



DUNGARVAN URBAN COUNCIL MANY MATTERS DISCUSSED

Mr. Michael Morrissey, T.D. Chairman, presided at the weekly meeting of the above on Friday last. Also present: Messrs. T. McCarthy (Vice-Chairman), P. O'Dwyer, James Mansfield, Michael Connors, John Dahill, P. Quinn, J. J. Crotty, M. Clancy, and Senator J. Butler, Mr. J. Bowen, B.S., was also in attendance.

11 Months Letting.—Only one tender, that of Mr. Maurice Keohan, was received for the grazing of the Council's field at Borthem. The tender was for three periods of 11 months at £2 a period. The tender was accepted on the proposition of Mr. Clancy, seconded by Mr. McCarthy.

Mr. Clancy—This family deserve very great credit. They supply milk around the town. They have only a very small farm and are most industrious.

Mr. Clancy—Only acting under the Milk and Dairies Act. Chairman—Yes. We should go into the whole question again. It would be advisable if we could come to some decision.

Mr. Butler said he thought it was a question between the Veterinary Inspectors' Association and the Department regarding fees allowed.

Mr. Clancy—What is his present salary? Clerk—£20. Mr. Butler—If we are going to consider it in the near future, I would like to know what they pay in towns of similar size in Munster.

Water Connections.—Mr. Bowen, writing in reply to the letter received from Mr. Scanlon in connection with water connections, stated that the Council has handed over to the B.S. all matters arising from the water supply and distribution system and the enforcement of the bye-laws.

Mr. Bowen said the Council passed the bye-laws, and passed on to him the enforcing of them, and it is necessary that they should be enforced.
