### Feeding Sugar Beet To Livestock.

In connection with the arrangements recently made by the Minister for Agriculture for the release of sugar beet seed for the production of a substitute crop, it has come to the notice of the Minister that some farmers are under the impression that sugar beet is not suitable for feeding to livestock. There are no grounds for this belief. Sugar beet is, however, a more concentrated food and requires to be introduced gradually into the ration. It contains about twice the amount of dry matter contained in other roots and the total quantity should not at any time exceed half the usual allowance of mangel or swedes.
