County Waterford Committee of Agriculture.

AGRICULTURAL SCHOLARSHIPS.

THE above-named Committee have made provision for Three Agricultural Scholarships, enable at the Department's Provincial Agricultural Schools or other approved Agricultural Schools or Colleges during the 1942/43 Session.

Candidates must be boys whose parents derive their livelihood wholly or substantially from farming pursuits and are resident, or holders of land, in the rural districts of the County.

Candidates who propose to attend one of the Department's Provincial Schools must be not less than 17 nor more than 19 years of age at date of admission, in the case of other Agricultural Schools and Colleges candidates must be not less than 15 years of age at the date referred to. Boys who have already attended at any of these Institutions are not eligible to compete for the Scholarships.

Each Scholarship entitles the holder to free training, board and residence in the school for the time being of the Parish for Masses to be celebrated in public in Ireland at a stipend of 10/- for the repose of her soul and the souls of her parents, brother and sisters.

The Scholarships will be awarded on the result of an examination to be held at an early date, and Forms of Application for admission thereto may be obtained from the undersigned, with whom all applications should be lodged on or before the 18th April, 1942. Competitors are required to produce certificates of good character. The eligible candidates will be duly notified of the place, date and hour of the examination.

The examination will comprise questions in Agriculture, Arithmetic (involving a knowledge of fractions, decimal percentages and mensuration), English (including Essay), and Irish. There will be an oral examination in Agriculture. The standard required generally will not demand higher educational attainments than are usually achieved by pupils who proceed to the sixth standard in primary school.

Individual candidates may, if they express their desire to do so beforehand, take the tests in Agriculture and Arithmetic and the oral examination through the medium of Irish. Successful candidates will be required to furnish to the Committee of Agriculture evidence of age and good health.

Scholarships Tenable at Ransgrange School of Rural Domestic Economy

THE above Committee have made provision for Four Scholarships, tenable at the above-named School during the 1942/43 Session. The course of instruction given is intended to qualify the pupils to perform efficiently the work of rural life, and includes Dairying, Poultry-keeping, Household Management, Laundry-work and Needlework. The School year extends from July to June and is divided into two terms, which begin, respectively, in July and January.

The Scholarships will be awarded on the result of an examination to be held at an early date, and Forms of Application for admission thereto may be obtained from the undersigned, who will also furnish particulars of the conditions. Successful candidates must be received not later than 18th April, 1942. Competitors are required to produce certificates of good character, and to furnish to the Committee of Agriculture evidence of age and good health.

Dungarvan Urban Council.

Mr. M. Morrissey, T.D., Chairman, presided at the weekly meeting of the above on Friday last, other members in attendance were Messrs. J. J. Crotty, P. O'Dwyer, J. Dahill, Mr. Williams, etc. to the Council, who also present.

PAYMENTS.

Payments for £22 7s. 3d. on the general account, £7 10s. 3d. on Loughmore Housing Scheme, and £1 10s. 4d. on the 139 house scheme were presented and passed.

COMPLAINT RE HOUSE.

A complaint from a man named Moylan, who recently obtained a house in Cahill Brugha Place, that doors and shelves were missing was referred to the Borough Surveyor for a report.

HOUSES WHICH COULD BE MADE HABITABLE.

The Department wrote again re the houses which were reported in a survey of 1938 to be unfit for human habitation but capable of being rendered fit at a reasonable cost, asking if the Council were now in a position to furnish a reply in a report.

CLERK.—You all know the position regarding those houses. The cost of material, even if it could be procured, is prohibitive, the cost of carrying out the alterations.

BOUNDARY WALL.

Mrs. Egan, Hotel, wrote drawing attention to the back state of the boundary wall due to the building of the new houses at the back of her premises. The letter stated that during the past few weeks the wall had got much worse and there is now danger of its collapse.

Mr. Dahill—Five or six years ago, an order was made here to have that work done.

The letter was referred to the Borough Surveyor.

WATER SUPPLY.

The Department wrote regarding the Council's letter of the 20th ult. in regard to the water supply and asked whether the estimate of the Consulting Engineers as to the cost of the exploratory works proposed is now available.

Chairman—We have all read the correspondence from the Consulting Engineers, and it is for us to decide what action we are going to take on it.

Mr. Dahill—We only asked what the cost would be to try and find out who is at fault. We did not ask for an estimate of repairs.

Chairman—I think in my opinion, estimate No. 1 as submitted is for exploratory works.

