Some weeks ago I suggested that there would be many yearling hens kept on for another year's laying. This is now happening. Quite a number of poultrykeepers have told me that they intend to

vearlings for egg pro The chief difficulty with yearlings is their slowness to moult. But, if you can only persuade them to moult in good time, there is no reason why they should not give a good account of themselves, Some rouble is needed in sorting out and nanaging the birds. It is impossible to get good results if they are left to themselves, as they will keep in production all through the late summer and then moult in autumn. After an autumn moult it is too late for them to recover body condition

in time to produce in autumn. We must be prepared to step in, upset Nature's laws, and force them to moult, Selected birds should have a good rest, and ten weeks is not too long. This means an August-September moult. If g can manage to get my yearlings into production by end of October, there is every likelihood of their laying right through

Fits.-A fit is a phenomenon that may be encountered by anyone, anywhere, at some knowledge of what one should do. Fits can be divided into three varieties (1) epilepsy; (2) hysteria; (3) infantile Epilepsy is a sudden and complete los

of consciousness in persons of any age The signs usually present are: - the patient falls to the ground, sometimes with a scream, and passes into a state of convulsion affecting the whole of the body and limbs, which may in consequence be injured through contact with surounding objects: the face is flushed at first and rapidly becomes livid; frothing at the mouth and biting of the tongue may have decided on having their first score occur. Special treatment—(1) pull the patient away from a source of danger leading players throughout East Cork will such as machinery, a wall or fireplace, to take part, including Con Sexton, Youghal, prevent him hurting himself. Special treatment-(1) strip the child and support it in a hot bath so that the water covers the whole of doctor arrives.
