GAELIC EXILES FROM CLUB.—News has been received in Dungarvan and Abbeyside district that Gaelic players from West Waterford who have been forced to go to Great Britain to earn their livelihood have not forgotten their love for their Gaelic games. In one part of England at the birthplace of its most famous poet a party of exiles have formed a hurling club. Writing from the Hon. Sec. of the new club (an ex-Abbey-side hurler) asks for help from Gaelic lovers at home to supply hurleys and hurling balls. He says it is impossible to secure either in England and unless the help of those here is given, the club will be a failure. It would be a pity if such an appeal remained unanswered, as the playing of Gaelic games will unite those in England with the Motherland at home. It would be a small matter for a committee to be formed to raise the necessary few pounds to buy a set of hurleys and a few hurling balls for those lads. Someone should make the effort.

IT is welcome news that Clonea Castle, which, with offices and gardens, recently changed ownership, is now fully fitted up for use as a Private Nursing Home (Maternity, Convalescent and General), all the necessary structural alterations being completed and a highly qualified staff in charge of an experienced Nursing Sister installed. It may be well to mention the fact that this beautiful mansion was the ancestral home of Lord McGurk's relative, William Walter McGurk, M.D., who died in Portland Street Hotel, Marylebone, London, on September 23rd, 1921, after an arduous life in many lands—a life devoted to the advancement of his noble profession, in which he won world-wide fame by his magnificent services. Throughout his time in foreign parts, Dr. McGurk retained always a full interest in his birthplace, and in his last will and testament (dated October 10th, 1905, and proved and registered in the Principal Registry of the King's Bench Division—Probate—in the High Court of Justice in Southern Ireland, on March 22nd, 1922) he expressed the wish that the old home of his childhood would be converted into what is now the "Clonea Castle" nursing home for respectable persons, wholly irrespective of creed, (whether Catholics, Protestants or Jews), and that it should be equally well treated and made at home. So the greater glory of God, and with feelings of deepest gratitude to the Almighty for His protection and care of me during the course of a long and fairly eventful life, and in memory of my deceased parents, who were ever the friends of the poor and who for many years during my childhood and early boyhood lived at Clonea Castle.

THE ATTACK ON LOURDES

We call the attention of our readers to the important lecture entitled "The Attack on Lourdes" which will be delivered on Thursday October 23rd, in the Town Hall, Dungarvan by the Very Rev. Colman O'Driscoll, O.S.A., Dublin (see posters). Fr. O'Driscoll is among those best qualified to speak on Lourdes and the miraculous phenomena which occur there. He has been a frequent visitor to the Shrine and has been present on numerous occasions during the discussions which take place in the Medical Bureau when a cure is reported. Indeed, he is one of the very few priests who has the privilege of being present in the Bureau on such occasions. There, listening to distinguished doctors of every nationality, he has had an unique opportunity of assessing from the point of view of the many miraculous cures that occur yearly. In this lecture he will not only discuss the most famous cures of recent years but he will also examine critically the whole story of Lourdes with particular reference to the character of St. Bernadette. It may be mentioned that Father O'Driscoll has had on several occasions interviews with nuns who were fellow-novices of St. Bernadette at the Convent of the Sisters of Charity at Nevers. This lecture is a challenge to non-Catholics who never tire of attacking and ridiculing Lourdes. Father O'Driscoll has issued this challenge in many Irish and English towns and cities to audiences in which there were many non-Catholics including distinguished non-Catholic doctors. He has invited critical questions from the audience and in no case has he failed to reply satisfactorily to even the most subtle attacks on Lourdes as it is viewed by the Catholic Church. No one interested in Lourdes can afford to miss this lecture. It will revive cherished memories for those who have had the good fortune to visit the Shrine in the years of peace.
