America's Attitude. Shrewd observers predicted some months ago that the neutrality position between the United States of America and Germany would continue while it lasted each country just that long and no longer. Today all the indications are that the relations between those two powerful nations are about to undergo a radical change. The American Government is supporting by action its oft-repeated declaration that it would see that the goods it sent to England arrived safely. The occupation of Iceland is of incalculable value to the British and Americans. If America takes her precious cargoes safely to Iceland, the British Navy is left a comparatively short route to guard the shores of Great Britain. But it is difficult to believe that even as far as Iceland is going to be the maximum distance that will be patrolled and guarded by the U.S. fleet and its air arm. Should the ships from America be sunk in large numbers after leaving Iceland, it is clear from the U.S. Government's policy that it would take steps in the danger zone nearest to Great Britain. Thus, it does not appear possible for Germany to use the United States to avoid dashing on the high seas. Germany will not stand aside and let pass a flow of vital commodities for one of her chief foes, if not the chief foe. She cannot do so and hope to win the war.

NEW BISHOP OF ROSS

Consecration Ceremony In Skibbereen.

The consecration of Very Rev. Denis Moynihan, as Bishop of Ross in succession to the late Most Rev. Dr. Casey, took place in the Pro-Cathedral Skibbereen, on Sunday, this continuing the great line of Prelates which began when St. Fachtna founded the diocese 1,400 years ago.

Six members of the Irish Hierarchy participated in the ceremony which was attended by a large number of clergy and a great gathering of laity.

The consecrating prelate was Most Rev. Dr. O'Brien, Bishop of Kerry; his assistants being Most Rev. Dr. Roche, Bishop of Cloyne, and Most Rev. Dr. Kinane, Bishop of Waterford.

The other prelates present were Most Rev. Dr. Cohanlan, Bishop of Cork; Most Rev. Dr. Keane, Bishop of Limerick; and Most Rev. Dr. Browne, Bishop of Galway.

The Nuncio Apostolic, Most Rev. Paschal Robinson, was represented by Right Rev. Monsignor Enrici, Secretary to the Nunciature, who conveyed the Apostolic Mandate, which was read at the opening of the ceremony by Right Rev. Monsignor Hill, P.P., V.G., Clonakilty.

Rev. H. Fitzgerald represented Most Rev. Dr. Downey, Archbishop of Liverpool.

The vicinity of the church and the streets of the town were beautifully decorated and scrolls and banners bore bilingual greetings to the new Bishop.

St. Fachtna's Silver Band, Skibbereen; Baltimore Schools' Brass Band; and Killarney Pipers' Band played hymns in the precincts of the church.

ROSS-KERRY LINKS.
The Diocese of Ross has many religious and historic ties with Kerry and the new prelate comes of ancient Cork-Kerry lineage. His Kerry forebears at one time owned substantial landed property between his native parish of Rathmore, Co. Kerry, and Millstreet, Co. Cork.

The new Bishop's great-uncle, Humphrey Moynihan, of Breenersfield, married Catherine O'Connell, of Derrynane, sister of Daniel O'Connell.

THE CEREMONY.
The Bishop-Elect accompanied by the Consecrating Prelate, his assistants, the other members of the Hierarchy, clergy, and acolytes walked in procession from the robing place to the Pro-Cathedral.

Members of the L.D.F. and Civic Guards lined the route. At the entrance to the church there was a guard of honour of members of the Knights of Malta Ambulance Unit, Killarney, under Dr. T. O'Sullivan and Mr. J. O'Keefe, captain. St. Fachtna's Silver Band played sacred music.

THE SERMON.
Very Rev. Dr. Herlihy, All Hallows College, Dublin, who like Dr. Moynihan, is a native of the parish of Rathmore, preached the consecration sermon which was well part of the ceremony, was broadcast.

Dr. Herlihy said that the corporate body of the Church represented in the first instance by the Twelve Apostles, had survived the dangers of tyranny and despotism. Whatever changes the future might hold, whatever else might be turned into dust by Time's corroding hand the Divinely-established episcopate would remain, and would discharge its sacred trust even though it be on a highway cluttered with the ruins of civilisation. The office of Bishop was no less onerous to-day than when it weighed heavily on the strong shoulders of St. Paul.

"Whatever side we turn to," he said, "we are confronted by the enemies of truth; the infidel is courted; the apostate is admired, and the Christian ethic is openly set aside. We know, however, that the Church will survive, but we have no assurance that it will not suffer temporary setbacks in the conflict with evil."

The new bishop, he said, was admirably fitted for the discharge of his episcopal trust.

"In this day of his enthronement," said Dr. Herlihy, "the truest eulogy that I can use is simply to quote the words of St. Paul when he sketched the portrait of a Christian priest as 'a steward of God he was above reproach.'"

Most Rev. Dr. Moynihan had come from Kerry to rule the ancient See of Ross. His mission was not to rekindle the dying embers of a once glorious faith; nor to administer amid the ruins of a Church which once flourished. He would be surrounded wherever he went by a people loyal and devoted to Christ. He came to oversee a vineyard that was planted and watered and pruned and that brought forth abundant fruit.
