningham seconded.  
This was passed unanimously.  
**PAYMENT REFUSED.**  
A letter from the Department refused payment to the Superintendent Assistant Officer who did duty in the Bonmahon Dispensary District during the illness of the Assistance officer.  
Mr. Caulfield—That means they are asking him to work for nothing.  
Mr. Power—Have they paid on previous occasions?  
Secretary—Yes, he was paid in Clonmel and other places.  
Mr. Power—it is bad enough what they did to his son, now they want to victimise himself. They have sanctioned payment before and now they won't sanction it.  
Mr. Phelan said he had been paid previously for doing duty in the same area.  
The matter was referred back to the Department for re-consideration.  
**EVACUEES.**  
A long circular regarding the question of evacuees from England was before the meeting.  
This pointed out that evacuees would be supplied with free train vouchers and lodging allowance at the following rates: mothers 5/- a week; children over 14 5/-; and children under 14 years 3/-.  
**SESKINANE DISPENSARY.**  
Mr. Doyle, engineer, reported that a portion of the roof of the above was stripped during the recent storm, and as the matter was urgent he had employed a contractor to do the work. Some plaster from the wall was also dislodged but this need not
