### CENTRAL COUNCIL MEETING

At a meeting of the Central Council, G.A.A., on Saturday of last week, it was decided that at the next meeting on Sept. 27th, Irish shall be the language spoken, as a gesture of the national spirit that pervades an association which stands for everything that is Irish. Arising out of a notice of motion by Mr. C. McGough, it was ruled that in the event of a province being obliged to nominate a county for an All-Ireland semi-final owing to their provincial championships not being finished, if that county be successful in the All-Ireland semi-final, but be defeated in the provincial championship before the date of the All-Ireland final, its place in the final shall be taken by the provincial champions. If, however, the provincial championships be not completed before the All-Ireland final, the county, if successful in the final, shall become All-Ireland champions, irrespective of the subsequent result of the provincial championships.

Dates, venues and officials for All-Ireland finals were fixed as follows: J.H.—Galway vs Limerick, at Ennis (Sept. 21)—M. Hennessy (Clare). J.F.—Cavan v Kerry, at Croke Park (Sept. 21) J. Flaherty (Tullamore). M.P.—Roscommon v Louth, at Longford (Sept. 21)—S. Kennedy (Donegal).

The minor hurling final will be played at Croke Park before the senior hurling final on September 28. Referee—Dr. Stuart (Dublin), if not required for senior final.

Asked concerning the position in minor ranks if Laoghaiss were prevented playing by foot-and-mouth disease in the county, the chairman ruled that Leinster must go out of the minor championship.

Mr. S. Gibbons (Kilkenny) asked was there a possibility of the All-Ireland final being postponed, as Kilkenny had been free from foot-and-mouth disease for a week, and should no further case occur in the next ten days might be in a position to play again.

The Chairman ruled that the All-Ireland hurling final must be played on September 28.

Next Sunday's hurling matches at Roscrea and Cork will decide the referee as well as the teams for the All-Ireland hurling final. Three candidates are in the running—Dr. Healy v Cork or Limerick—Dr. Stuart (Dublin); if Dublin v Limerick—J. Regan (Cork); if Dublin v Cork—W. O'Donnell (Tipperary).