Mr. Dahill would not agree and said in his opinion it was repair work.

Chairman—Paragraphs 1, 2 and 3 in estimate No. 1 deal with liability and state if no leakage is found the contractor shall be deemed responsible. There is no doubt but that this is the first work that must be done.

Mr. Dahill—it is repair work.

Mr. Crotty—Mr. Dahill is quite right, why do they put in material and are we to be debilitated with it?

Chairman—I take it that anything done in No. 1 Estimate is exploratory and temporary.

Mr. Dahill, reading from the correspondence—"If the above works are not satisfactory," said have not the Council as much right to put in "big" as the engineers. What is going to happen if the above works are not satisfactory?

Mr. Crotty—it looks, from reading that that it is the Council are responsible. These estimates are again all salaries and wages and it looks like as if it was we who made the "blob." All this money is to go back again to those who made the mistakes. Did the Department get a copy of this correspondence?

Chairman—Any reply yet?

Chairman—It is certain that we will have to come to a decision on it. The material required in No. 1 estimate is £140 odd.

Mr. Crotty—The material is only half, the rest is wages, fees and profit.

Mr. Dahill—What did we ask for at all?

Mr. Williams, solr.—The Council asked for an estimate of the cost of the exploratory work, and they included with it the cost of the repairs.

Chairman—I take it that No. 1 is certainly exploratory work.

Mr. Crotty—I would not say so Mr. Chairman, there is a lot of material and who is to be responsible if the thing is remedied by No. 1 estimate.

Chairman—According to a letter received previously the contractor will be. If we agree to this we must have an agreement that this is so. The contractor would not put up the material at present, as it would be an admission of liability.

Mr. Crotty—They want the Council to hold the "bab" still.

Mr. Dahill held the contractor should do the work and prove to the Council he was not at fault, then it would be a question for the Engineers.

Chairman—We would like to see either the contractor or the engineers do it. We discussed the angle raised to-night at the Conference, and it was more or less decided to ask for an estimate for exploratory work. Mr. Butler and himself called on the Department in connection with this matter.

Mr. Dahill—Before the conference was held, Messrs. Delap and Waller

DERELICT SITES ACT.

Mr. Bowen, writing with regard to the above, stated he is of opinion that at present there are no derelict sites in accordance with the definition of the act, in which the Council should take any action.

SWIMMING POOL.

A letter from the Department of Local Government and Public Health stated that the Minister has obtained the approval of the Minister for Finance to the allocation of a grant for proportion of the cost of the scheme for which the estimated cost is £1,200 for 1st section, on the following conditions: 1. The maximum grant payable will be £1,080. 2. The balance of the cost of the scheme will be required to be met by the local authority out of their resource for the current year. 3. Employment of labour will be subject to the conditions set out in memorandum of 25th November, 1941. Before any portion of the grant will be payable it will be necessary to furnish a certificate of compliance with the conditions. 4. Rates of wages to be paid not to exceed the appropriate rates of wages obtaining in the district on September, 1939. 5. The making of payments from the grant will be subject to strict compliance with all requirements of the Department as regards details of the scheme, supervision and execution of the work. 6. Arrangements should be made for the commencement of the work as soon as possible and a substantial portion of the expenditure on the scheme should be incurred by 31st March, 1942. No portion of the grant will be payable after that date.

Clerk—The Borough Surveyor is prepared to start work on Monday morning.

PLOTS.

A man named Hogan appeared before the meeting and complained of

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being cut out from receiving an unemployed allowance plot.

Clerk—Probably his claim is not supported from the Labour Exchange. He worked for the Council on the Marsh Scheme.

Hogan said he had a plot last year, the only work he got was to go on with it, that we consider the fees too high.

Some more discussion having taken place, the matter was deferred to next meeting.

ABBESIDE PARK.

Mr. Williams, solr. to the Council wrote—Before we propose the lease of the plot at Abbeside to Mrs. Minnie Griffin, we should like to know from what date it should commence. Her last lease expired on the 1st September, 1940. Is the new lease which is only for a period of 3 years, to commence on that date, or is it to be a general increase now, they will get it one of these days.

Mr. Dwyer—That's no good, the increase should be made retrospective.

Mr. Dahill—The Council men are the best judges.

Mr. Dwyer—They are the worst paid Council men in Ireland.

The Clerk was directed to refer the matter to the Council.

ST. CARTHAGES V. WESTERN BOARD.

