TALLOW NOTES FORTNIGHTLY FIG MARKET. There was a considerable increase in the number of pigs offered for sale at last week's market, but not nearly enough to meet the requirements of the buyers who were in attendance. Enhanced values were realised in the majority of sales, due to the first-class quality of the animals on offer which was the result of the rationing fed to the pigs for the past two months, clearly proving the absolute worth of the potato for solid fattening purposes, and since such good results followed from the use of the "wore" or small potatoes, what may not be expected from the feeding of full size tubers, if grown in sufficient quantities to augment the shortage of cereals at the moment. The period of the fattening process may be lengthened but the results achieved as above illustrated prove conclusively that even the slower method eventually pays the producer, while the quantity of the bacon reaches the highest standard possible for those who eventually foot the bill, viz., the consumer.

West Waterford Div. G.A.A. Notes. By "AN RUNAIDHE" ALL OVER ON TIME.—The season ended with two of the greatest games of the year.
