Mr. Brendan—It was not a legal final. The Chairman ruled that Knockanore becomes champions by default as Eastern Clubs were suspended. The Chairman added that he would be delighted if the matter was appealed to the Munster Council to see what they would do.

DEATH OF Mr. NICHOLAS WALSH, Ballyduff, Dungarvan.

It is with very deep regret that we announce the death, on Sunday morning last, of Mr. Nicholas Walsh, Ballyduff, Dungarvan, which occurred at his residence after a brief illness, and at an early age.

Deceased, who had been attending to his business up to a few weeks before his death, farmed on a large and practical scale. He was one of the most popular and respected gentlemen in the county, and a general favourite with everybody. Sprung from a well-known and widely connected family, the deceased was son of the late Mr. and Mrs. James Walsh, Ballyduff. In his young days he was a prominent member of the Dungarvan Hurling and Football team when that team was second to none in the county, and was a member of the team that brought the first hurling championship to Dungarvan. He was an all-round sportsman, a crack shot with a fowling piece, a scientific exponent with the gloves (he was a most enthusiastic boxer), and a good judge of bloodstock, particularly horses and greyhounds. His early demise is greatly regretted by his very large circle of friends, and to his wife and young family the deepest sympathy is extended in their great loss.

On Tuesday evening the remains were removed from Ballyduff to the Parish Church, Dungarvan, and were followed by an extremely large and representative cortege drawn from all parts of the county and outside it, testifying to the esteem in which the deceased and his family are held. The remains were received at the church gates by Rev. T. B. Walsh, B.A., C.C., and Rev. Jas. Walsh, G.C., Carrickbeg (cousin of the deceased).

On Tuesday morning Requiem Office and High Mass was offered for the happy repose of his soul. The celebrant was Rev. James Walsh, C.C., Carrickbeg; deacon, Rev. D. Power, C.C., Dungarvan; sub-deacon, Rev. J. J. Power, C.C., Kilgobinet; Very Rev. T. Canon O'Brien, P.P., V.F., presided.

Death of Mrs. H. Browne, Convent Road, Dungarvan.

The death took place on Thursday morning, 13th inst. of Mrs. Hannah Browne, Convent Road, to the great regret of her family and a large circle of friends.

Of a refined and gentle disposition, the deceased lady was beloved by all, who had the pleasure of her acquaintance. She was widow of T. W. Browne, ex-Head Constable, R.I.C., who had pre-deceased her by a few years. To her bereaved daughters and son the deepest sympathy is extended in the loss of a long and devoted mother.

There was a large attendance at the removal of the remains to the Parish Church, Dungarvan, on Thursday evening, where the coffin was received by the Rev. T. B. Walsh, C.C., who recited the prayers for the dead.

The burial takes place to-day (Friday), at 1 p.m.

Death of Lieut. V. Wall, Colligan.

The death occurred at the County Hospital, Waterford, on Saturday evening of Vincent Wall, Colligan, Dungarvan. The deceased young man who was only in the late twenties was a popular figure in Dungarvan, where he was extremely well-liked and respected while at business there up to 1934 when he joined the National Army. Here his sterling worth was immediately recognised and his promotion rapid, being appointed 2nd Lieut. in the 8th Thomonds. Failing health, however, compelled him to resign from the Army in March, 1940.

There was a large number of officers and men of the National Army, including Capt. J. O'Meara, at the removal of the remains from the Co. Hospital on Sunday evening last, when the funeral took place to Colligan Church. On Monday morning after the celebration of Masses of Requiem the remains were interred in the adjoining cemetery. Very Rev. J. Roche, P.P., assisted by Very Rev. P. Cummins, Prior O.S.A., Cork, and Rev. J. J. Power, C.C., Kilgobinet, read the burial service.

FOOD PRODUCTION. Despite the unfavourable conditions, farmers, cottiers and plot-holders should make an effort to plant as much food as possible. Therefore it behoves everybody to grow as much food as possible.

Theirs is a big responsibility but they are equal to the task, happy in the thought that in this hour of great national danger they have proved themselves worthy citizens of Ireland. RECENT DEATHS. The funeral to Ardmore cemetery of Mr. James Lenane, was of large and representative proportions. A large body of the L.D.F., of which deceased was a most active and enthusiastic member, marched in the funeral procession and rendered military honours at the internment. Very Rev. Fr. Byrne, P.P., and Rev. Fr. Walsh, C.C., officiated.

The death occurred recently, at the early age of 23 years, of Miss Mary Morrissey, only daughter of Mr. M. and Mrs. Morrissey, of Loughtane, Clashmore. Deceased, who was in normal health up to a short time ago, was a general favourite and her premature death has occasioned much regret. The funeral to Clashmore Cemetery was of imposing dimensions. Rev. Fr. Power, C.C., Clashmore, officiated.

CLASHMORE L.D.F. PARADE. On Sunday last the members of the Ardmore, Clashmore and Killaneigh L.D.F. Groups, in charge of their respective leaders, travelled to Youghal for rifle practice on the range at Clacastle. On arrival at Youghal Military Barracks the Groups were received and welcomed by Comms. Halpin, O.C., and served with dinner. They then marched to the range where all arrangements were in charge of Lieut. O'Shea, Lieut. Regan, Lieut. Reavin, Sergt. Heffernan and Corporal O'Mahony. Each man fired ten rounds—five rounds grouping practice and five rounds application practice. The results were highly satisfactory, some splendid marksmanship being witnessed. At the conclusion of the range practice the L.D.F., in charge of Corporal B. O'Mahony, marched back through the town to the Military Barracks where they were dismissed and entertained by tea.

The rules in connection with the running of the scheme were then decided on and those awarded plots expressed their agreement to abide by them.
