Brickeys.—Discussing the forthcoming senior football clash between the Brickeys and Kilrossanty during the week I was informed, and regretted very much to hear that Paddy Joe McGrath, one of the "stars" to be out of the game for some time owing to a recent injury. I am sure I am only voicing the wish of all Gaelic in wishing P. J. a speedy recovery, and that he will be able to play on May Sunday. The loss of this young and promising player would be a serious set back to the Black and Amber supporters, who say we must be at our best to beat Kilrossanty. Rumour is misleading now-a-days but I hope there is no truth in the latest rumour that, Ned Power, another Brickey stalwart is shortly going to England, to take up a position there. Ned, one of the finest in the game would be a loss to the Brickeys. Martin Curran, however, says, "we have tons of material to select from and we have no fears of being ousted by the Coneragh men in the first round."

Stradbally.—"Tudde" again. I raised the question on Sunday last at Faha, was I ("Tudde") Corbett retiring from the game? I was delighted to hear that he will probably again figure on the Stradbally senior team in this year's championships. It is a shame to hear that first I was "Tudde" playing in Shandon field, and strange to my memory in those days he was more at home when playing in his stockinged feet. I was presented during the week with a G.A.A. calendar for Waterford. I am very grateful to the County Secretary, being so thoughtful, as the calendar is a very neat "turn out" and includes a lovely photograph of the Stradbally team, senior football County champions, 1940 and 1941. He gave an outstanding display in the All-Army final at the Curragh during the week, though his team was beaten. Monnie was praised very highly and received special mention on the "Curragh Bulletin" and Dublin daily newspapers. At Leamybrien during the week there was great Gaelic activities, more than 20 of the Kilrossanty seniors were limbering up in a bog near the cross. They were coached from the side line by a veteran of the 1919 team. Paddy, who is a general favourite, will not wear of his team's defeat when they meet the Brickeys. Remember Paddy! Come with the team when they go out against the Brickeys and do not stay at home like you did, when they defeated Dungarvan, in the Green Cross Cup match. May be, however, the old proverb, "it is the championship that really counts" played you.

Dungarvan.—The "Blues" seem to have made a start for the year's activities. Several of the seniors turned out punctually for practice this week. Their debut by Kilrossanty seemed to be an incentive to some of the footballers, who, indeed, needed a little training. Speaking a member of the Club Committee recently I was informed that the senior hurlers, last year's County champions, had not yet received their medals. Surely, the County Board are not going to include another set on the long list. All Dungarvan Gaelic are eagerly awaiting the Street League final between the "Shandon Rovers" and the "Waups." I was asked a few days ago if the final was ever going to be played. I was not in a position then to give a reply, but I have learned since from reliable authority, that the Street League final will be played on the first available Sunday. Perhaps the County senior hurling selection committee may like to see the same. I am afraid they need a lot of limbering up, more so in my opinion than the players.

Tourin.—Diarmuid Gibbons the ex-Coneragh player is now eligible to turn out with Tourin, and his appearance with the senior team may strengthen Tourin's hopes for their forthcoming clash with their neighbours, Lismore at Tallow in June. John Fives, who replaced Tom Phelan as secretary to the Club is a promising young hurler, who I expect to see more of in inter-county competitions. John, who is tall, strong and well-built, is the leading light in Tourin Gaelic activities to-day. I understand Tom Phelan, last year's junior captain has joined the Defence Force. Tom was instrumental last year in securing for his club, County junior honours, and his efficiency on and off the field, the champions owe their successes.

Lismore.—I was more than surprised to note that two Lismore players, Mick Regan and Joe Duggan, were not included on the Waterford team who were selected to play against Cork on Sunday last, in Cork for the match in aid of the "Gaelic Ahearnes fund." WATER SUPPLIES. Mr. Bowen wrote—The water connection to Havey and Byrne's yards are now used by the Dickens Leather Co. In Quay Street there have been some premises, including three houses and two yards taken over by the Dickens Leather Co. There were water connections into at least some of these premises and in at least one case the water is being used by the Dickens Leather Co. at present. This matter should be looked into as all supplies to these premises are to be per meter. The same remarks apply to the old Co. Council yard.

Mr. Walsh said that the three demolished dwelling houses had no water supply.

It was decided to have all supplies cut off which are not going through water meters.

A letter from the Dickens Leather Co. stated they are prepared to pay water rate for water used in the construction of the premises at Quay Street.

SWIMMING POOL. Mr. Bowen wrote enclosing pay-sheet for Swimming Pool for week. This has been possible only because the tide and state of the work prevented any work being done to-day. This is an office holiday here and our staff has had to attend specially for the purpose of preparing and certifying the sheet. As already pointed out the week ends on Saturday and all forms and pay-sheets must be made up to that date. We cannot have two pay-sheets for the same week, and it is not possible to let you have the sheets earlier than Monday forenoon for the week ending the previous Saturday. This was arranged for the Marsh scheme recently completed, and it worked very well. It is not possible to improve on it.