St. Carthages M.H. Club objected against the Western Divisional Board in accepting the affiliation of a new M.H. club from Lismore, namely, Eire Oge. The objection: (1) That Eire Oge Club must have fifteen playing members before it can be affiliated. (Rule 1, page 21, O.G. 1938). (2) That the affiliation fee of 12/- should have been refused as (a) it threatened the existence of an established G.A.A. Club of ten years standing; (b) That minor players in Lismore were already amply catered for by the existing club; (c) the minor population of this small town could not possibly maintain two minor teams on the playing field.

After some discussion the objection was upheld.

When discussing point two of the objection, the Chairman said the affiliation fee is 12/-, but in order to facilitate clubs who had no senior interest, those are allowed in at a reduced fee of 5/-. This is customary here in this county. Having paid only five shillings the club has not stated what-soever, it could not look for transfers or defend an objection.

SEQUEL TO JUNIOR FOOTBALL FINAL INCIDENTS.

A number of members of the Dungarvan and Dunhill Clubs were before the meeting on a charge of being involved in incidents at the junior football final.

On learning that there were no stewards appointed for that match, the Chairman remarked that the club should rest upon the Board, and having cautioned the individuals concerned, dismissed the charges against them.

However, it was alleged that a Dunhill player who had retired injured (his name was not ascertained) assaulted one of the goal umpires and this man will be requested to attend next meeting to be tried.

REGRADING.

WATERFORD COUNTY COUNCIL

Commissioner S. J. Moynihan, administering the affairs of the Waterford County Council at a special meeting at the County Secretary's Office, Dungarvan, on last Saturday, adopted a general rate of 155.68d. (12/11) in the £ for 1942-43, an increase of 24d. in the £ on last year's rate.

The general charges comprising the rate were: roads, £2,690d. (decrease of 473d.); county services, £3,640d. (decrease of 194d.); poor relief, £2,760d. (increase of 55,175d.); Board of Health, 16,490d. (decrease of 2,425d.).

In a statement following the adoption of the rate, Commissioner S. J. Moynihan said that the general rate for the County showed an increase on last year's of 24d. in the £.

The Deputy Secretary and himself had carefully fine-combed the estimates in order to avail, as far as possible, any increase. The rates might have been lower than at present, were it not for increasing estimates of the Board of Assistance, whose budget in the past three years had increased by £17,000, including £7,000 in the year under review. This £17,000 rise had been mainly due to the high prices for commodities needed for the County Hospital and County Homes and also for the provision of home assistance, which is partially contributed by Waterford City.

The increase in the rate, for the County represented by this, he continued, would amount to about 1/- in the £. For this provision had to be made in the coming year's estimates under Neutrality Damage to War Property Act, 1941, and also the County Council was paying off the balance of the demand made by the Railway Company under the High Court decision in regard to reduction in the valuation of property.

"The general rate would, therefore," said Mr. Moynihan, "be much higher, were it not that the estimates were paired to the bone, and also that a certain credit came to the Council owing to a slightly improved collection of land annuities."

Commissioner Moynihan then went on to refer to land annuity defaulters, who, he said, were being subsidised by the honest farmers of the county, who were paying increased rates. They paid their rates but he feared they were not paying increased rates. He was preparing a schedule of these defaulters for the special attention of the Land Commission and the Department of Justice. He trusted that the Department concerned would see to it that improved collection of land annuities would be made in the future.

"There should be no excuse at present," continued the Commissioner, "in view of the increased prices being paid for farm produce. If a better collection of land annuities were secured, a considerable reduction in the general rate for the county may be possible in future years."

Concluding, the Commissioner congratulated the Deputy Secretary, Mr. T. B. Boyle, on his careful preparation and presentation of the estimates and budget.

AMERICAN FORCES' POURING INTO PACIFIC

American forces strong enough to engage the Japanese in the South West Pacific are pouring into that region by convoys, assembled and equipped since the Pearl Harbour attack, a New York report states. Sea and air power, together with specially trained shock troops of the U.S. Army, is expected soon to attempt an action that will place the Japanese on the defensive, adds the report.

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VOLUNTARY NATIONAL SERVICES: DUNGARVAN DISTRICT.

