BLACKWATER FISHERY CONSERVATORS

At the monthly meeting of the Lismore Board of Fishery Conservators at Fermoy, Mr. R. G. Annesley, Chairman, presided. Others present: Miss G. Montgomerie, Lieut. Colonel E. M. Pennefather, Captain Davison, Messrs. J. Hackett, U.D.C.; C. Deane, and G. Fitzgerald, Mr. J. J. Kenny, Inspector, was in attendance.

The Chairman said that since their last meeting, they had received a letter from Mr. R. Sheehan, Newmarket, regretting that owing to the scarcity of petrol and the long distance which he had to travel he was unable to attend the meetings, and he wished to tender his resignation as a member.

The Board unanimously decided not to accept Mr. Sheehan's resignation as that did not wish to lose his services, and that when his period of absence terminated they would co-opt him.

The Chairman said he would wish to state that these cases were very well conducted by the solicitors, Inspector and Clerk.

Mr. Hackett said that he thought that the evidence given in recent cases would justify the Board asking for an enquiry into the making of a by-law in regard to the use of trammel nets at Ballycotton.

After a discussion it was decided that the Clerk would place the whole facts before the Department for consideration.

A letter was read from the Department in connection with the progress of the collection of the rates, and requesting that they would be kept informed in connection with the recovery of arrears on the Ballinlevelane fishery.

The Clerk said this matter was in the hands of the Land Commission.

After a discussion in connection with the arrears of rates outstanding, and the Clerk pointed out that unless the rates were paid the Board could not retain the bailiffs, and if they could not do that, they could not preserve the river and have fish.

The Department were pressing to have these arrears collected, but it appeared to him that there was some organised move- ment not to pay, in regard to some of the fisheries. Persons who had previously been paying, did not pay this year.

Mr. Fitzgerald proposed that the solicitor be instructed to take proceedings against the defaulters.

Captain Davison seconded the proposi- tion which was passed.

The Inspector in the course of his report for the month stated that the number of salmon killed this year in June was similar to that of the corresponding period of 1940, but there was an increase of about 2,000 killed. The average weight of salmon was 10 lbs. and grise 5 1/2 lbs. Netting for dace in the portion of the river owned by the Lismore Estate Co. was carried out and some of the fish taken were

CROP PRICES TOO LOW

Beet Growers Meet.

Dissatisfaction with prices for beet, wheat, barley, and oats for the coming season was expressed at the 14th annual meeting of the Irish Sugar Beet Growers' Association in Dublin, when a call was made to the Government to reconsider the prices after consultation with representatives of the agricultural community.

Other resolutions were passed:— Demanding that the price of crushed oats and barley meal in the cereal year be published before farmers sell their harvest;

Requesting that prices and distribution of seeds and manures be rigidly controlled and that the relative proportion of manures for the beet crop be placed in the hand of the Sugar Co. for distribution to growers;

Requesting that licensed and unlicensed vehicles be permitted to haul beet next season, and that the same facilities be given to private hauliers to transport beet and wheat as to public companies.

Asking State aid for production of lime and the opening of quarries.

Disapproving the report of the Transport Tribunal as published in the newspapers; Requesting an increase in the number of cattle export licenses and a more equitable distribution.

A resolution requesting the Land Com- mission to defer collection of land annuities until after the harvest, owing to the state of the live stock industry, was with- drawn.

It was decided to send a deputation to the Minister for Agriculture regarding more drastic restrictions in cases of foot-and-mouth disease.

PRICES CONTRAST

Mr. J. Kearney (Kerry) said it was ridiculous to pay 5/- and 6/- a stone for feeding stuffs which were not worth 6d. Farmers of his county might be forced to hold wheat for feeding.

Mr. M. Corry, T.D., said prices for artificial manures would have to be reduced. Wheat could not be produced without it. No farmer could sell wheat at £16 a ton and pay £18 to £20 for feeding stuffs.

Mr. J. Haverly (Tuam) thought it would be wrong to hold back crops. Mr. O'Donoghue (Cork) agreed, and said he would sell every grain.

Rev. M. Fynn (Mayo) said the farmer was entitled to an adequate price. Mr. P. Beegan, T.D., regarded the increase in the growth of beet as satisfactory. The crop promised a good sugar content. He would not agree with the threat of withholding grain.

FERTILISER SUPPLY. Mr. J. Hughes, T.D., said farmers had done their job well. There was no reason why they should continue to grow cheap food.

Mr. J. N. Greene (Carlow) understood that there was "any amount" of sulphate of ammonia in Britain. He suggested bargaining for some of it.

Mr. Haverly said beet growers should use more of the sugar factories' waste lime. Machinery might be set up to dry it.

Messrs. Scully (Mallow), C. Meany, T. D.; J. Finlay (Thurles), W. Desmond (Mallow), T. Walsh and Senator O'Callaghan (Mallow) also spoke.

MORE MEMBERS.

The statement of accounts showed that 21,585 tons of pulp was marketed during the year, compared with 15,455 tons in the previous year. Sa's totalled £141,722 against £67,616 for the year ended March 31, 1940.

The report of the chairman (Mr. W. Mullins, Kilkenny), and the secretary (Mr. A. M. Fahy), stated that the number of growers was 31,601, and the number of shareholders, members, at March 1 last, 39,550. During the year 2,477 new members were admitted.

Total acreage contracted for this year was 76,462 against 59,624 last year, and 40,761 in 1939.

CATCH CROPS.

The Minister for Agriculture desires once again to impress on farmers the seriousness of the position regarding supplies of winter and spring feeding for live stock. Supplies of imported feeding stuffs are unobtainable. The yield of the hay crop will probably be below average. There is a reduction in the area under that crop and an increase in the numbers of live stock. The supply of fodder available from all sources is therefore likely to be inadequate. To make up to some extent the deficiency, the Minister urges farmers to place the maximum area under catch crops.

Supplies of imported seeds of vetches, rape and rye are negligible and farmers must rely on such home grown seed of these crops as is available. Farmers who have saved, or are arranging to save seed of any of these crops and who find that they have a surplus over and above their own requirements should see that it is made available for other farmers either directly or through a seedsmen. Adequate supplies of seed of Italian ryegrass will, however, be available throughout the country and as this is one of the most valuable of catch crops it should be sown to the greatest extent possible by all farmers this season.

Farmers desiring information should consult the local Agricultural Instructor, and obtain a copy of leaflet No. 89 on catch crops from the Department of Agriculture.
