On the assumption that your Council will be good enough to make a note in the minutes at the next

meeting to the effect that it was not intended to imply that we are necessarily at fault, and that it is recognised that we repudiate all responsibility for the failure, then as a matter of courtesy to your Council and to help to get the job finished, we are quite prepared to attend the conference at our own expense as a matter of grace on our part."

Clerk—This letter was shown to the solicitor, and here is his reply:—

"I have carefully considered Messrs. Delap and Waller's letter of the 11th inst. It seems to me that they are reading into the Council's order a meaning that it was never meant to contain. No differentiation is made in the order between the consulting engineers, the contractor, and others concerned. He made a detailed in-spection and found that there is a fair amount of water that may be availed of and is having this made available as soon as possible. He would suggest that the water be cut off from the town during certain hours, to enable the water in the reservoir to be

Mr. Hassett also reported inspect-ing above, where the water is very low at present. He recommended that the water be shut off for some hours at night, so that the 20,000 gallon tank could be filled. Possibly it would also be useful to shut off this supply for some hours during the day also. In the case of this supply, as well as Kiladangan, the hours for cutting off could be definitely fixed and made known to the public, and thus ensure a supply to all levels of the town during particular hours. In the method adopted, due consideration must be given to the possibilities of a fire in the urban area.

Mr. Hassett said that in both cases the water is very low, and if the Council could arrange for the cutting off of the water during certain hours for the next couple of weeks, it would give the tanks a chance of filling. It is all unfiltered water that is coming
