Mr. Dalton, caretaker of the above, reported increased water in storage tank and filter beds. Mr. Dalill—That is a satisfactory report from a beginner.

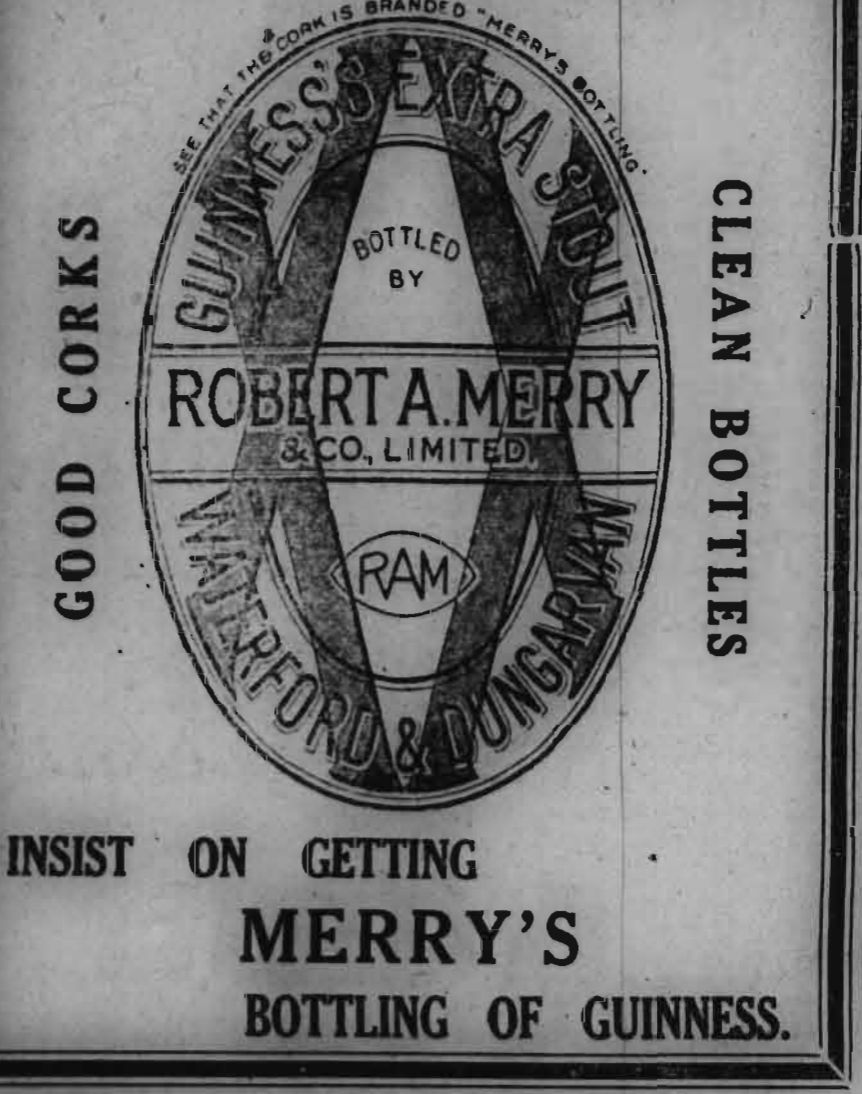

The funeral was to St. Cajetan's Church where solemn High Mass was celebrated and the eulogy delivered by Father Meade who referred to Mr. Butler as a real Catholic and a true friend.
