WATERFORD CO. BOARD OF PUBLIC HEALTH.

MR. S. J. MOYNIHAN, Commissioner, presided at a meeting of the Waterford Co. Board of Public Health, held in the Secretary's Office, Co. Home, Dungarvan, on Wednesday last. Also present were Dr. M. O'Farrell, Co. M.O.H., Messrs. Jephson, Ormonde, Dunne, Doyle, Asst. Co. Surveyors, Mr. M. O'Flynn, Secretary, and Mrs. P. A. Croke, assistant do.

LETTING OF COTTAGES.
Cottage No. 22, Ballyvadd, was let to Mr. John Regan, Ballyvohalane, Kill.

TRAMORE WATER SUPPLY.
A letter forwarded by the Tramore Public Health Committee, was read from Mr. J. Devlin, Patrick Street, Tramore, relative to the scarcity of water at his house at Patrick Street, especially since the Pipes were cleaned.

An order was made that the engineer report as to whether separate pipes are connected with these houses, Mr. Knoph to report as to the position regarding the rent of these houses.

WELL AT SHANAKILL.
Mr. Dunne, B.E., reported inspecting the well at Shanakill in the land of Mr. P. White. The well is open to pollution from surface water off the field and cattle have easy access to it. The estimated cost of enclosing this well would be about £10. There is another well about 200 yards away which is convenient for about 8 families in the locality. This well is enclosed by a brick wall and free from pollution. This should satisfy the needs of the people living there.

The matter was referred to the Engineer to have the well inspected.

BALLINASCISLA WELL.
Mr. Jephson, B.E., recommended the cleaning of this well at an estimated cost of £5.

The matter was approved, the Engineer to get the work done.

CROOKE WATER SUPPLY.
Mr. Jephson, B.E., reported on the above recommended that the well on Mr. White's land be piped to the road, about 40 yards, and a fountain could be erected. There is a good fall. The report stated that Mr. White does not want them trespassing on the land, and wants some of the water for the cattle. The cost would be about £15 to £20.

An order was made that the Engineer get the work done at a cost not exceeding the estimate.

PERMISSION GRANTED.
Permission was granted on the usual conditions to Mr. M. Barry when he asked to connect with the water main where it passes his house at Ballinacourty, for the purpose of getting a supply for his cattle. He stated he was cutting off his supply on his land at Ballylamper.

ROSSDUFF WELL.
Mr. Jephson reported inspecting the well at Rosduff which he found practically dry, with no overflow from it. The water was stagnant and unfit for use at present. He recommended having it analysed, before it is enclosed.

The matter was referred to the Co. Surveyor to have the analysis made.

BATHGORMACK PUMP.
A number of residents of Bathgormack wrote asking the Board to have the pump in the village, at present out of order repaired, as it was a great inconvenience to them.

The matter was referred to the Engineer for a report.

BALLYLANEEN WATER SUPPLY.
At the request of Mr. M. Morrissey, T.D., re the necessity of providing a water supply to the village of Ballylaneen, Mr. J. Bowen, B.E., Co. Surveyor, reported that he had not a report from the Geological Society Office, which says that probably a sufficient supply could be obtained. The report is not very helpful in this case. He also had the place examined by a water diviner and a suitable site has been selected. The depth is given as 30 to 35 feet. The well should be excavated and recommended that this should be done by direct labour, and at a cost of probably not more than £75.

An order was made that the Co. Surveyor be authorised to have the work done by direct labour, at a cost not exceeding the estimate, subject to sanction by the Department of Local Government and Public Health.

COOLROE WELL.
Mr. M. Morrissey, T.D., also wrote on behalf of the Coolroe residents and the necessity of having a well sunk at Coolroe, Carrick-on-Suir,

which matter had been raised some months ago.

The matter was referred to the Engineer for a report.

TRAMORE PUBLIC HEALTH COMMITTEE.
The above Committee reported that at a meeting on Sept. 25th, it was stated in reply to communication of the 20th September that a copy of the agreement in connection with the purchase of the Promenade Plot was asked for, was that it was believed that the agreement has been infringed; and further the Committee had in their minds the improvement of the ground and would be anxious to know how they stood in the matter.