On Tuesday next, Mar. 17, we ask every man and woman in the Dungarvan District, who is not already playing his or her part in the National Drive for Preparedness, to seriously and finally consider their duty in the matter and to give a definite "Yes" or "No" to the question "Are you prepared to help your Country in the event of war?" If "Yes" you will enrol in one of the Voluntary Services, and please God your answer will make St. Patrick's Day, 1942, a truly National Day in this area and will prove that your lack of action up to the present was not evidence of the absence of Nationalism, but rather of carelessness and want of realisation of the fact that the time for practical patriotism is again with us.

Local Defence Force.—The Local Defence Force is an armed body of local men trained to take an allotted part in the defence of the County. In the event of invasion it will act as the first line of defence in each area, bearing the brunt of the first onslaught, and no matter what happens will "stay put" to harass and hamper the enemy in every possible way.

Red Cross Divisions.—The activities of the Irish Red Cross Casualty Services are twofold: (1) to provide a First Aid Service for the Local Defence Force; (2) to provide a Civilian Casualty Service. Men and women are urgently needed for both these Services, which must be regarded as of the first importance, and it will be a shameful state of affairs if, through lack of sufficient personnel, either combatants or civilians will be allowed to suffer or die needlessly. There is a tendency to regard First Aid solely as women's work, while it is true that women play a large part in the Service, it must be realised that men are absolutely essential, especially for the Local Defence Force. At the moment the male personnel in the entire area is practically nil, while the female personnel (Dungarvan 22, Ardmore 8, Rest of District, Nil) requires to be considerably augmented.

Local Security Force.—The Local Security Force is a Voluntary Force organised as an Auxiliary to the Garda Síochána, to assist in the protection of the civilian population and to co-operate with the other local Voluntary Organisations in the event of hostilities. The present strength in the area is entirely inadequate for this purpose, and all men who are not attached to other Voluntary Organisations should be enrolled in this Service.

To provide an all-round efficient Service in the event of invasion all three Organisations, equally important in their own spheres of activity, must be brought up to maximum strength now and we confidently appeal to all in the Dungarvan District to record their willingness to help their country in the event of war by enrolling, according to their choice, on St. Patrick's Day, when the names of volunteers will be taken at all Church doors.

POPULAR GARDA TRANSFERRED.—Garda King, Cappagh Station, has been transferred to Co. Kilkenny Station. A general favourite, Garda King was a most popular and courteous peace officer and his many admirers and friends regret his departure and wish him all the best in his new sphere. He is succeeded at Cappagh by Garda Conannon, who is already well known in the district having been stationed there previously.

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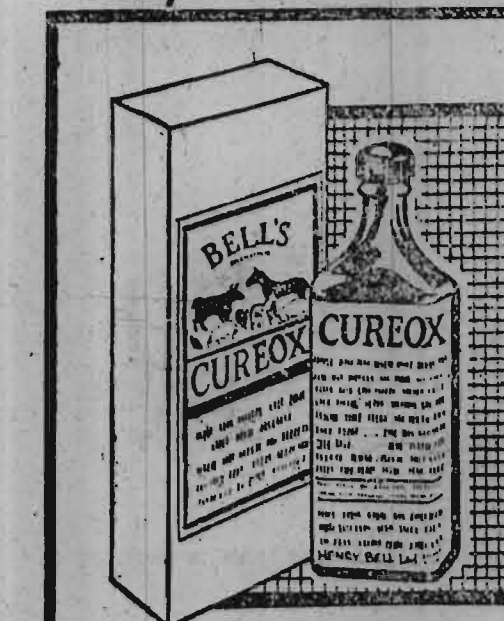
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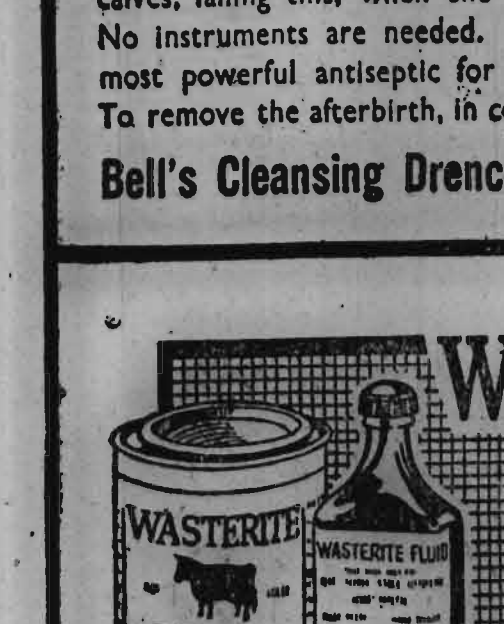
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
