KILMACHTHOMAS NOTES

L.D.F. Kilrossanty, Kill and Stradbally Groups assembled at the range at Scrahan, Kilmachthomas, on Sunday evening last, when they fired their course with a Springfield rifle and ball ammunition.

The first week of the fortnight's mission in the united parishes of Ballyduff and Portlaw, was brought to a successful close on Sunday evening last at the Parish Church, Ballyduff. The Missioners engaged—the Rev. Fathers Ignatius and Finian, of the Passionist Order, Mount Argus, Dublin, are this week functioning at the beautiful church in Portlaw, whereas at Ballyduff, they are having crowded congregations at both the morning and evening services, and a constant stream of penitents to the confessionals daily.

Miss Josephine (Joe) Flynn, who died at the Cottage Hospital, Dungarvan, on Wednesday night of last week, after a brief illness, was a native of West Waterford, and was employed by the universally esteemed Foley family, of Ballynabogue, Kilmachthomas, for the last forty years.

On Thursday evening the remains were conveyed to St. Anne's Church, Ballylannan, where they were met by the Rev. P. F. Walsh, C.C., Stradbally, who recited the prayers for the dead.

Following the celebration of Requiem Mass, next morning, all that was mortal of the late Miss Flynn was reverently laid to rest in the adjoining cemetery in the presence of a big gathering of neighbours.

At both the 8.30 and 11 o'clock Masses in St. Anne's Church on Sunday, prayers were said for the eternal repose of the gentle soul departed—Ar Deo Deo go raig a h-anam.

POPULAR STRADBALLY PARISHONER'S DEISE.