The Board decided to ask in what way any agreement has been infringed, and also as to suggested improvements.

At the same meeting it was recommended that the fountain at Roche's, Riverstown, be removed to

the opposite side of the road; as the gully trap is not able to take the water, thereby causing damage to the road. The Committee stated that the Burial Grounds look so well now that the grass should be kept cut, and it was recommended that a lawn mower be purchased for the purpose.

The Engineer was directed to report as to the fountain and also as to the need for a lawn mower.

The following matters were also brought to the notice of the Committee.

1—The dangerous corner on the right of the entrance from Love Lane to Donecraile.

The matter was referred to the Co. Surveyor.

2—The state of the women's bathing slip—the concrete in places is holed and got into ridges and the foundation of the slip is being worn away by the tides.

The Engineer was directed to attend to this matter.

CAPPOQUIN SEWERAGE.
Mr. Ormonde, B.E., reported that all the houses in Cappoquin not yet connected with sewerage are within the required distance from the Public sewer, with the exception of those in Mill Street. There is actually a sewer in Mill Street, within 100 feet of all these houses but to connect to same the mill stream would have to be crossed. The question of connecting these houses came before the Board at a previous meeting. As regards the Twig Lane houses the water supply does not extend down the Street, until this has been done there would be no point in connecting to sewer.

The matter was referred to the Co. Surveyor as to the adequacy of the water supply to meet the requirements of the houses reported on by the S.S.O. if connected.

PUBLIC SCAVENGER REFUSED.
Cappoquin Parish Council wrote, stating that the Council is of opinion that Cappoquin should have a public scavenger, who would remove household refuse, each morning. As many of the houses in the town have only small yards, such a service would be in the interests of Public Health be most desirable.

The request was refused at the present time.

SEWERAGE.
The Parish Council also complained that many houses in the town are still without public conveniences despite the considerable sums expended a few years ago.

An order was made that the S.S.O. furnish a list of houses not yet connected with sewerage.

DANCE HALLS.
Mr. Ormonde, B.E., reported inspecting the dance halls at Cappoquin, Tallow, Loglesga, Ballycuddy, Cinema, Dungarvan.

Mr. Doyle, B.E., reported inspecting dance halls at Fortlaw, Ballymacarbrey and Clonmel.

The reports were noted.

DRAINAGE AT BOHERAWILLING, OR BURGHEE.
Referring to the minutes of the 11th June, last, Mr. J. Bowen, B.E., wrote that in this case the house drains were connected to a sewer or collecting drain laid by the U.D.C. This sewer was discharged into the ordinary road gutter crossing the road. The permission of the Co. Council was not asked for or given.

The gully is not trapped at either end, and merely discharge at the opposite side of the road. The liquid is allowed to flow along the side of the road, and naturally is decidedly offensive. The boundary of the Co. Urban area is along the centre of the main road and bye-road, so that the foul liquid collected on the Urban side and discharged on the Co. side. He thought this was a matter for the Urban Council.

An order was made that a copy of

this letter be sent to the Urban Council for their attention.

ARDMORE COLLEGE SEWER.
Mr. P. Walsh, Sanitary Inspector, reported that no improvements have been carried out to the sewer at Ardmore College.

An order was made that notice be served to have the work done within one month.

CHECKING OF ACCOUNTS.
Mr. P. Baillie, Cigar, wrote, re trouble he had in checking and balancing Mr. Sheehan's (Waterford) accounts.

The Board decided the collector, Sheehan, be informed that he must comply with the account system laid down by the Health Inspector.

RATES.
Mr. M. Higgins wrote stating that he sent final notice to each of the tenants of the new house at Tallow regarding their rates and as a result two residents called on him on behalf of the others and themselves and expressed their willingness to pay the rates, the highest amount on a labourer's cottage which is, he thought (21 s. 6d.). Before taking further action in the matter, they requested him to place their offer before the Commissioner for his consideration.

The Board ruled that rates must be paid in accordance with the terms of agreement.
